Medford several years ago from El Paso, Tex., and the bridegroom has lived in the Rogue valley for most of his life.

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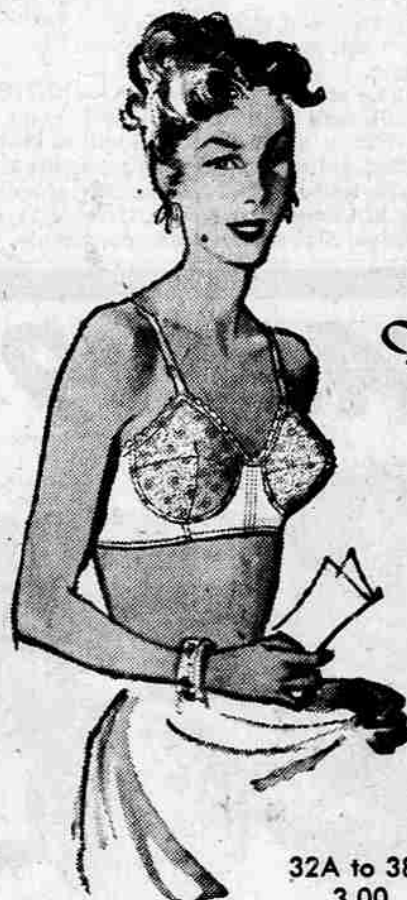


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
