"I'm amazed at the partnership of husband and wife in America," Mrs. Rose Buckner said. "Why, American husbands even help their wives do dishes and there's not a thing wrong with it. England is a man's country, you know. We suit the husband first."

Mrs. Buckner said she believes English women may some day enjoy the same relationship with their husbands that American women do "but it'll take time."
