Civic Music Director Arrives

Mrs. Helen C. Snyder, Galesburg, Ill., national field representative for the Civic Music association, arrived in Medford this week to administer the membership drive for the Jackson county chapter of the association. The campaign will open October 17 and close October 22.

Though the organization reached full membership last year and many persons' names were put on a waiting list, a certain amount of changes are made from year to year. The effort of local persons is needed to insure the necessary membership, officers point out.

Mrs. Snyder met Tuesday evening with the board of directors and special workers at the home of Beth Bullis. They discussed the campaign plans.

To assure availability of artists before too many bookings prohibit, the board has taken option with three groups. One is the Berliner Kammerorchester with Hans von Benda conducting, a group of about 26 strings and woodwind instruments. This group is tentatively listed for a November concert and is considered to be an outstanding event for music lovers.

Other options include a male chorus, and a violinist, the dates to be announced later with other artists selected at the close of the campaign week.
