

UMC Funds Provide Boy Scouts With Training Program

(Editor's Note: This is another in a series of brief articles describing the agencies which benefit from the United Methodist Crusade fund drive, now under way. Material is supplied by the agencies themselves.)

A boy scout helping an old lady across the street has provided many cartoons, but it bears little relationship to scouts and leaders who spent 13 hours transporting an injured man down the icy slopes of Mt. McLoughlin.

A Scout's ability to help others depends upon how well he learns each skill. Boy Scouts are prepared to administer first aid to injured and by aiding in disasters. When the government needs widespread help, as in war, the Boy Scouts are called upon. In the "Get Out the Vote" campaign, they participate.

When a Scout increases his skills, he is advanced from a Tenderfoot to the highest award, the Eagle award.

Many of these skills are practiced at Camp McLoughlin, located at Lake of the Woods, where the United Methodist Crusade assists in making low operational costs per scout possible. Craft skills were taught to 834 Scouts and Explorers in 1954, a 22 per cent gain in attendance over 1954.

A Scout program also is taught to boys between 8 and 10 years. The Cub Scout program is a home centered function with parents serving as leaders.

The Scouting program is carried on by volunteers as Den mothers, cubmasters, scoutmasters, explorer advisors, unit committeemen, district and council leaders, all helping to bring scouting to more boys. The United Methodist Crusade makes this program possible.

Westerberg Herd Tops in County During September

Summary figures listing the top five dairy herds for the month of September have been released by the Jackson county Dairy Herd Improvement association.

Top producing herd for the month was owned by Richard Westerberg, whose 40 cows averaged 742 pounds of milk and 41.3 pounds of butterfat.

The other four top herds were owned by R. L. and Blanche Wyant, 29 cows, averaging 727 pounds milk and 40.1 pounds butterfat; Three Jays Guernsey farm, 22 cows, 843 pounds of milk, 38.7 pounds butterfat; E. B. Poyer, 13 cows, 677 pounds milk, and 37.1 pounds butterfat; and J. H. Stanley, 42 cows, averaging 651 pounds of milk and 36.4 pounds butterfat.

Top cow for the month was Sadie, owned by Richard Westerberg. The cow produced 1665 pounds of milk, 94.9 pounds of butterfat, and has 130 days in milk.

Other top cows for the month are owned by W. C. Higenbotham, Ruth Wyant, Victor and Nita Birdseye, R. L. and Blanche Wyant, Allen Rollins, Gilman's Dairy Farm, and Minear Brothers.

Ozark May Get Permanent Permit

Washington —(U.P.)—The Civil Aeronautics Board Monday proposed to grant permanent certification to Ozark Air Lines of St. Louis, Mo.

Permanent certifications would cover most of the points currently served by the line under temporary certificates.

The CAB said the action was designed to speed up permanent certification of local service carriers as ordered by Congress this year.

The act requires the CAB to grant permanent authority to local service carriers to serve at least 50 per cent of the points on their routes, if they so request.

The board proposed permanent certification for all but eight of Ozark's 28 points. Temporary certification would continue for Danville, Mattoon, Charleston, Marion-Herrin and Cairo, Ill.; Pittsburg and Chanute, Kan.; Cape Girardeau, Mo., and Clinton, Ia.

Policeman Quizzed In Dentist's Case

Minneapolis —(U.P.)— Lawyers for Dr. A. Arnold Axilrod, accused of strangling a pretty young patient for threatening to "tell the world" he made her pregnant, planned further cross-examination today of a policeman summoned when her body was found.

The policeman, Ben G. Soule, testified late Monday that he and another officer viewed the body of 21-year-old Mrs. Elizabeth Mary Moonan last April 23 shortly after it was found in the fashionable Lake of Isles district by John Cowles Jr., Minneapolis Star and Tribune newsman and son of the publisher.

Soule said the woman's face and legs were discolored and that there was a bruise on her throat and sand in her face and mouth.

Soule's testimony, plus the fact that there was no sign of a struggle or weapon in the area, indicated Mrs. Moonan had been slain elsewhere.

Measles, Pneumonia Top Illness Report

Twelve cases of communicable diseases were reported in Jackson county for the week ending Oct. 8, according to a report released today by the county health department.

Topping the list were four cases of measles, including three in Medford and one in Ashland, and four cases of pneumonia, including two in Ashland and one each in Tiller and Applegate.

Also on the list were two cases of chicken pox, with one each in Central Point and Butte Falls, one case of influenza in Gold Hill, and one case of strep throat in Medford.

Clerk Vacancy Listed At Jacksonville PO

Jacksonville — Federal civil service has announced an examination for the position of substitute clerk for the Jacksonville post office. The post pays a salary of \$1.71 an hour.

Applicants must reside within the Jacksonville post office delivery area or be bona fide patrons of the Jacksonville office. Employees now in the Jacksonville post office will be considered bona fide patrons of the office.

Applications and further information may be obtained at the Jacksonville or Medford post offices. Application forms must be filed with the Director, Eleventh U.S. Civil Service Region, 302 Federal Office Building, Seattle 4, Wash., not later than Oct. 31, 1955.

Patients Scheduled For Rheumatism, Arthritis Clinic

A number of patients suffering from rheumatism and arthritis have been scheduled for observation at a special free diagnostic and treatment clinic to be held here tomorrow, it was reported today.

The clinic, held under the joint sponsorship of the Jackson County Medical society and the Oregon Chapter of the Rheumatism and Arthritis foundation, will be at Sacred Heart hospital starting at 7:30 a.m. Wednesday.

Physicians who specialize in rheumatism and arthritis will conduct the clinic. Admission will be only through reference from local doctors. Laboratory tests and x-rays will be free.

To Arrive Early
Patients who have appointments are to arrive at the hospital between 7:30 and 8 a.m., before eating or drinking anything, and should bring urine and stool specimens with them, according to the announcement. Preliminary laboratory work will be done then, with patients returning again at their regular appointment time.

Results of the examinations will be sent back to the family doctors of the patients, and results may be obtained from him. The foundation is especially hopeful that chronic cases, which have failed to respond to usual medication, can be observed, as well as patients with diagnostic problems related to rheumatism and arthritis.

Adenauer Suffers Bronchial Pneumonia

Bonn, Germany —(U.P.)— Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, 79, is suffering from bronchial pneumonia, it was announced today.

Adenauer has been confined to his bed at his home in nearby Thorendorf since Friday.

The first official medical bulletin issued since he fell ill said the pneumonia "is receding" and that the fever has fallen.

The bulletin was signed by two doctors who examined the chancellor this morning. It said he will have to remain in bed for at least a week. It was the first announcement that Adenauer is suffering from pneumonia. His illness earlier was described as a "feverish cold and sore throat." Monday a government spokesman disclosed that the chancellor had bronchitis.

Internal Revenue Agent Applications Sought

Applications for internal revenue agent are being accepted by the internal revenue service, civil service board of examiners in San Francisco, Calif.

Agent positions are concerned with individual, partnership and corporation tax return audits to determine federal tax liability. Applicants must have three years commercial accounting experience, or a college degree in accounting within the past two years.

Applications for written examination Nov. 19, must be received in the San Francisco office no later than Nov. 1. Blanks may be obtained at post offices, civil service and internal revenue service offices.

British Sailors Plan To Produce TV Programs

London —(U.P.)—Britain's largest aircraft carrier sails for the Mediterranean today equipped with television camera and six receiving sets.

Officers of the carrier Ark Royal explained that the men will not be able to watch outside television but will produce TV programs of their own.

Vets Day Parade Plans Under Way

Plans are now being made for the 1955 Medford Veterans day observance, to be held Nov. 11, it was announced today by Pat Graham.

Those in charge of the event have indicated they are particularly interested this year in having floats and other representations from non-veteran groups in the annual Veterans day parade.

The observance is sponsored by the Veterans Allied Council of Jackson County. In charge of the program is a committee made up of representatives of American Legion Post 15, Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 1833, and Disabled American Veterans Chapter 8.

Stuttgart, Germany —(U.P.)— The five-day exercise of some 50,000 American, British and French soldiers Thursday begin their biggest maneuvers of the year to test defense strength in an atomic war.

NATO ground forces will make use of guided missiles and free flight rockets for the first time in a major maneuver.

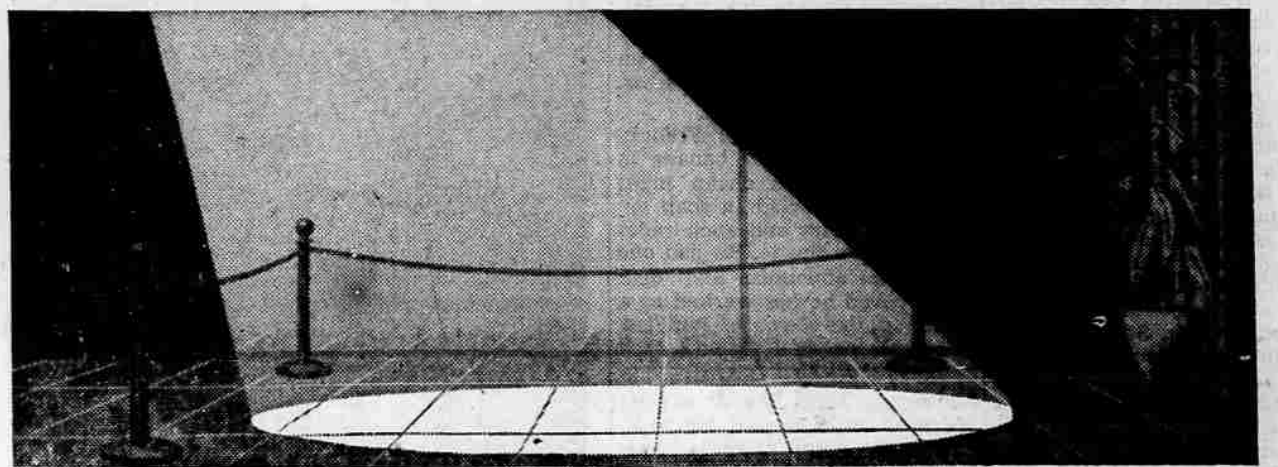
