Central Point — Crater high, back in the football win column after two successive setbacks, overran Illinois Valley 33 to 0 in a Rogue League and District 6 A-2 southern division encounter here on Friday.

Three touchdowns and two conversions gave the Comets a first quarter spread of 20 to 0. All 36 Crater players in uniform got into the game by the end of the first half. Score at midway point was 27 to 0.

First downs were few in the scuffle and favored Crater 7 to 3. The Comets netted 318 yards from scrimmage and Illinois Valley 104.

A pass, Mel Harsh to Juveland set up the first Crater touchdown, taking the ball from the IV 45 yard line to the 18. Five plays later Jack Lilly went across extra point. Then John Shama recovered an IV fumble on the from the four. Harsh ran the Cougar 21 and Don Goyette scooted over from that point. Harsh again converted.

Third score came after Don Goyette ran back a punt 44 yards to the Illinois Valley 26. Jack Lilly rambled the rest of the way. In the second stanza Crater

got deep in enemy territory when Duane Krout recovered a fumble on the 24. Three plays afterward Harsh fumbled on the 12. Illinois Valley got the ball but was forced to kick. A pass, Harsh to Gordon Tidwell, took the Comets to the 16. In a series of plays Lee Gossett went over from the seven and Harsh ran the conversion.

A poor Cougar punt gave Crater the ball on the IV 46 in the third quarter. A pass Harsh to Juveland got a touchdown.

Baylor Hands Washington First Loss 13-7

Seattle, Wash. — (U.P.) — The clutch passing and pile-driving smashes of third-string quarterback Bobby Jones Saturday gave Baylor a 13-7 victory over previously undefeated Washington before 42,000 football fans.

Jones powered into the end zone from six inches out just four seconds before the end of the first half to match a second-period Washington touchdown. And mid-way in the third period he passed to end Henry Greminger in the end zone for the second tally.

Record of 4-1

The loss was 12th ranked Washington's first in five games this season and it kept intact Texas' domination of Pacific Northwest football teams. Never in history has a team from this region defeated one from Texas.

Washington also scored from six inches out when quarterback Steve Roake dived over the line to climax a 43-yard drive that started when end Corky Lewis recovered Baylor halfback Del Shofner's fumble. Dean Derby's kick was good.

Klamath Falls Scores Late To Gain 13-13 Tie With Tornado

There's an intangible something which boosts Klamath morale to lofty heights whenever the Medford high school football team appears in Pelican town. For that reason the Modoc field jinx of the Black Tornado lingers on.

Ahead in yardage but behind on the scoreboard, the Klamath union high Whitebirds struck through the air in the final seconds Friday night to keep alive a 10-year hoodoo and gain a 13-13 deadlock with Medford's Tornado in one of the top chiller-thrillers in the long-time tradition.

Allen Drews kicked all five extra points plus one field goal Friday night when Grants Pass dumped Ashland 38 to 14 at Ashland in a Southern Oregon Conference grid mix. The Cavemen back, who has seen no contact work since injury in the GP season opener, booted the ball from the 29-yard line.

Grants Pass outgained Ashland 409 yards to 199 in the struggle and had 16 first downs to Ashland's five.

national rivalry between the Southern Oregon Conference schools. And, in the final analysis, the tie in their peak performance of the year may prove as good as a victory for the Pelicans.

A desperation 23-yard touchdown pass, Jerry Burke to Verland Kimpton, set into motion with 12 seconds left on the clock and completed with just six seconds left to go, erased a 13 to 7 Tornado lead and upset what seemed to be almost certain triumph. Kimpton snared the ball in the midst of three Tornado defenders.

That did not end the tension. Klamath still had a conversion try. But it fizzled when Reserve Donnie Shaw's center — snap struck the ground. The ball bounced into the arms of would-be kicker Larry Heaton. He tried to run but was nailed before he could reach goal.

The tie marked the fifth time in a row since 1945 that Medford has earned no better than a deadlock on Modoc turf. It was the second straight fray in which the Pelicans at home have risen in the fourth quarter to smother Medford aspirations. Klamath rallied to win 26 to 18 in 1953.

Spectacular football with long runs, desperate goal line stands, a field goal try which missed by inches was in keeping with the lively, vigorous Medford-Klamath rivalry throughout the years. The hassle found the charging Pelicans at their best this season. Medford matched, if not bettered, its previous efforts of the year.

All the scoring was on long runs or long passes. Halfback Lee McGill unleashed an 80-yard touchdown jaunt in the first quarter. Halfback John Bellack hurled a 29-yard TD pass to his Medford mate, Mike Hawkins, in the second quarter and Halfback Gary Riley erupted for a 41 yard touchdown journey in the third stanza.

Copple Attempts Kick Medford halted Klamath bids on its nine-yard and its 10, 12 and 24. Klamath stopped Tornado within a foot of pay off turf and on the 14 where End Larry Copple came so close on the kicking try.

When it was over Klamath Falls had the margin in yardage statistics, officially and unofficially, which can mean the difference in a committee vote should the Pels and Tornado knot for the District 6 A-1 diadem. Ernie Bishop's official count had 366 KF to 289 net Medford. Press tabulation gave Klamath 298, Medford 266.

McGill's long sprint to the Medford end zone occurred the second time Klamath got hold of the ball and on the Pelicans third scrimmage try of the game. The Pe. took over on their 20 after the punt by Medford's Larry Goyer went into the end zone. One buck by McGill gained little then he burst over the left side of the line broke loose and

ran down the left sideline to a goal. McGill also added the conversion kick for a 7 to 0 Klamath lead.

Host Retrieves Fumble

The Klamathites got another opportunity soon when Tackle Keith Cooper fell on a Medford fumble on the Tornado 24-yard line. Five plays took the Pels to the nine but two pass tries were incomplete and Medford took over on downs.

Medford battled out to its 48 aided by a 32-yard fake punt run by Fullback Goyer but two penalties and a loss, when Riley slipped while trying to pass, put the Tornado back on the 27. A quick kick by Goyer as the first quarter ended then set Klamath back to its 22. Klamath got out to the 32 but was put back to the 16 for clipping. The Pels then fought out to the 20 but Guard Monte Holst pounced on a fumble at that point and Medford had its first golden opportunity.

In five plays the Medfordites were a foot away from the zone stripe but Fullback Dave Bosworth was held for no gain on fourth down. Quarterback Kimpton kicked out immediately to the Medford 35 and Safetyman Riley got back to the 29. Medford couldn't be denied a touchdown. Bellack heaved to Hawkins, who was over the goal in a couple of strides. End Dick Copple's kick was wide to the right. Go To 14

Medford got another surge underway from its 39 the next time it seized possession of the pigskin.

The Hawkins to Bellack pass combination clicked for 26 yards to the Klamath 35. Bellack went over right tackle 15 yards to the 20. A motion penalty put the Medfords back to the 25 but Bellack got to the 16. Another movement infraction knocked the Tornado to the 21 but gains by Hawkins and Goyer reach the 14. On fourth down Copple made his second field goal try of the season. It was wide by about 3 foot, although high enough. Klamath took over on its 20.

Klamath marched from its 29 to the Medford 10 in the third quarter with one pass from the 12, with touchdown written on it, being knocked down by Riley. Medford took over but was in trouble again when Cooper made his second fumble recovery, this time on the 28. The Tornado held, nevertheless, setting the Pels back to the 43 and taking over on its 13 after Kimpton's kick.

Riley Sparkles

Five tries worked the ball to the 35 and Hawkins shook loose for a 24-yard run around left end to the Pel 41. Then came the most spectacular running play of the night. Riley with good blocking went round right end and swung to his left. He was hit repeatedly by KF tacklers but an unceremonious push by a teammate and his own hard, shifty running shook the half-back free and he made the whole distance to the goal to put Medford in front 12 to 7.

Copple's third thump from placement was good this time making the count 13 to 7. The third time ran out as Riley's run was being made.

In the fourth panel Medford held determinedly until the final fatal seconds. Klamath paced by hard-running Tom Ferrell, once reached the Tornado 12 where Riley recovered a fumble. Goyer punted out to the 50 and KF's Joe Linman ran back to the 36. The Pels got to the 24 where Holst knocked down a fourth down pass to halt the drive with slightly more than two minutes left.

Tornado Takes Heart

Medford worked slowly, hoping time would run out, and was assessed one motion penalty and one "too much time" offense but with about half-a-minute left when Goyer was forced to punt. About 12 seconds were on the clock when Burke went back to the throw to Kimpton and zipped the aerial through the Tornado defenders.

Medford's gridders, stung by having victory once more taken from their grasp, took heart Sat-

urday that they still have a chance for conference and district laurels. Coach Fred Spiegelberg expressed it for the squad by saying, "We're still ok." He indicated that the Tornado came through in good physical shape.

It was conceded that Klamath Falls had the edge in the spirited line play but that the Medfordites, with the hard running by Bellack, Riley and Hawkins and the kicking of Goyer, had the better balance in the backfield. Holst, Tackle Neil Plumley, End Mike Stearns and Guard and Linebacker Jack Gregory were front men who gave the Klamath offense rough moments and Riley was a stalwart backfield defender.

The 92-year-old, former owner-manager of the Philadelphia Athletics, suffered cuts of the nose and left index finger in the fall out of a Presbyterian Hospital bed Thursday night. No further damage was sustained to the hip, broken when Mack fell as he rose from bed after a nap in his apartment Oct. 1.

The latest tumble came while a private nurse left Mack's bed momentarily after taking precautions for his safety in her absence.
