Bank Debits Show Increase in Area

Eugene—The Southern Oregon banking district, which includes Medford, Grants Pass and Ashland, reported a 19.6 per cent increase in bank debits in September, 1955, over the September, 1954 total.

This increase was the second highest in the state. The Upper Willamette Valley district, which includes Albany and Corvallis, reported the highest gain, 20.4 per cent. The Southern Oregon district September total was \$71,395,619 and the September, 1954 total was \$59,693,070.

Bank debits represent the dollar value of checks drawn against the deposit accounts of individuals and business firms. Bank debits are regarded as good indicators of current business activity, and are collected monthly by the University of Oregon bureau of business research from 150 banks and branches throughout Oregon.
