

Trabert Inks Lucrative Pro Contract

New York — (U.P.) — Billy Trabert said today the loss of Tony Trabert to the pro ranks means "the United States will have to start from scratch" in its efforts to recapture the Davis Cup from Australia.

The non-playing captain of the U. S. team pointed out, however, that next year's competition "could develop into a wide-open affair" if Aussie stars Lewis Hoad and Ken Rosewall follow Trabert into the pro game. Promoter Jack Kramer said Tuesday he expected Hoad and Rosewall to turn pro and Trabert indicated he also thinks they will.

Trabert, who won 10 tournaments and lost only three this year, signed the most lucrative contract ever given a tennis star to turn pro in Los Angeles Tuesday.

Only three of the starting lineup against the Mountaineers, Halfback Bill Rush, Fullback Don Korns, and Quarterback Bill Seymour, escaped without injury.

Halfback Ted Tenney and End Dick Smith suffered concussions in the EOCE game. Tackle Huey Smith sprained his ankle. Center Tom Quinowski and Halfback Ralph Clarno each have a pulled leg muscle. Guard Chuck Romine had to leave the Mountaineer contest with a severe charley

horse, End Hank Smith is suffering from a pinched nerve in his shoulder. End Walt McCoy has a large laceration on his nose. Four-Months-Old Girl Killed in Auto Wreck

Vancouver, Wash. — (U.P.) — A four-month-old Everett, Wash., girl was injured fatally last night in a three-car accident about 12 miles north of here on Highway 99, the state patrol reported.

The victim was Patricia Ann Trooper, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert B. Trooper. She and her mother were thrown out of the car in the accident. The mother, Juliet Trooper, and another daughter, Nancy, 2, were the only others injured, officers said.

State patrolmen said the Trooper car was southbound and was involved in a collision with a northbound truck driven by Robert B. Miller, 36, Portland. The Trooper car then struck another automobile driven by Frank J. Walsh, 57, Oswego, Ore.

Rain Cuts Fire Danger in Modoc

Alturas, Calif. — (U.P.) — Fire danger in the Modoc National forest has been halted by heavy rains in southern Oregon and northern California. More than 307,113 acres of land in the forest were denuded by blazes during one 18-day period last month.

Forest Service officials said the 436 fires reported in the forest during the first half of September 141,222 acres of timberland and 165,891 acres of grass and brush-covered watershed.

The blazes cost an estimated \$3,610,000 to control, and destroyed homes, buildings and equipment valued at \$14,000,000.

White House Social Schedule Cancelled

Washington — (U.P.) — The official White House social schedule definitely has been cancelled for the winter season because of President Eisenhower's illness.

From Denver, Mrs. Mary Jane McCaffree, Mrs. Eisenhower's social secretary, told the United Press she thinks "people will realize that the President and Mrs. Eisenhower won't be able to manage the usual social schedule."

McCaffree vetoed any possibility of Vice-President and Mrs. Richard M. Nixon's filling in at the traditional white tie and tails affairs. "It just isn't done," she said.
