Soviet Ideas Said 'Easily Reconcilable'

United Nations—(U.P.)—Western diplomats have said that Soviet ideas on an international control agency for President Eisenhower's atoms for peace program were "mild and easily reconcilable" with Western views.

Diplomats took this view even though Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister V. V. Kuznetsov made it clear Russia favored representation for Red China and Communist East Germany in the agency.

Despite this well placed warning, diplomats said Kuznetsov's speech to the Political committee yesterday, stripped of its propaganda, indicated the Kremlin's objections were not overwhelming and could be reconciled with Western ideas in negotiations.

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Supreme Court Decides on Water Rights

Salem—(U.P.)—A ditch dug in 1846 into which waters from two springs in Grant county drain gives the owners of the land on which the springs are located exclusive rights to the water, the Oregon Supreme Court has ruled.

William W. Gardner and Jessie Gardner brought suit in Grant county Circuit Court for an injunction to prevent G. W. Dollina, W. C. Elliott and Chester I. Elliott from using certain waters. The question involved was whether the springs were sources of certain creeks from which the defendants were entitled to draw water.

The Circuit Court ruled for the defendants, but that decision was reversed by the Supreme Court in an opinion by Justice Walter L. Tooze.

The springs drained into a ditch built in 1864, and not into the creeks, the high court found. After an exhaustive review of the evidence, the court said:

"Even assuming that the waters from the two springs were headwaters of Little Dog creek prior to 1864, yet with the construction of the Hillis ditch, they were entirely severed from the creek and thereafter flowed into the ditch and had no other channel or outlet for a period of approximately 90 years."

The high court held that the springs and waters therefrom belonged exclusively to the Gardners. In the absence of proof of actual damages resulting from the trespass of the defendants, the court said the Gardners would be entitled to nominal damages and awarded them \$100.

Russia Warns Iran On Baghdad Pact

Moscow—(U.P.)—Moscow has warned Iran that the Soviet government attaches "grave importance" to Iran's decision to join the pro-Western Baghdad pact.

Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov summoned the Iranian envoy in Moscow and protested to him that:

"The accession of Persia Iran to this military alignment is incompatible with the interests of consolidating peace and security in the region of the Middle and Near East."

Molotov added that Iranian accession to the pact "contradicts the good neighborly relations between Persia and the Soviet Union and certain treaty obligations of Persia."

Des Moines, Ia.—(U.P.)—Mrs. David Sanderson sent mimeographed letters to her neighbors, asking patience with her black Labrador pup, Casey, who was dragging home anything he could lay teeth to. "Thanks a lot for your patience with Casey and we hope that eventually he will be a nice sensible dog like the others on Adams," the letter said.

Salem—(U.P.)—Chief Justice Harold J. Warner of the Oregon Supreme Court has assigned Circuit Judge J. S. Bohannon of Tillamook to Lincoln county to try the case of Smith vs. Howells and others.

NO BRIDGE SPARKING

Sangerville, Me.—(U.P.)—For the first time in its 150-year history there is a ban on parking inside the covered bridge across the Piscataquis River. The prohibition isn't to clear the bridge for traffic, according to Town Manager Orville Carr. He said it's because "parkers" started fires in the wooden structure.

Beacon Falls, Conn.—(U.P.)—Firemen had only to open the door to put out an early morning fire. It was a newspaper delivery truck which drove up to the fire station.

Astoria—(U.P.)—The Coast Guard cutter Yacona has towed into port here a 75-foot barge which went adrift in heavy seas off the Oregon coast Sunday night.

PENNY TRIP
Cheboygan, Mich.—(U.P.)—Mrs. Arthur Martin, sixth grade English teacher at the Central School here, fined her pupils a penny for each mistake they made in grammar. But the pupils didn't mind. Before long there were enough pennies to purchase tickets for a 16-mile train ride to Mackinaw City. It was the first train ride for 28 members of the class.

At the request of the Tea Council, the Miner Laboratories, Chicago, Illinois, scientifically examined 31 different varieties of hot and cold beverages and computed the caloric content of each. As the following table shows, tea without additives has significantly less calories than any of the other popular drinks.
