A spokesman at Holy Rosary hospital in Ontario said later the blood had arrived just in time and the woman probably would live.

Earlier in the day, State Police Superintendent A. F. Perkins sped toward Nyssa, Ore., with 13 pints of blood for Jimmy Points, a 20-year-old Nyssa hunter.

Back Stairs: Long Woolens for Denver

Denver — (U.P.)—Backstairs at the temporary White House:

Republican National Chairman Leonard W. Hall: Send ear muffs and long underwear. It started snowing in Denver yesterday. As the thermometer started down into the 20s, there was a quick and ready market for anti-freeze for the fleet of cars assigned to the White House staff.

Favorite guessing game at Lowry Air Force Base where the White House offices are located is the exact date of the President's return to the East. The more educated guessers say Nov. 8. Might be Nov. 9 or 10, and then only back to Washington

for a day or two to break the trip.

Then to Gettysburg.

If the stormy weather in Denver continues, it might possibly speed up the President's departure.

While the snow fell here yesterday, the White House reporters, being obverse fellows, messaged Gettysburg on the weather. The report back via Western Union was that the thermometer outside the President's farm read 60.

During the afternoon, however, came another report: It was sleeting in Gettysburg.

If it keeps on snowing in Denver and sleeting in Gettysburg, it could lead to a revival of that

old rumor about the President recuperating in Florida.

George Allen, one of the President's big buddies and farming partner at Gettysburg, is coming to town and probably will see the President in the next few days. Allen is better medicine for Mr. Eisenhower than some of the drugs used by the White House staff of physicians.

Dan Thornton, former governor of Colorado, saw the President briefly yesterday afternoon. It was Thornton, a superb golfer, who tried without success to get Mr. Eisenhower to stop playing 27 holes a day last month. Thornton made his last appeal to the President on the afternoon of Sept. 23, a mat-

ter of hours before the President suffered his heart attack.

The President brushed Thornton aside and said since he was feeling better than at any time since he entered the White House, he would go along with his own golf routine.

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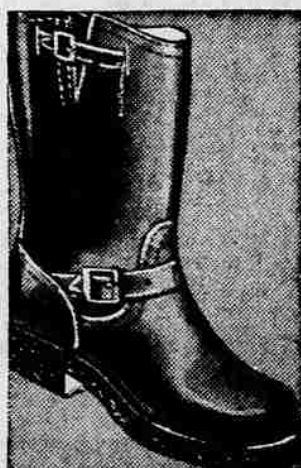
