Los Angeles — (U.P.) — Southern California has taken over the team offensive leadership while UCLA has maintained its defensive leadership, Pacific Coast conference statistics showed today.

Southern California's total offense average per game is 326.8 yards a game. Behind the Trojans are Stanford 319, UCLA 301.2 and Oregon 278.2.

The tough UCLA defense has yielded an average of 209 yards a game to opponents. Washington's average is 211 while other leading defensive teams are Southern California with a 247.6 average and Oregon 264.6.

The Trojans lead in rushing offense, piling up 223.8 yards per contest. Oregon is second with a 210.8 yard average on the ground. UCLA ranks third with its 203.6 yard average. Stanford heads in Air.

In the air, Stanford is the No. 1 PCC team with a 129.6 yard game average. Following the Indians are Idaho 108.2 and California 107.

UCLA is the toughest rushing defense team. The Bruins have yielded an average of only 124.2 yards per game by rushing. Washington's ground yard average is 135 yards. Oregon is the tightest PCC team when it comes to giving up yards through the air. Its game average in that department is 70.8 yards.

Other department leaders are: Interceptions: Washington State, 10 for 110 yards; punting: Oregon State, 26 for a 37.4 average; punt returns: Southern California, 18 for a 17.4 yard average; Kickoff returns: 14 for a 24.9 yard average.

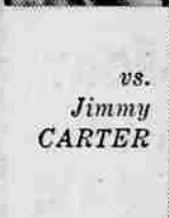

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CARTER CHOICE OVER SMITH IN LIGHTWEIGHT TOGA MIX

Cincinnati, O. — (U.P.) — Shufflin' Jimmy Carter, who pops in and out of the world lightweight championship like a jack-in-the-box is an 8-5 favorite to win the title for the fourth time tonight in a return bout against Cincinnati's Wallace (Bud) Smith.

Smith, 26, will be making his first defense of the 135-pound crown since he won it from hard-to-figure Carter at Boston on June 29 on a split decision.

Their 15-round bout at Cincinnati garden will be televised and broadcast nationally over ABC networks at 10 p.m. (EDT).

Narrow Margin

Carter, 31, is favored because he lost the title to Smith in June by the narrowest possible mar-

gin of a single point. And because he recaptured the crown on other occasions in return bouts with Lauro Salas and Paddy DeMarco.

Carter who suffered a deep gash on his right brow at Boston, had his hopes boosted by the Cincinnati Boxing commission, which agreed that the fight will not be stopped because of cuts.

Tonight's engagement is not only a return title fight, but their third and "rubber match." Each holds a victory. Carter won a decision over Smith at Cincinnati on May 28, 1950.

That was before Jimmy first became champion by belting out Ike Williams on May 23, 1951.

Pheasant, Duck Hunting Seasons Begin October 22; Good Populations Indicated

Portland — Scattered gun devotees will have their day on Oct. 22, for on that date waterfowl and upland bird gunning will get under way throughout the state of Oregon.

Guns can look for another good season with surveys indicating population increases with most species of waterfowl and a stable population of pheasants, quail, and partridges throughout the upland game bird habitat.

In eastern Oregon, the season will be open for pheasants, quail and Hungarian partridge extending through Nov. 13. In western Oregon, the season will be open for pheasants, valley and bobwhite quail extending through Nov. 13 except in Clatsop and Marion counties where the season on quail will remain closed.

Bag limits on pheasants will be four cocks per day, 12 in possession. In eastern Oregon, the bag limit on quail and partridge will be 10 per day in the aggregate, 20 in possession. West of the Cascades the bag limit on quail will be five per day in the aggregate, 10 in possession.

Ducks Through January The waterfowl season will extend from Oct. 22 through Jan. 9 for all species of ducks and geese except brant where the season will be from Dec. 1 through Feb. 10. The jacksnipe season will extend from Nov. 27 through Dec. 11.

Daily bag limits for ducks remain at nine, 15 in possession, providing such daily bag or possession limit contains not less than three widgeons or pintails. One wood duck and one hooded merganser will be allowed in the daily bag limit.

Bag limit for geese is six daily or in possession, providing not more than three are of the dark species. In Yamhill, Polk, Benton, Linn, and Lane counties no more than two Canada geese may be allowed in the bag limit.

Other bag limits are three brant daily or in possession, eight jacksnipe daily or in possession, and 25 coot daily or in possession.

Turpin Retires After Knockout

London — (U.P.) — Former middleweight champion Randy Turpin, who craved a shot at the light-heavyweight title, retired from boxing today as a result of a four-round knockout at the hands of Gordon Wallace of Ontario, Canada.

Wallace stunned a huge crowd at Harringay arena Tuesday night by flooring Turpin, the man who once beat Sugar Ray Robinson, four times — the last time for the full count. Wallace was down once.

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Ralph Kiner Padre Pilot

San Diego — (U.P.) — Ralph Kiner veteran major leaguer and former home run king, was named general manager of the Pacific Coast League San Diego Padres yesterday.

Kiner's appointment was announced by James B. Lane, president of Westgate-California Tuna Packing Co., new owner of the Padres.

Kiner, who completed his 10th year in the majors this year, had a lifetime batting average of .279. He hit 369 home runs. Prior to joining the Cleveland Indians during the late summer of 1954, Kiner played with Chicago and Pittsburgh of the National League.

His salary at the new post was reported to be \$25,000.

Trout Grow Well At Diamond Lake

Portland — Surveys conducted at Diamond lake by game commission personnel show that the yearling rainbow trout planted in June have made excellent growth.

Samples of fish obtained in late September ranged in size from 6¼ to 12¾ inches, a gain averaging 4½ inches in the three-month period. All trout examined were in excellent condition, deep bodied and fat.

The survey also disclosed satisfactory growth and survival of the 350,000 rainbow fry released in August. Small trout, 2 to 2½ inches in length were noted in abundance in shallow areas.

Bottom samples taken at the same time of the survey show a satisfactory regrowth of aquatic vegetation and fish food organisms.

Diamond lake was treated with rotenone in the fall of 1954 to rid the lake of a tremendous population of roach which had infested the lake to the detriment of the trout fishery. It is anticipated that excellent fishing will be available in 1956 although the fish will not have reached the large size formerly found in Diamond lake.

Portland — (U.P.) — A group of athletes at Lewis and Clark college, including several members of the Pioneer football team are taking a course in ballet dancing and officials agreed today that the help in coordination offsets the ribbing the players take.

Black Tornado Will Aim To Stop Eureka Logger Win Streak at 16

It will be 1954's situation in reverse plus a bit of coaching rivalry involved Friday night when Medford high's Black Tornado opposes the Eureka, Calif., high football aggregation here.

Last season Medford went to Humboldt county riding the crest of a six-game unbeaten streak and rated No. 1 Oregon prep team. That gave the Loggers something to work for in the way of prestige and the Eureka responded with a 12 to 7 verdict in the mud at Arcata.

This year Medford is an also-ran in the ratings while the Californians are rumbling along with 16 straight triumphs behind them, five this year. It'll be Medford facing a high-riding club this time and it is hoped the desire to bust the Logger win string will provide incentive for a Tornado decision after two successive losses to Eureka.

The Friday scuffle matches teams coached by former college teammates. Dick Renfro of Eureka was a back and Fred Spiegelberg of Medford was an end at Oregon State college. Renfro, with three or four seasons with the San Francisco Forty-Niners behind him, is successor to Jay Willard who last season finished 27 years at the Logger helm. Six Lettermen

Six lettermen and junior varsity graduates make up the Eureka squad this year. Despite the lack of veterans the Loggers have continued the success of the 1954 club which won all 10 of its conflicts. The 16-game string began with victory in the last contest of the 1953 season.

Eureka started out with a 20 to 13 decision over its alumni this fall. Other triumphs were 32 to 12 over Fortuna, 30 to 13 over Arcata and 39 to 6 and 25 to 6 over Del Norte (Crescent City). Other tutors of the area attribute Eureka's success a lot to

a "tremendous" job of coaching by Renfro. In addition to that factor there has been the fine passing and field generalship of Quarterback Richie Mayo, the running of an assortment of good backs and the work of a line which includes three 200-pounders.

Jerry Winters, an end weighing 210, is Mayo's favorite aerial target. Tackles are Tiny Hubler, weighing 248, and Gene
