

Capitol Planners Study Methods of Mall Development

Salem — (U.P.)—The Capitol Planning Commission met with its advisory committee of architects and landscape architects for the first time here yesterday and two methods of attaining a master plan for development of the Capitol Mall were suggested:

1. Professor Fred A. Cuthbert, Eugene, suggested the commission offer "1000 or 2000" to groups of architects in various parts of the state for "sketch" plans from which the commission would be developed into a fully-detailed master plan before submission to the State Board of Control.

2. Commission chairman Robert W. Sawyer of Bend and Gov. Paul Patterson suggested that Robert W. Keally, New York architect who designed Oregon's present capitol building, be hired in an advisory capacity. He would work with whatever Oregon architects and landscapers were retained to develop a master plan, the theory being that, since Keally designed the capitol, he had an overall concept of how the mall area should be developed.

It was decided at the meeting to split members of the advisory committee into three groups—Portland area architects, Eugene area architects and landscape architects. Each group would study what it considered the best method of developing the mall. Written reports will be submitted to the commission by Dec. 1.

Included in the development program will be erection of subsequent buildings within the mall area, landscaping and integration of mall traffic with the city's one-way traffic grid.

Council Authorizes Study of Berrydale Sanitary Problems

City Manager Robert Duff was authorized by the city council last night to study and submit a report on three possibilities to help solve an adverse sanitary condition in the Berrydale area.

The three possibilities are revision of the present contract with Medford, a new contract or annexation. Duff's report will be submitted to the planning commission prior to council consideration.

Berrydale Sanitary district officials have requested a new contract because the district is now able to finance construction of a sewer system. Ervin B. Hogan, attorney representing the district, said a new contract would verify the present contract and set up new rates.

The present contract, he said, is not clear as to whether it covers the entire district or that area which is now served by one 12-inch sewer line. The line serves about 20 residents, and about 375 connections would be required if the entire district were served.

Hogan pointed out that residents in the area are anxious to proceed with construction because there is a "serious health problem out there."

Duff also was authorized to study a request from residents in the Kenwood-Grandview area for a proposed sanitary district. A report of the study will be submitted to the planning commission prior to presentation before the council.

In other action last night, the council adopted an ordinance creating an emergency fund expenditure of \$110.50 for the city's share in participating in acquisition of a mobile radio unit for civil defense purposes.

Another ordinance accepting Park st. paving project was adopted. Park st. was paved between Stewart ave. and Catherine st.

The council authorized expenditure of \$212.25 for the city's share of construction of a storm sewer on Fair Oak dr. A contractor is building the subdivision and road, and finances half

the cost of laying a storm sewer. Funds are available in the storm sewer fund for the city's share.

An ordinance was adopted calling a public hearing Nov. 1 on vacation of alley in the Crowell addition. Vacation was recommended by the planning commission.

Tropical Goldfish Found in Ochoco Creek
