

St. Louis Bus Driver Strike Snarls Traffic

St. Louis — (U.P.) — A strike of AFL bus drivers halted all public transportation here today despite state seizure of the St. Louis Public Service Co.

Automobile and truck traffic piled up for blocks at intersections and crawled in low gear when it was able to move during the morning rush hour.

All traffic police were called out to speed the flow of cars and restrictions on parking, where it could be found, were relaxed. Increase Rejected

The bus and street car operators walked out last night after rejecting a recommendation for a 12-cent an hour increase made by an arbitration panel.

Gov. Phil M. Donnelly ordered the utility seized by the state under Missouri's King-Thompson law at 6 a.m. He ordered officers and members of the union, the Amalgamated Association of Street, Electric Railway and Motor Coach Employees, Local 788, to resume operations.

By mid-morning, however the strike was still in effect. The union's Executive committee met to consider the seizure order and a meeting of the membership was called.

Dial Phones Function Despite Walkout

San Francisco — (U.P.) — Dial telephone service in northern California and Nevada functioned normally today despite a strike of 22,000 telephone workers, but manual and long distance service was subject to delays.

However, a spokesman for the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company expected the manual and long distance operations to improve "as supervisory workers get used to the job."

The strike began yesterday morning after the PT&T and three unions were unable to come to terms on new contracts for operators, maintenance workers, accounting employees and commercial office employees.

Lake Labish Onions Damaged by Rains

Salem — (U.P.) — Heavy rains have flooded out the million-dollar onion crop in the Lake Labish area north of Salem, the some 100 growers in the area said, and they slated a meeting today to discuss the possibility of getting federal financial help.

This was the third consecutive crop failure in the famed onion growing area. The flooding of the Little Pudding river following heavy rains swished over the onions which had been pulled and left to dry in long rows in the field. Normally, the crop is harvested by this time of the year, but late rains last spring delayed the planting time by several weeks.

U.S., Philippines Defend Way of Life

Manila — (U.P.) — U. S. Undersecretary of State Herbert Hoover Jr. said today the United States and the Philippines are "partners in the defense of a way of life which is common to all free people."

Hoover and John B. Hollister, director of the International Cooperation Administration, arrived by plane from Formosa to confer with President Ramon Magsaysay and other Philippine leaders on matters of "common interest."

"Recent history has brought the Filipino and American peoples closer together than ever before," Hoover told reporters at the air port.

Jackson Man Listed As Grange Nominee

Portland — (U.P.) — State Grange headquarters said today four men have been nominated by subordinate Granges for the post of master, now held by Elmer McClure of Milwaukie. The Grange primary election is in December.

Nominees include Clarence Jackson and Ralph Roberts of Lane county and William G. Howes of Jackson county.

McClure also has been nominated.

Movie Cowboy Fails To Drop Mountain Lion

Hollywood — (U.P.) — Movie cowboy Tommy McLeod drew fast and fired six shots in true Western fashion Monday night when he thought he spotted a mountain lion which had been prowling recently in a Topanga Canyon area.

McLeod, on location to make a horse opera, didn't find out how good his sharpshooting was, however. His six-shooter was loaded with blanks.

Ex-Movie Producer Freed of Drug Charge

Hollywood — (U.P.) — A narcotics charge against former movie producer Richard M. Blumenthal, 49, has been dropped because barbiturates found in his sock were prescribed for him by his physician.

Blumenthal, who has been associated with a real estate firm recently, was arrested by police early Friday following a traffic accident in which he broke an arm. Officers found the barbiturates in his sock.

Alaska Uranium Miners Marooned

Anchorage, Alaska — (U.P.) — Pilots awaited clearing weather today to resume a search for two Alaska uranium prospectors, one about 72 years old and on crutches, marooned on the desolate slopes of Mt. Dall for more than a week without food.

Les Thompson, Civil Air Patrol information officer, said the two men, Arthur Berry, about 72, and David J. Adams, 36, both of Anchorage, were flown to a point near the mountain Sept. 26. The mountain is about 140 miles northwest of here.

Thompson said the pair had enough food for but four days and it was believed there was no game in the area. Snow had been falling heavily in the area for about a week.

Andrew Wallace, CAP rescue officer, returned here at noon yesterday and said light planes were unable to get through Rainy Pass because of bad flying weather.

Medford Man Injured When Pickup Overtakes

Nels Ellis Nelson, 73, of 1021 West Second st., suffered minor injuries yesterday afternoon when his pickup truck went out of control and rolled over on Highway 99 near Foothills Creek bridge, between Gold Hill and Rogue River, according to state police.

Nelson told investigating officers the accident occurred when he swerved the vehicle to miss a dog in the road. The pickup skidded sideways for about 130 feet before turning over twice. The accident occurred at about 3:30 p.m. Police said Nelson suffered minor bruises.

New York — (U.P.) — The National Broadcasting Co. confirmed reports today that it had released comedienne Imogene Coca from a 10-year \$1,000,000 contract. 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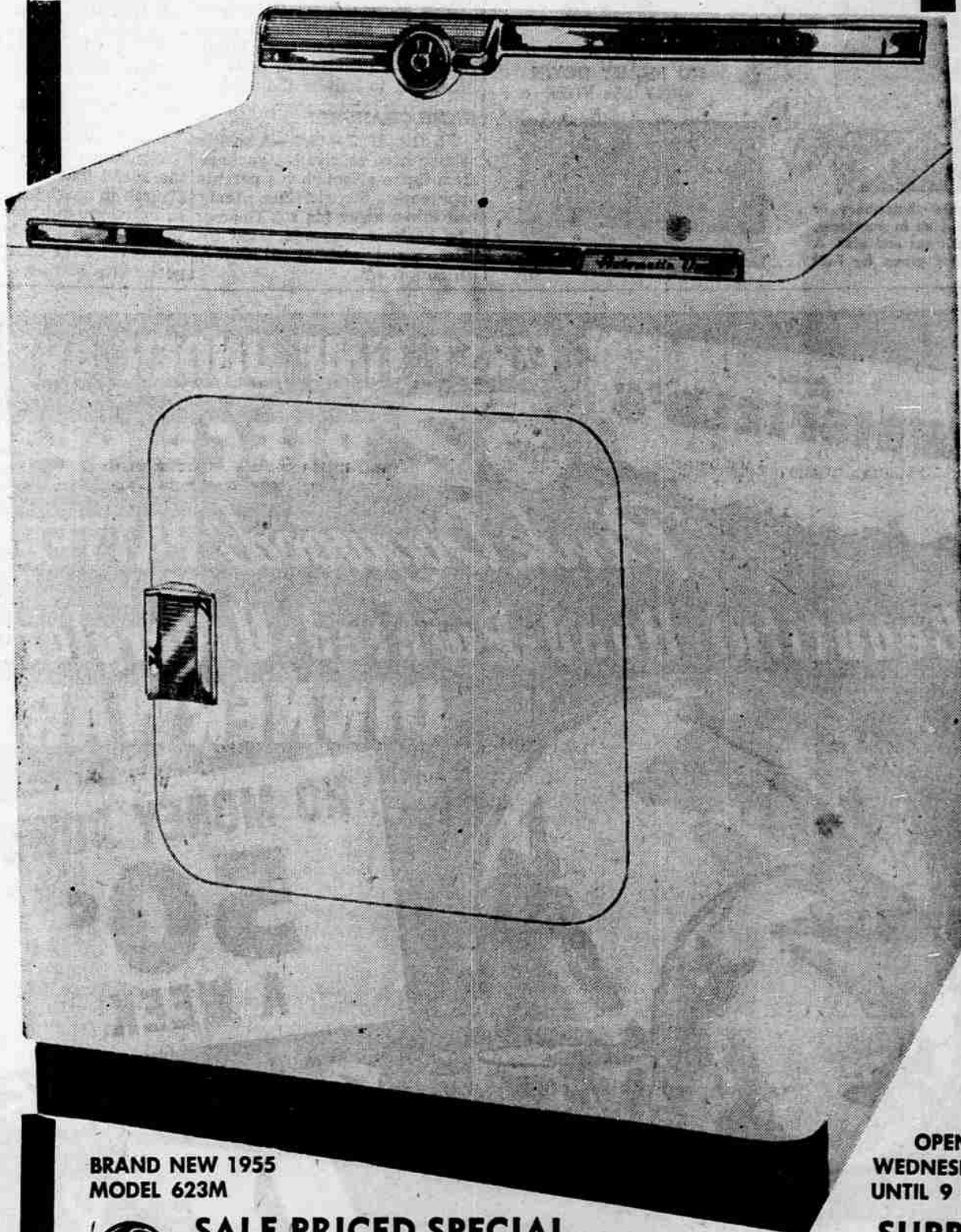
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
