

O'Mahoney Says GOP Searching Vainly for 'Glamour Candidate' To Succeed Ike, Conceal Split

Washington —(U.P.)— Sen. Joseph C. O'Mahoney said today the Republicans are searching vainly for "a glamour candidate" to replace President Eisenhower and "conceal" a party split.

The Wyoming Democrat told a reporter that the Democrats will nominate a man "whose purpose is to serve all segments of our society."

O'Mahoney said that "the Republican National Committee is now engaged in a search for a glamour candidate who can conceal the basic division between the followers of the late Sen. Robert A. Taft and former New York Gov. Thomas E. Dewey."

"But I don't see where they can find one," O'Mahoney continued. "They can't find anyone now to conceal the fact that the Republicans who occupy the seats of power are representatives of concentrated business."

O'Mahoney did not designate his choice of Democratic candidates, though in appraising them he mentioned only Adlai E. Stevenson and New York Gov. Averell Harriman.

In another political development Roger Tubby, former press spokesman for ex-President Truman, quit a job with the Harriman administration to join Stevenson's staff. He did so with Harriman's permission.

Meanwhile, Agriculture Secretary Ezra T. Benson, in an exclusive interview with the United Press, said the administration's farm program is basically sound despite falling farm prices. He

accused Democrats of trying "to paint the picture blacker than it really is."

In a speech at Corvallis, Ore., today, Interior Secretary Douglas McKay branded as "pure politics" Democratic charges that the Eisenhower administration has been giving away natural resources.

Democrats Wednesday turned their criticism toward administration foreign policy and its security program.

Kefauver Speaks Up

At Nashville, Tenn., Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.), an expected candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination, said Red China's demand that Portugal surrender her colonies on the Chinese coast, is another exam-

ple of "how we're letting the Communists keep the initiative in foreign policy."

Thomas K. Finletter, Secretary of the Air Force under the Truman administration, charged that administration attacks on "individual freedom" through security investigations have hampered the defense effort.

Former Democratic Secretary of State Dean Acheson, in a copyrighted article in *Harpers Magazine*, said the Eisenhower administration's foreign policy "has coasted on the momentum of past initiative." He said only the Democrats can provide ideas necessary "to develop the unity and strength . . . of free nations as a balance to the power of the Sino-Soviet system."

New Clues Spur Hunt for Killers Of Chicago Boys

Chicago —(U.P.)— Fresh leads, including a search for a "breathlessly excited" teenager and reports of screams in the night, raised police hopes of catching the killers of three young boys today.

The new clues turned up just as top police officials had resigned themselves to starting the 10-day-old man hunt from scratch.

Then, in fast succession, the following reports came into investigation headquarters:

1. A suburban couple said a "breathlessly nervous and excited" youth drove up to their roadside fruit stand on the night that Robert Peterson, 13, John Schuessler, 13, and his brother, Anton, 11, were killed.

The youth his face twitching, asked the location of Robinson's Woods, where the boys' naked mutilated bodies were found two days later. He also asked "are there any guards on duty there?" Then he drove off in a red panel truck.

2. Three more persons came forward with statements that they heard piercing screams coming from open fields on the night of the murder, Oct. 16. One similar report had been received previously. However, the persons named two different areas as the source of the screams and they did not agree on the time when they heard them.

3. A man was arrested Wednesday night after he telephoned Anton Schuessler, father of the two murdered brothers, and asked about the progress of the case. Police said they found a map in the man's car with the Robinson's Woods area circled by a pencil.

Importance Attached
Authorities attached the most importance to Mr. and Mrs. William Leiper's account of the strange youth in the red panel truck.

Sheriff Joseph Lohman failed it "definitely a promising lead" and ordered his officers to find the youth.

The couple described the youth as between 17 and 20 years old and weighing about 150 pounds. He kept the motor of his truck running while he talked to them, the couple said, and sped away without warning.

'Dead' Prisoner Finds Wife Rewed

Nuernberg, Germany —(U.P.)— German officials sought today to determine how the wife of a former Wehrmacht soldier imprisoned in Russia managed to get him declared dead before she married an American soldier.

Walter Chroba, one of thousands of Germans released from Russian prison camps this month, returned home here and found himself declared legally dead, and his wife married and in the United States.

According to German law, at least three witnesses must testify that they are reasonably certain a man is dead before he can be legally declared dead.

League Adopts Eight Resolutions

Portland —(U.P.)—Astoria Mayor Peter G. Cosovich yesterday was elected president of the League of Oregon Cities, succeeding Diamond L. Flynn of Medford.

The league, at its convention which ended here yesterday, adopted eight resolutions, including one to ask the Interim Committee on Taxation to consider ways of supplementing city revenue to meet financial needs of increased populations and demands for more municipal services.

The league also urged development of a park and recreation program by cities financially able, and supported President Eisenhower's recommendation for decentralization of government by strengthening local governing bodies.

Member cities were urged to cooperate with the Interim Committee in the solution of problems facing cities as a result of urban area growth.

Paul O. Landry, Klamath Falls was elected vice-president of the league, and J. W. Barney of Hillsboro was elected treasurer.

Centrifugal Type Device Eliminates Oil Filters

Chicago —(U.P.)—A new centrifugal type device that cleans oil at the rate of 265 gallons per minute and eliminates filters on Diesel locomotives has been developed by General Motors' electro-motive division.

N. C. DeZendorf, GM vice-president and general manager of the electro-motive division, said the device, called the seprifuge, has run for two months without a cleaning. The filters it replaces need to be changed on the average of every 15 days.

Detroit — (U.P.)— Justices of the peace, caterers and florists should do well in the early 1960's, if insurance company statisticians are correct. They report that there will be about 8,000,000 American men between 20 and 25 by 1965, compared with 6,500,000 now. Half the bridegrooms in the country will come out of that group between 1960 and 1965.

Research Scientist Finds Lens Analysis Equations

Rohrster, N. Y. —(U.P.)—Dr. Max Herzberger, of the Eastman Kodak Co. research department, has developed mathematical formulas solving lens development problems that eluded optics researchers for 100 years.

Dr. Herzberger's system makes a complete lens analysis by tracing nine light rays through a lens and applying his formulas. The former method required the tracing of almost 1,000 rays.

Higgins Blamed For Chasing Morse

The Dalles —(U.P.)— Howard Dent Jr., an Oregon delegate to the 1952 Republican nominating convention and now a registered Democrat, today entered the fray over the political activities of John C. Higgins.

Oregon Democrats this week have issued blasts at Higgins for his influence in Oregon Republican affairs, claiming he was a Vancouver, Wash., resident and not registered to vote in Oregon.

Dent, former mayor of The Dalles, charged that Higgins, "though a Washingtonian, rigged the 1952 Oregon delegation, denying Sen. Wayne Morse any voice in policy making."

Higgins was also a delegate to the 1952 GOP convention.

Dent was particularly critical, in a statement, of Higgins' opposition to Morse as a member of the convention's resolutions committee. Dent charged, "the Higgins-rigged delegation sent a political neophyte, Mark Hatfield of Salem."

Dent blamed Higgins for driving Morse out of the Republican party and for costing the Republicans control of the Senate in 1954.

Higgins this week stated that he is now a Portland resident

and would be registered to vote in Oregon in time for the next election.
