PTA Chairman Gives Suggestions for Judging Comics, Movies, Radio

Chicago—Intelligent selection of the best quality offered in comics, motion pictures, radio and television should be the goal of parents, children and teachers, Dr. Kenneth E. Oberholtzer, superintendent of public schools in Denver, Colo., told the board of managers of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers at a recent meeting in the Congress hotel, Chicago.

Dr. Oberholtzer is second vice-president of the national PTA congress and chairman of the organization's action committee on comics, motion pictures, radio and television.

Dr. Oberholtzer emphasized the committee's belief that mass media should be self-regulating, that they should make and adhere to their own codes rather than have censorship methods imposed from without.

"The public should act positively, approving what is good by letters, phone calls and other means, rather than take a negative attitude which includes only criticism of what they believe is bad," he stated. "This obligation is best discharged by parents and the local PTA chapters," he continued, "and should be approached on a constructive level."

Dr. Oberholtzer cited horror and crime stories, both in comic books and on television as the major problems confronting parents and teachers. "Radio and the movies have been in existence longer," he explained, "and have pretty well achieved acceptable standards. Comic books and television are newer media and we are very concerned about the amount of crime and violence children are exposed to through them."

Dr. Oberholtzer pointed out that his committee is not an appraisal board and does not pass judgment as such on the output of the comics, movies, radio or TV. However, he did submit a list of suggestions for evaluating mass media.

He believes the following standards should be applied:

1. Does it appeal to the age level of the audience? It should give information and/or enter-

tainment related to real-life situations or interests.

2. Does it meet the needs for entertainment and action? It should deal with wholesome adventure, humor, fantasy or suspense and avoid emotionally disturbing situations, crudeness and unnecessary emphasis on cruelty and violence.

3. Does it add to one's understanding and appreciation of himself, others and the world? It should be sincere, constructive, informative and tolerant and not take advantage of immaturity or lack of knowledge.

4. Does it encourage worthwhile ideals, values and beliefs? It should uphold acceptable standards of behavior and not glorify crime, intolerance or other objectionable standards.

5. Does it stimulate constructive activities? It should encourage worthwhile projects and not solve problems by force or violence.

6. Does it have artistic qualities? Music, script, acting, art work, printing, photography, etc. should be skillfully done. It should not be confusing, hard to follow or of poor quality.

7. Is the language used suitable? Correct grammar and vocabulary suitable to the age level are mandatory.

8. Is the over-all effect desirable? It should have a positive effect, be informative, useful and promote general understanding. It should not leave one where he was or push him back.

Dr. Oberholtzer and the committee recommended that there be a check made by local PTA groups on how well the industry's self-regulating measures are being carried out.
