

Supervisors Prepare Perfect Circle Plant For Return To Work

New Castle, Ind. — (U.P.) — Thirty supervisory employees, protected by 1,000 National Guardsmen and full martial law, entered the violence-torn Perfect Circle Corp. foundry today and prepared it for re-opening.

The troopers turned the small, three-story foundry into a fortress to prevent any demonstrations by striking CIO United Auto Workers and their sympathizers. The returning workers have to pass tanks and machine gun nests to get to their jobs.

The plant has been closed since last Wednesday, when nine persons were wounded, eight of them shot, in a pitched gun battle between 1,200 surging demonstrators and 100 non-strikers.

Plant To Re-Open
But it will be re-opened for limited production Wednesday under an order issued by Gov. George N. Craig Monday.

Craig, who has taken personal command in the crisis, imposed full martial law on New Castle and a surrounding two-county area containing 50,000 persons.

"There is no law against an employer operating his plant if he can and that right will be preserved by the military," Craig said. "Labor may use its economic force. They both will do

it now without further violence." UAW leaders have warned that a new crisis may boil up Wednesday when about 100 non-strikers go back to work here. Union members throughout Indiana are boiling mad, they said, and the union said it cannot be responsible for what happens if the plant re-opens.

The UAW also refused to join federal mediators in a negotiating session, saying they could not bargain "with bayonets and Sherman tanks at our backs."

Craig issued his order after failing to arrange a truce in the almost three-month dispute at the automobile piston ring company. About 250 UAW members went on strike at New Castle last July, and negotiations stalled and bitterness mounted over the union's closed union shop demand.

Gas Pipeline Blast Kills Two

Orleans, Ind. — (U.P.) — Two workers were killed and four were injured when a quarter of a mile of new gas pipeline exploded and burst into flames near here.

The blast occurred Monday when the new 16-inch line was cleaned, the last step before gas is piped.

Killed were Ralph E. Menser, 34, Owensboro, Ky., an employee of the Texas Gas Transmission Co. which laid the pipeline, and Steven W. Crawford, 35, Nashville, Tenn., a construction worker.

James L. Lawhorn, 30, Columbus, Ind., was blown over a building by the force of the explosion. He was hospitalized at nearby Paoli, Ind., with severe burns.

Also injured were Tom Conrad, Columbus, and Lester Harrington. Released after being treated for minor injuries was Louis C. Bradley, Minden, Ark.

Cause of the accident, which took several hours to bring under control, was undetermined.

DIES IN CAR WRECK

Umatilla — (U.P.) — William Hubbard, 23-year-old lone man, was killed last Sunday when his car left the highway 10 miles east of here, state police reported.

Jenkins Raps Power Policies, of Morse, Neuberger in Talk

Senators Wayne Morse (D-Ore.), and Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.), would prefer no power development at all to development of power by private industry, Frank Jenkins, editor and publisher of the Klamath Falls Herald and News said here yesterday.

Jenkins, who spoke before a luncheon meeting of Jackson County Republican women in the Jackson hotel, stated that federal power and agricultural subsidies were devices used by demagogues to win votes.

Speaking of Morse and Neuberger, Jenkins said, "I'm sure they would rather see southern Oregon be a desert than allow development of private power."

"Power developed in the Columbia basin will be used there," Jenkins said, "and if we need

power it must be developed here." He stressed southern Oregon has been waiting 40 years, without results, for federal power development.

Neuberger's statement that federal power could be produced for 2.2 mills per kilowatt hour is misleading, Jenkins said. That figure represented cost at the plant, rather than delivered to the people, and was possible only from a plant that operated tax free and had been built with public funds. Neuberger made the statement during a debate with U. S. Congressman Sam Coons (R-Ore.), in Klamath Falls, Thursday night.

The farm subsidy program has been injurious to southern Oregon livestock prices, according to Jenkins. Because those who buy livestock to be fattened, must pay high, subsidized prices for wheat and corn, they must pay less to farmers for livestock bought as feeders.

Of the six basic, subsidized crops, corn, cotton, wheat, rice, peanuts and tobacco, only wheat is produced in commercial quantities in this area, Jenkins pointed out.

U. S. Congressman Walter Judd (R-Minn.), gave a preliminary speech at the luncheon. The congressman stated that the Republican party has fulfilled all of its campaign promises except balancing the budget.

"The Republicans have cut taxes while increasing benefits to the public, the only time this has ever been done," Judd said.
