Protestants Demand Crucifix Removal

Highland, Ind. — (U.P.) — Protestant groups were ready to go to court today with demands that a 20-foot crucifix be removed from a Highland public park. The cross was dedicated Sunday at a ceremony attended by 4,500 persons of all faiths at Wicker Park despite Protestant

protests that "it is a symbol of the Roman Catholic Church." The greater Hammond Ministerial Association took the lead among the protesting organizations. The Rev. Allan Rice II, an association member, said "certain groups of citizens" will resort to court action unless the

cross is removed voluntarily. The cross was built by the Knights of Columbus, a Catholic organization, as a monument to veterans of all wars. Park Superintendent Stephen Grabovac said the American Legion and Boy and Girl Scouts helped in the dedication Sunday. Only "patriotic songs" were sung, he said, and "everything went very nice."

HUSBAND SHOULD LIMIT WEDDING EXPENSE OFFER

It is always easy to spend other people's money, but this is not fair.



(Q) "My husband is a divorced man. His former wife remarried and their daughter lives with her, but comes to see my husband whenever she can. She is now 23 years old and is planning to be married soon. She would like a nice wedding. Is it the father's place to accept all expenses? I think the mother should help pay them as most of the guests will be their friends. Should I attend the wedding, or would this cause an embarrassing situation?"—Mrs. F. H.

(A) I think your husband should decide how much he thinks he can afford to pay for his daughter's wedding, and give her this to use as she wishes. If it is not enough, then it would be up to her mother and stepfather to provide the rest.

Under no conditions should your husband underwrite whatever type of wedding his first wife wants, or he may find himself with bills that will literally bankrupt him. By setting a limit to what he will pay, he safeguards himself.

Your husband is no longer legally responsible for the support of his daughter. However, he certainly will want her to have a wedding that he can reasonably afford to give. He must also remember that there will be a present in addition to the wedding expenses.

As the daughter has been in your home, I think she would be hurt if you did not attend the wedding. After the ceremony, your husband will be glad to have you with him as he would feel somewhat out of things when his former wife's husband acts as host.
