A LICENSE TO PRACTICE

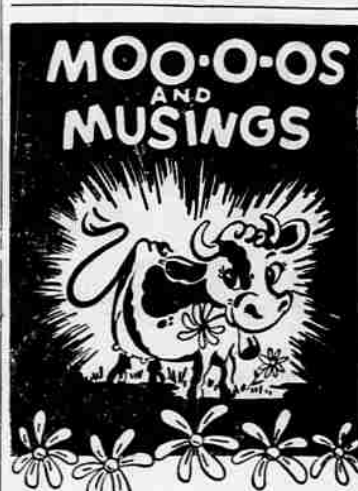

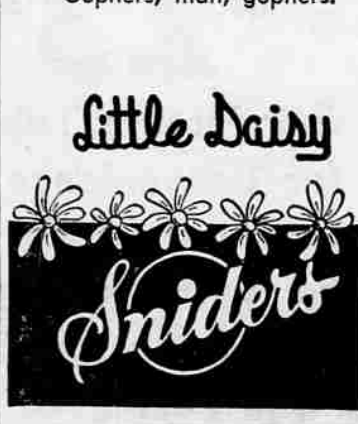

Corn Crop Figured at 3,117,739,000 Bushel

Washington—(U.P.)—The Agriculture department has estimated the 1955 corn crop at 3,117,739,000 bushels.



The corn forecast last month was 3,113,467,000 bushels. The Crop Reporting board estimated the 1955 wheat crop at 915,528,000 bushels including 689,403,000 bushels of winter wheat and 226,125,000 bushels of spring wheat.

The winter wheat estimate was the same as last month's when the crop was virtually harvested. The spring wheat estimate compares with last month's forecast of 272,373,000 bushels.

Last year farmers harvested 2,964,639,000 bushels of corn. Ten year average production was 3,080,115,000 bushels.

In dollar value, coffee still leads U. S. imports of all agricultural commodities despite a decline in coffee imports in 1953.
