

Tornado Hands Loggers First Loss In 17 Games, 20 To 14

It wasn't a district fracas. There were no conference laurels at stake. But there was satisfaction aplenty in retrospect as the Medford high football Black Tornado looked back today on its 20 to 14 Friday victory over the potent Eureka, Calif., Loggers.

For the Tornado had ended a three-year drought in contention with its traditional California opponent and had turned back a team recognized as the best in recent years in the Humboldt bay city. Medford's first decision since 1951 over the Eureka eleven broke at 16 straight a Logger winning streak begun in 1953. The Loggers came to Medford after five impressive wins over California foes this year.

Medford record against the north Cal Coast powerhouse now stands at 18 victories, six setbacks and one tie.

First TD Decider

A Tornado touchdown drive off the opening kick-off was the deciding factor in the "hang on to your seats" skirmish at the local stadium. The home club outcharged and outplayed the Loggers with a sometimes grinding, sometimes explosive ground attack in the over all picture. But Eureka was a never-say-die bunch and a constant threat all the way. The Loggers matched Medford touchdown for touchdown in the final quarter and were still striving at the finish.

A touchdown pass, Quarterback Dick McLaughlin to Halfback Gary Riley, capped the Tornado's opening 62-yard drive. After End Dick Coppie's kicked conversion the score stood 7 to 0 until Fullback Larry Guber punched over for a 13 to 0 lead in the closing stanza.

Eureka responded with the help of a fumble recovery and pass interference penalty. Halfback Wade Hammond smashed over the goal and Fullback Errol Scott added the extra for a 13 to 7 score. Four scrimmage plays later Medford had its third TD in a 40-yard gallop by Halfback John Bellack. Coppie booted the bonus for a 20 to 7 score.

Take to Air

The Californian's took to the air in the final moments. Three out of six aerial heaves connected, one for 23 yards and a score with eight seconds left on the clock. The toss was Quarterback Richie Mayo to huge End Jerry Winters and again Scott booted over the point.

With the Medford offensive line playing solid and booming ball from end to end and with hard-running backs Mike Hawkins, Bellack and Guber reeling off good gains, the Tornado rolled up 280 yards net to Eureka's 148. And tough, rock defense yielded few long gains to the Loggers.

Mayo and Scott were the offensive guns for the Cal eleven. Scott, a 195-pounder, caught Medford off-balance several times with crossbucks to the left. But the passing of Mayo provided the greatest potential scoring danger. He tossed the ball 23 times. Medford's defense was equal to the task most of the time but Mayo recorded seven completions for 83 yards.

Eureka Lives

The visitors didn't really catch fire until the second quarter when they generated a drive from their own nine-yard line to the Tornado six. Eureka controlled the ball and had Medford on the defensive quite a bit of the second half, driving once to the Tornado 22 and once reaching the 17. However, Medford, gauging ground in larger chunks, still maintained the edge in yardage.

Two lost fumbles and one of two pass interceptions spoiled Tornado chances for a perhaps more decisive win.

Ganging tactics by the Tornado stopped Eureka ball carriers time again with Tackle Neil Plumley, Guards Bob Apple and Monte Holst, Linebackers Jack Gregory and McLaughlin and Backs Riley and Hawley in on a big share of the tackles.

12 Plays Needed

Medford surged down the field from its own 38-yard line in 12 plays for its first touchdown. The ball squirted from Riley's grasp after he reached into the end zone but Coppie and Holst pounced on the pigskin to prevent any doubts of a TD.

Coppie's first conversion try from placement was blocked but Eureka was offside. The flankman made good on the second chance and Medford was on top 7 to 0.

That ended all successful goalward drives until Medford began rolling late in the third quarter. Medford got to the Eureka 25 in the second stanza but an offside penalty and pass interception

stemmed the drive. The Loggers then launched a big threat, grinding out the yards on the ground until the Tornado applied the stopper on the home club's 26.

Eureka sallied to the Medford 22 after the midway kick off and Medford held on downs. The Tornado fought back to Logger 35 with one 28-yard run by Hawkins. There Spenser Van Dusen scooped up a Medford muff and got to the Tornado 40 before being halted by Riley and Holst. The Loggers got to the 17 where two passes failed to connect. Linebacker Gregory and Backs Hawley and Francis combined to prevent a completion in the end zone.

Daring Gamble

Then the push to Medford's second TD began. It took 10 plays to go the 83 yards. The touchdown might not have been but for a daring gamble that paid off. Three plays had got the Tornado only to the 26 with one yard to go for a first down. Fullback Guber came in to punt but he didn't drop back. He was called on to run instead and boomed with the ball and the Tornado had a first down with yards to spare on the 30.

Hawkins broke loose on a double reverse as the fourth period opened and skirted left end 40 yards to the Eureka 30. Two plays later on a similar try Mike got to the 15. Guber smashed the middle to the three and then banged through the center for the TD.

Coppie had three tries at the extra point. His first was wide but Eureka was offside. The next was good but both clubs jumped the gun. End Jerry Winters blocked the third attempt but Medford still had a 13 to 0 advantage.

A fumble recovery on the Medford 37 and a pass interference infraction on the Tornado, which put the ball on the 17, helped Eureka in getting its first score. Eleven and five-yard punches by 195-pound Fullback Errol Scott

Bulldog 9th 20-7 Victor Over KF Club

McLoughlin junior high ninth grade gridders capitalized on two pass interceptions and a kick-off runback here Saturday afternoon to drub Klamath Falls 20 to 7.

The Medford club had a 6 to 0 advantage at the half and the rest of the scoring was in the third quarter. Gerry Lyons was the ball totter on all of the Bulldog touchdowns.

Lyons intercepted a pass and ran 30 yards to the goal in the first period. He got some fine blocking on the second half kick-off and ran it black 70 yards for a TD. Bill Wallace set up the third Mac touchdown, intercepting a pass and running 30 yards to the Pelican five. Lyons ran it from there. Mike Murray kicked the conversion after the both third quarter scores.

Klamath Goes 80

Klamath retaliated with an 80-yard return for a TD on the Bulldog kick-off. The extra point was kicked.

First downs favored the McLoughlin team 13 to five while the net yardage was in the Medford team's favor 237 to 81.

The Bulldogs played a particularly fired up game in the second half. Coaches Mel Boldenow and Bill Shepherd reported that the locals turned in a defensively good job and that the offense went good at times. The Pelicans were set back for minus yardage in the fourth quarter.

Bellack Goes 40

Francis's 30-yard kick-off run-back to the Medford 42 opened a drive which earned the Tornado its third touchdown in short order. A seven-yard thrust by Fullback Dave Bosworth, a six-yard gain by Bellack and a five-yard smash by Guber carried the Medfordites to the Logger 40.

Bellack spurred over right tackle, cutback nicely to his left and ran the distance to the goal. This time Coppie had only one conversion try and made good for the 20 to 7 spread.

The Loggers took over on their 40 after the kick-off and one play lost to the 32. A pass went incomplete but Scott broke free for his longest run of the night, 23 yards to the Medford 45. A throw failed but another from Mayo to Scott connected for 20 yards to the 25. Mayo passed to Halfback Fred Whitmore for two yards. A heave to Winters was unsuccessful but Mayo threw again to Winters who caught the ball in the end zone.

His runs of 18, 28, 50 and 15 yards and a number of shorter gains made Hawkins Medford's leading ball carrier of the night. Medford next preps for Ashland in District 6 A-1 play. The Grizzlies lost 26 to 13 to Crater on Friday.

An outstanding welterweight—Ramon Fuentes, Virgil Akins or Don Jordan — will be the December opponent unless the TV sponsors demand a return match.

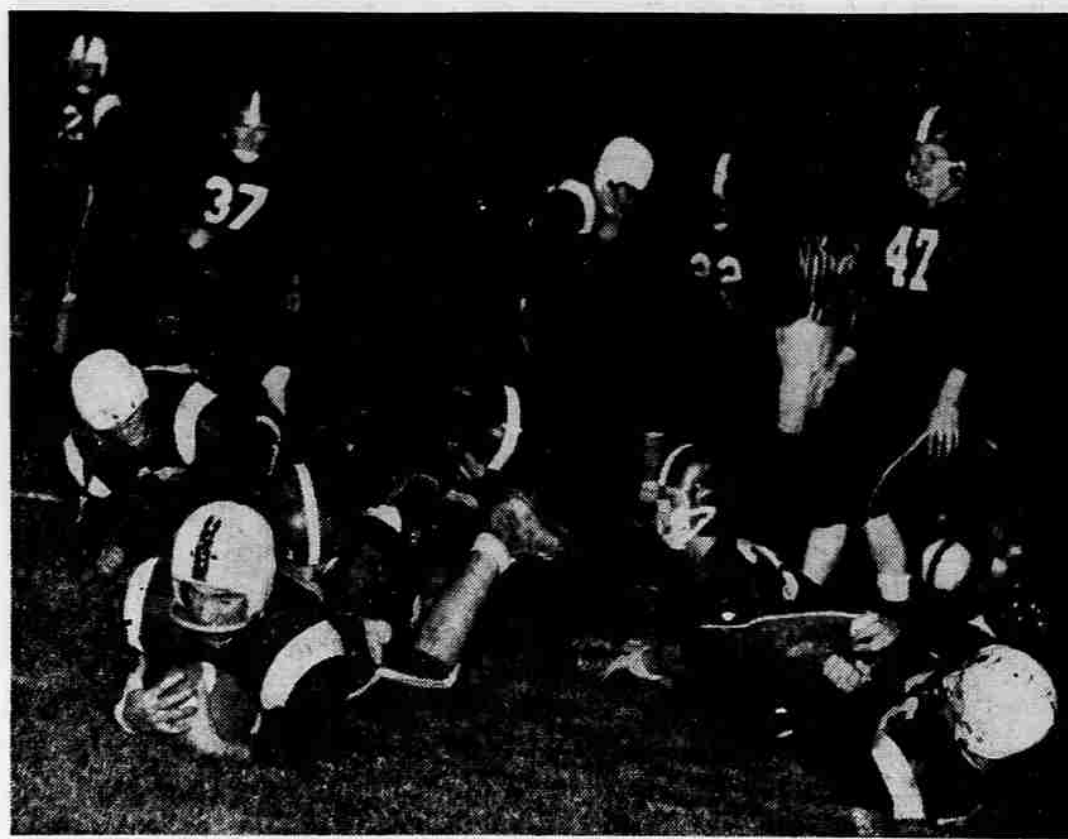
Logart, 22, and ranked ninth among welter contenders, won a unanimous 10-round decision over Turner of Philadelphia, a 10th-ranking middleweight, before 2,500 in their nationally televised and broadcast fight. It was Isaac's first Garden main event.

Turner, 25, out-weighted Logart by 5½ pounds. Gil registered 152½, Logart, 147. It was Turner's heaviest poundage in six months but Manager Georgia Katz said he needed that weight for strength, and he would not permit a return fight if the Logart camp demanded that Gil pare down.

UCLA Hands UI Hawkeyes 33-13 Defeat

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — Sam (First Down) Brown, filtering through the line like a ghost, raced to three touchdowns Friday night as UCLA scored a 33-13 victory over Iowa before 75,692 fans at the Memorial coliseum.

The Hawkeyes, already crippled, lost the service of their All America guard candidate, Calvin Jones, who suffered a knee injury this week in practice. But quarterback Jerry Reichow proved on outstanding performer for Iowa with his brilliant keep plays.

Long Runs

The game featured long runs on both sides, Brown returning a punt 67 yards for a score and Iowa's Eddie Vincent breaking loose for 70 yards—but the Hawkeyes failed to score following the run.

UCLA scored two of its touchdowns after breaks, one off a pass interception and the other a recovered fumble deep in Iowa territory. The Hawkeyes scored their second touchdown in the final minute of play.

The game reached a thrilling climax when UCLA's sensational passer, Ronnie Knox, in the final 16 seconds of play, completed a 75-yard pass play to end Hal Smith for UCLA's fifth touchdown.

In other major college games Friday night, Marquette invaded Boston as a two touchdown underdog against Boston college and knocked the Eagles from the perfect record ranks by gaining a 13-13 tie.

Texas Christian's Horned Frogs turned back Miami, 21 to 19, behind the passing of quarterback Charlie Curtis in the Orange bowl.

Billy Russell's third period touchdown carried Detroit to a 7-0 victory over Oklahoma A and M in a Missouri Valley conference game, while quarterback Jimmy Bowen hurled three scoring passes in leading Denver to a 33-0 Skyline conference win over Brigham Young.

Rooks, Frosh Deadlock 7-7

Corvallis — (U.P.) — Herb Juran fired a pass to Ron Stover with 12 seconds to play Friday to enable the Oregon Frosh to tie the Oregon State Rooks 7-7 in their opening football game before 3,000 fans yesterday.

Juran, an ex South Salem star, kicked the extra point and the Rooks had time only to return the kickoff before the gun sounded.

Oregon State's young Beavers scored in the second quarter when two old prep rivals teamed up on a 44-yard pass and run play. Tony Arana of Vale shot a 12-yard pass to Duane Marshall of St. Helens, who ran the rest of the 32 yards. Arana ran around right end for the extra point.

The game saw 115 yards to penalties against the Rooks and 70 against the Frosh. The Rooks tried only three passes, completing one, while the Frosh hit 7 out of 18 with Juran doing most of the throwing.

Kansas City, Mo. — (U.P.) — The governing body of the National Collegiate Athletic association will meet at Chicago beginning today with a report by the committee on infractions on schedule.

The four man committee, headed by Frank N. Gardner of Drake university, serves as a fact-finding agency for the NCAA council and investigates cases of rules violations.

Walter Byers, NCAA executive director, declined to say whether the committee would have reports to make on any possible violations.

Another top matter on the agenda is a report on possible eligibility problems resulting from college athletes' participation in the 1956 Olympic games.

The council meeting is to begin this afternoon and continue through Tuesday noon. C. P. Houston, NCAA president from Tufts college, will preside.

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Oregon State Converts Two Fumbles Into TD's For Win

Corvallis, Ore. — (U.P.) — Oregon State converted two Washington State fumbles into first half touchdowns to defeat the Cougars, 14-6, at Parker field Saturday in a Pacific Coast conference football game.

It was Oregon State's homecoming and 17,000 fans watched the tight battle under warm, sunny skies.

Washington State found the spark after the intermission and drove to a third quarter touchdown. The Cougars threatened three other times but were held each time, once on the two-yard line.

Runs Nullified

Oregon State's Joe Francis supplied the spectators with the game's biggest thrill when he scampered 80 yards from the Oregon State five in the second period. His spectacular run went for nothing, however, as the ball was called back by an interference penalty against the Beavers.

The Cougars also had a thrilling play nullified by a penalty. It was a 60-yard pass from quarterback Bob Iverson to end Pete Toomey which was called back by an unsportsmanlike conduct penalty.

Fumbles proved Washington State's undoing. The first miscue came in the first quarter shortly after the game opened. Fullback Bill Kramer bobbled the ball on the Cougar 25 and Oregon State guard Bob Riggert recovered. Francis smashed over from the one-yard line. Ted Searle added the extra point.

Second Fumble

Another fumble by Kramer set up Oregon State's second touchdown. This one came later in the first quarter at midfield

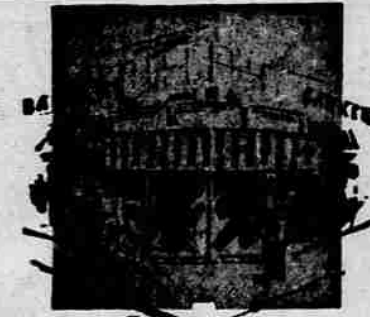
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
