

Girl Scout Training Class To Open Tuesday Morning

Rogue Valley Area Girl Scout council will conduct a 16-hour basic group leadership training course in each district of the council this month. The course will be given in the Medford district October 18, 20, 25 and 27 at St. Mark's Episcopal church Guild hall from 9:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. each day.

The training sessions will be conducted by Miss Mary Aldrich, executive director, assisted by volunteer trainers. These will be Mrs. Al Carrara, Mrs. W. H. Fisher and Mrs. George Ice, intermediate trainers, and Mrs. Maurice Ritchey and Mrs. Wilmer Warren, Brownie trainers.

This course is planned especially for new leaders and assistant leaders of Brownie, Intermediate and Senior Scout troops. Leaders are asked to take their handbooks which may be purchased at the official equipment agency at the J. C. Penney store. A notebook, pencil and a sack lunch should be taken to each session. Coffee will be served by the training committee.

Every new leader and assistant leader is required to attend two training sessions before she registers with her troop. The training committee recommends all four sessions for new leaders with less than one year's experience with a troop. The third session will cover the outdoor program and will be a cookout for both Brownie and Intermediate leaders. Troop leaders who have had more than one year's experience with a troop may attend any session if they would like some new ideas on badge program, Brownie program fields, games, songs, indoor or outdoor crafts, impromptu dramatics or ceremonies.

Interested adults over 18 years of age and mothers of girls in troops are invited to attend any one of the sessions to learn more about the Girl Scout and Brownie program so they can be of assistance to the troop leaders and help on the troop committees.

Through the course leaders gain the knowledge, skills and confidence they need to carry out the Girl Scout program with girls in their own troops, it is said. Help is included on the problems common to all leaders of girls' groups; how to start and develop program activities, how to get interesting people in the

community to share their hobbies with the girls, and how to develop good troop organization. This course affords opportunities for demonstrations, group participation, try-yourself crafts, group discussion, visual aids, films, observation and individual question and answer periods.

The Medford district includes all adult volunteers in the following schools: Washington, Lincoln, Jackson, Roosevelt, Jefferson; St. Mary's, McLoughlin and Hedrick Junior High schools; Medford Senior and Crater High schools; Jacksonville, Griffin Creek; Central Point, Phoenix, Shady Cove, Lone Pine, Howard, Oak Grove, Prospect and Gold Hill.

There is no training fee for the courses and those wishing further information on each session may call the Girl Scout office, 2-5912.

Rogue Valley Area Girl Scout council is a member agency of the United Medford crusade which provides funds for a year-round adult training program in the Medford district.

Stephen G. Cary, speaker for the American Friends Service committee, who has just returned from inside Russia and Siberia, will speak Friday, October 28 at the Presbyterian church at 8 p.m., as the first event in line with the theme.

With Mr. Cary on the recent trip were six men including business and professional persons. They were given unusual opportunities for seeing and conferring with the people while there, it is pointed out.

The speaker heads the American section of the AFSC and the trip which he and the other men made was an American Quaker goodwill mission.

Because they visited the outlying districts in Russia it is believed by those in charge that agricultural people of the Rogue valley especially may be interested, though the church women point out he should bring a message for all.

The following week on Friday, November 4 at St. Mark's Episcopal church the Medford council of women will observe World Community day. "Give us this day our daily bread," will be the theme of this session and Food and Agriculture organizations findings will be studied.

The FOA is an organization which was instituted during the latter part of World War II at Hot Springs, Va., where representatives of 44 nations came together to work toward feeding the undernourished people of the world.

Program chairman for the day will be Mrs. Wilbur Arnold. The business session will open at 10 a.m., and those who attend are to take a box lunch for the noon meal. Officers will be installed and a program and dedication of "Parcels for Peace," will be conducted in the afternoon.
