\$900,000. Of this amount, 60 per cent is to be provided by the federal government and 40 per cent by the state. Jackson county would furnish the right of way and provide maintenance for the highway.

It was pointed out by County Commissioner Chester Wendt, however, that the 60 per cent provided by the federal government would come from the Jackson county secondary highway fund. This fund, which comes from the federal government, has been used in the past for repair and rebuilding of bridges.

The county received only \$64,000 per year for the secondary highway fund, according to Wendt, and paying that amount per year would mean that the proposed Klamath Falls highway would take about eight years to complete.

Fire Arms Course Slated for Police

A two-day fire arms course for law enforcement officials from the Rogue valley area will start at the National Guard rifle range on Antelope rd. tomorrow.

Medford Police Chief Charles Champlin will conduct the course, which will follow Federal Bureau of Investigation instructions for handling fire arms.

This is the second fire arms school held this year, and Chief Champlin said the school would be conducted on a semi-annual basis in the future. The past two years, the school has been on an annual basis, prior to which there was no fire arms course in this area.

About 40 law enforcement officials from Medford police, Jackson county sheriff's deputies, Grants Pass, Ashland, and other cities throughout the valley are expected to participate in the course.

Corvallis — (U.P.) — Six University of Oregon students were arrested here early today after Oregon State college campus police found "UO" burned on the Parker Stadium turf.

Scientists Revise Theory of Elements

Delaware, O. — (U.P.) — A scientist at Perkins Observatory near here has collected data tending to revise the belief that many common elements were around at the birth of the universe.

Dr. Geoffrey Keller, director of the observatory which is operated jointly by Ohio State University, and Ohio Wesleyan University, said a colleague, Dr. Philip C. Keenan has piled up considerable evidence backing the new concept.

Included among the elements now thought to have been formed since the beginning of the universe five billion years ago are lead, iron, strontium and barium.

The earlier belief, Dr. Keller said, was that all matter in the universe was combined into an enormous ball at its origin. The ball was thought to have expanded rapidly from internal pressure, thereby filling the universe with its material.

As the process proceeded, the nuclei of heavier elements were believed to have been created when neutrons were added to lighter nuclei.

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Woman Drives 5 Miles With Bullet in Back

Portland — (U.P.) — A 47-year-old woman drove nearly five miles with a bullet in her back to seek help after being shot by an unidentified assailant, county police said today.

Miss Mary Lucille Gerber, of Troutdale, told Deputies Bill Hewitt and Bill Bradbury she was in her car parked in the driveway of her home yesterday afternoon when one of three men going east fired at her car. The bullet went through the trunk, seats, and entered her right shoulder.

Miss Gerber drove to the Sandy River lodge at Troutdale for help and was rushed to a Portland hospital where her condition was reported today as fair.

Hewitt said Miss Gerber told him she had been harassed several days ago by three men and she believed those were the same ones who fired at her car. He said the bullet was fired from a high powered rifle.
