Snowfall Brings Sign of Winter

The first wintry weather of the season swept across the nation's midsection today, complete with zero temperatures and four-inch snowfalls.

The huge mass of cold Canadian air drove from the Dakotas deep into the Texas Panhandle. Indian summer weather gave way to below freezing temperatures almost in a twinkling over vast areas.

At Fraser, Colo., the first zero reading of the season was registered early this morning. Leadville, Colo., had four inches of snow. Denver almost three, and International Falls, Minn., one.

More snow fell in parts of Wyoming, Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa and Wisconsin. A hard freeze was predicted for areas in Iowa, Kansas, and Nebraska, and it was below freezing from the Western Plains to the Texas Panhandle and eastward to the upper Mississippi and central Missouri Valleys.

Reclamation Group Differs With Report

Lincoln, Neb. — (U.P.) — The board of directors of the National Reclamation Association and the association's Water Policy Committee were on record as sharply disagreeing with the Hoover Commission report on reclamation today as the association's annual convention opened here.

The directors and the committee met here yesterday to complete work on the committee's report, which will be presented to the 24th annual convention.

The Hoover Commission, said the Water Policy Committee, implied "that reclamation is an unjustified subsidy shouldered by the nation's taxpayers."

Reclamation costs, the committee said, are "being diligently repaid" by water users, and by power revenues. The committee report also cited increased tax revenue from reclaimed land.

PUC Opens Hearing On Portland Traction

Portland — (U.P.) — Another Public Utilities Commission hearing into the Portland Traction Company's reduction of service to Oregon City and intermediate points opened today in the state office building here.

Several individuals and groups have complained to the PUC over lack of service. The traction company said the reduction was needed to save losses caused by lack of patronage.

A hearing on the matter was held last week at Oak Grove, where some 40 witnesses appeared to protest service cuts.

Influenzal Meningitis Fatal to Portland Boy

Portland — (U.P.) — Two-year-old Brent William Purcell, son of Portland detective Lt. Bard Purcell, died Saturday at a Portland hospital following an attack of influenzal meningitis.

The boy, who would have been three years old next month, was admitted to the hospital Thursday. Portland Police Chief Jim Purcell Jr., was the boy's uncle.

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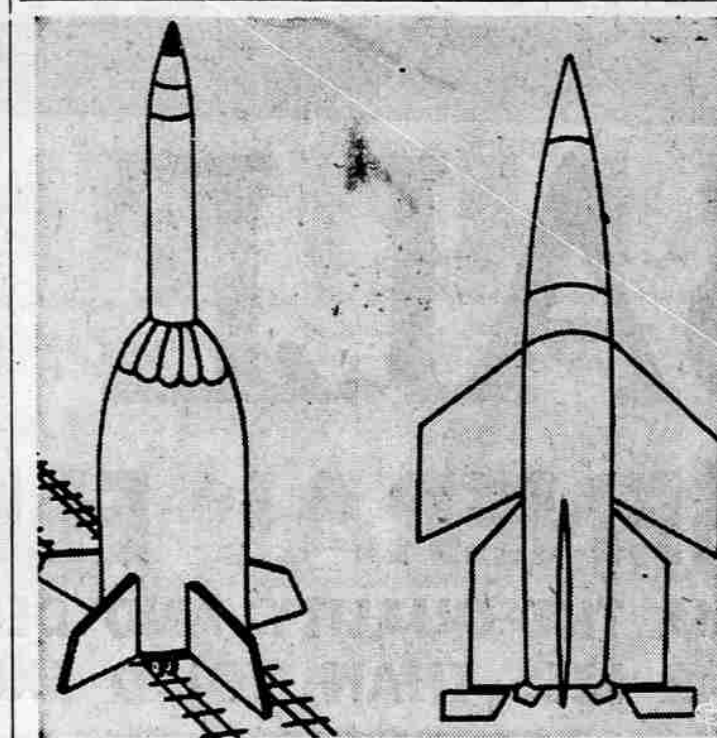

Reclamation Projects Proven as Good Cash Investments .. McKay

Lincoln, Neb. — (U.P.) — Interior Secretary Douglas McKay said today that reclamation projects have "proved an astonishingly good cash investment for the federal government."

In a speech before the 24th annual convention of the National Reclamation Assn., McKay said "It is utterly amazing to me" that the values achieved through reclamation works are challenged.

He added that it also is surprising that "anyone could even remotely argue that this administration is against continuation of the partnership act of 1902, which is productive of such values."

Entire West Benefits

The reclamation act, he said, made the federal government a partner of Western states and of local people "directly concerned with a particular reclamation project."

"Over the years," McKay said, "projects have been built and placed in operation until there is not a Western state which has not benefited from this partnership."

The present administration, McKay said, has "reversed a trend toward complete federal responsibility and consequent control and domination of water resources."

The federal government, McKay said, should proceed with an orderly program of harnessing rivers and streams.

More Expensive

McKay predicted future reclamation projects will be generally "much more" expensive than in the past. But, he said, reclamation works which are not feasible by today's standards will be necessary and essential in the future.

He said revenue from the sale of power, made possible by pro-

jects, will help pay for much of the expense of the projects.

"As an example," McKay said, "we have unqualifiedly supported the great Colorado River Storage Project." Revenue from power plants in connection with facilities built will be used to assist in the repayment of the cost of several associated irrigation projects, he said.

Lincoln Official's Home Now Museum

Auburn, N.Y. — (U.P.) — The home here of William H. Seward, who was Secretary of State under President Abraham Lincoln, will be opened soon as a museum.

Twelve of the mansion's 40 rooms are being restored and will be opened to the public. The house was started in 1816-17 by Judge Elijah Miller and was enlarged during the years after 1824 when Seward married the judge's daughter, Frances.

The restoration was undertaken to show family life from the time the original house—now the northeast corner of the mansion—was built to the Victorian era of Seward and his sons.

The library, which became Seward's working room, still contains the bust of Lincoln which Seward could see from the couch on which he died on Oct. 10, 1872. Also in the room is the writing chair Seward used as three-time governor of New York, U.S. senator and secretary of state.

In a Civil War room is the sheet that was slashed by a would-be assassin of Seward the night Lincoln was fatally wounded. There also is a case of notes signed "A. Lincoln" that shows him as the joking friend, a politician worried over patronage problems and a wartime administrator.

The mansion's so-called diplomatic gallery is hung with 132 portraits of world rulers and diplomats with whom Seward dealt. The Emanuel Leutze painting of the signing of the purchase of Alaska, possibly Seward's greatest achievement hangs in the place of honor.

Canadian Company Hikes Newsprint Price

New York — (U.P.) — The Abitibi Sales Co., Ltd., Toronto, notified customers today that the price of its newsprint will be increased \$5 a ton, effective Nov. 1.

The action in effect permits an identical increase announced by the St. Lawrence Paper company of Canada to become effective on the same date. Contracts here provided St. Lawrence would not charge more than either one of two other companies. One of those is Abitibi.

Lebanon Plant Due To Resume Operation

Lebanon, Ore. — (U.P.) — The Lebanon Crate company plant which was destroyed by fire Aug. 25 will be in limited production again by Nov. 1, John Friesen, head of the firm, said today.

The plant's principal product is vegetable crates.
