New Try Made To End Phone Strike

San Francisco (U.P.)—Federal Conciliator Arthur Viat met again today with both sides in a new attempt to find some way of settling the telephone strike. The first round of talks between the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company and the CIO Communications Workers of America ended yesterday in apparent failure. "So far as the company is concerned, we're making no progress," said a PT&T spokesman. "We did not resolve any issues," said A. T. Jones, in charge of bargaining for the CWA. The strike began Monday morning when 22,000 operators, maintenance men, commercial and accounting employees left their jobs in Northern California and Nevada.

Actually, three unions are involved in the dispute. The CWA represents more than 17,000 operators and maintenance workers. More than 4,000 other employees are represented by the United Brotherhood of Telephone Workers of Northern California and Nevada. The CWA is demanding a \$3 to \$3.50 weekly raise for operators and \$4.50 or more for plant men. The union has offered from \$2.50 to \$4.50 but wants to maintain area and classification differentials.

KF Firm Enters Low Bid on Timber

Weyerhaeuser Timber company of Klamath Falls was low bidder on a tract of timber offered for sale by the Medford district of the Bureau of Land Management yesterday. Weyerhaeuser bid \$30 per thousand for Douglas fir, \$49.50 for ponderosa pine, and \$10.20 for white fir. The total bid of \$85,919.40 was the highest made by the five bidders who participated in the oral sale.

The tract, which contains an estimated 2,047,000 board feet, is located at the proposed Howard Prairie Reservoir site in Eastern Jackson county.

The next regular BLM sale in the Medford district Nov. 17 will consist of two tracts containing an estimated 7,116,000 board feet. One tract is located near Buck lake in western Klamath county and the other is near Wilderville in Josephine county. Further information concerning proposed sales may be obtained from the district forester's office in Medford city hall.
