The event is a part of the week long observance of the anniversary being held here, and is set for 1:30 p.m. The public is invited to attend.

The Rev. Thomas McCamant of First Congregational church will deliver the invocation for the commemorative program and Vincent Bevis, give a welcoming talk.

Bruce Manley, president of the UN chapter here, will introduce Gregory Elliot, 10, chosen to represent children born in 1945, year of the UN charter signing. Gregory is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Don Elliot, 2671 Elliot street.

Representing Mayor Earl Miller at the ceremony will be Councilman Harold Frye, who will read the mayor's proclamation concerning United Nations day in Medford.

Mrs. Herbert Sampert, chairman in charge of arranging the ceremony, states that the Sequoia was chosen after consultation with the school architect, foresters and horticulturists. She points out that this type of tree grows to be the largest of all living trees and is said to be immune to damage by disease or insects.

In the event that weather is

not suitable, the ceremony will be held indoors.

Tomorrow Oak Grove school will observe UN day with a program, a special luncheon at noon and speakers. Mistletoe club members plan a covered dish dinner Wednesday, October 26 at 12:30 p.m., at the home of Mrs. Elsa Walker.

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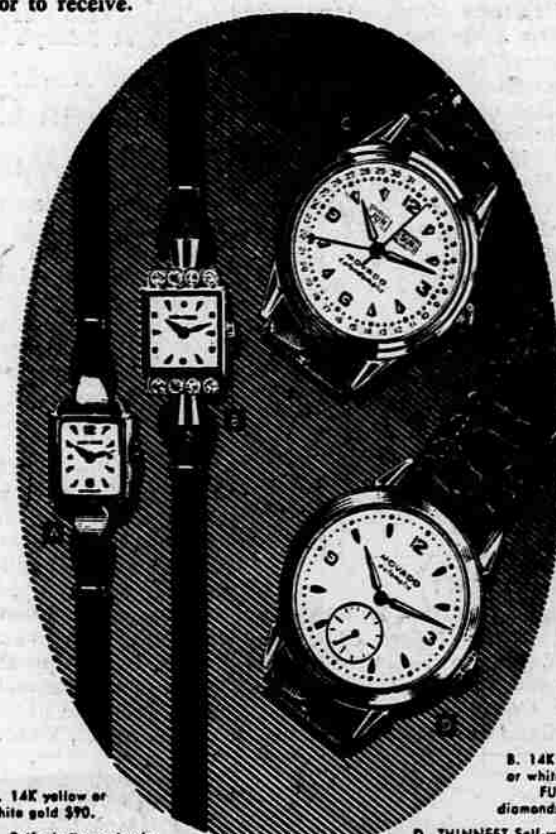


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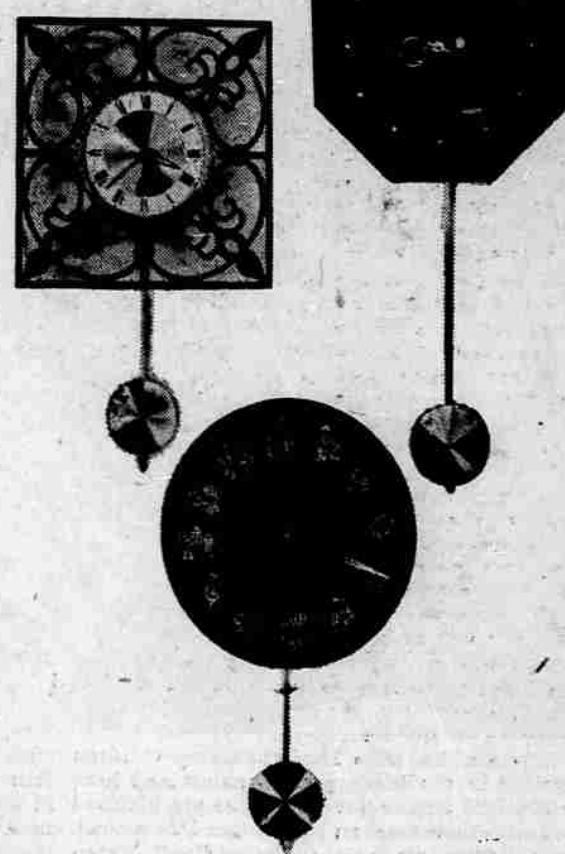


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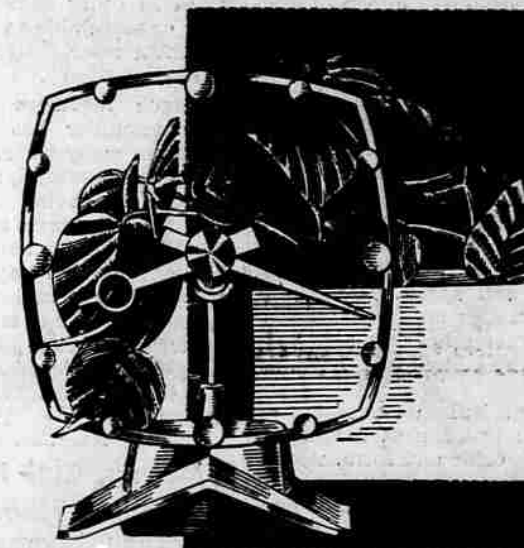
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
