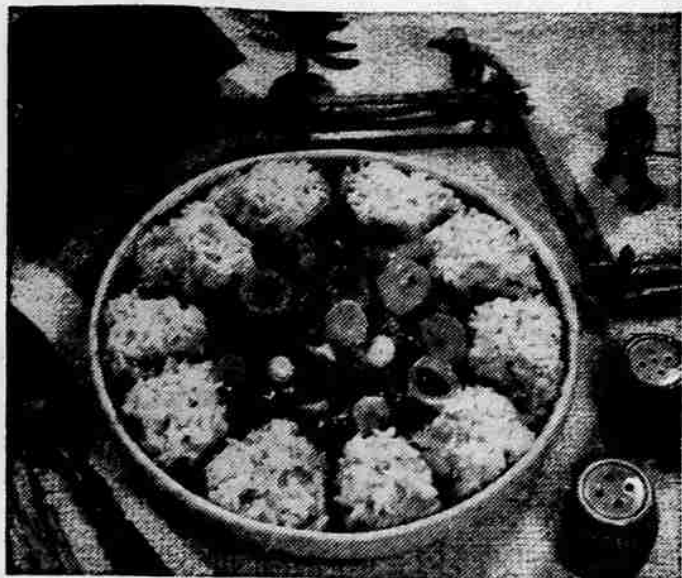

Frontier Stew Has A New Type Topping

Here's a hearty beef stew—rich in flavor—much as that of the old frontier days when a hot meal was the best part of a long hard day.

Those Davy Crockett fans will go for Frontier Stew in a big way. So how about it? When it's chow-time at your house, why not greet your active family with this savory Frontier Stew and its extra special topping?

INGREDIENTS:
 1/2 cup plus 1 tablespoon cooking fat
 1 lb. stew beef cut in 1" cubes
 1/2 cup water
 1 No. 303 can tomatoes
 1 cup onion slices (half large slices)
 1 cup carrot slices
 2 bay leaves
 2 teaspoons salt
 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
 1 cup uncooked white rice
 2 teaspoons salt
 2 cups water
 2 eggs
 1 1/2 cups grated American cheese
 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
 Dash of Tabasco sauce

METHOD: Melt the fat in a skillet. Thoroughly cover the beef with flour. Brown the beef in the fat. Blend one tablespoon of flour into the fat. Slowly stir in the water. Add the tomatoes, onion, carrots, bay leaves, salt, pepper and Worcestershire sauce. Mix well. Cover and cook over a low heat 1 hour or until the meat is tender. Add more water if a thinner mixture is desired. About 20 minutes before the beef is done, put the rice, salt and water in a 2-quart saucepan. Bring to a vigorous boil. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover and leave over this low heat 14 minutes. Remove the saucepan from the heat but leave the lid on 10 minutes. Stir in the eggs, cheese, pepper and Tabasco sauce. Pour the beef-vegetable mixture into a greased shallow baking dish about 12"x7"x2". Arrange the hot rice mixture over the stew, leaving the center uncovered. Place the baking dish under the broiler and broil 15 minutes or until the rice mixture is heated through and slightly browned. Serve immediately.

This recipe makes 6 to 8 servings.

Court Defeats Plan Of Company Control

Salem—(U.P.)—The Oregon Supreme Court yesterday defeated what it called an attempt by promoters, who subsequently became officers of the American Guaranty Life Insurance Company, to perpetuate their control of the corporation based upon only a small investment.

Justice Walter L. Tooe, who wrote the opinion, said the plan of organization devised by the promoters called for issuance of \$19,900 shares of class A stock of a par value of \$10 a share and 20,000 shares of class B stock par value of 10 cents a share.

The court said the promoters subscribed for the full issue of class B stock at a cost of \$2000. This, the high court said, the promoters having a majority of all stock, they had complete control of the company and its affairs and could perpetuate themselves in office and ignore the wishes of the holders of class A stock.

Committees Chosen To Study Schools' Problems in County

Four county-wide committees are being organized to study various school problems in Jackson county.

Organization of the committees started Tuesday night at a convention of representatives of county school districts at Griffin Creek school. Frank C. Bash of Medford was elected chairman of the convention, and Alf B. Mekvold, county school superintendent, was chosen secretary.

The convention was called by a steering committee which drew up an agenda for Tuesday night's meeting. The convention was held in connection with a requirement that county school board members study educational needs and report to a legislative interim committee on education.

Recommended Studies

The steering committee recommended that four aspects of education in Jackson county be studied. They are population growth and school facilities; school finances; school district organization; and educational standards and services.

Chairmen of the study committees are Don Patterson of Central Point, population growth and school facilities; Bash of Medford, school finances; Sam Harbison of Griffin Creek, school district organization; and Jack Hoffbuhr of Phoenix, educational standards and services.

Requests to each school board in the county will be sent, Mekvold said, for each district to furnish names of members who wish to serve on particular committees. Chairmen of each of the committees will organize each committee prior to studying its aspect of educational needs.

Mekvold said he expected each committee to utilize assistance from non-board members of the districts as well as educators, school administrators and the county superintendent's office.

Committees will submit progress reports at three conventions of all school board members the third Tuesday of January, March and June, next year. Final reports will include recommendations for needed legislation, which will be submitted to the legislative interim committee prior to July 6, 1956.

Convention Sites

The three conventions will be held at Crater High school in Central Point, Medford High school and Phoenix High school.

At Tuesday night's convention, board members present adopted resolutions supporting the principal of equal education for all children, and supporting financing support for equal education for all children based on need rather than ability to pay.

Members of the steering committee, which will make the final report to the state interim committee, include John Neidermeyer, chairman; Ed Branchfield, Medford; C. W. Anhorn, Central Point; and A. E. Brockway, chairman of the non-high board.

Some 32 representatives from Griffin Creek, Medford, Central Point, Oak Grove, Jacksonville, Phoenix, Elk-Trail, Westside, Applegate, Rogue River, Howard and Lone Pine attended Tuesday's convention.

The Griffin Creek school board furnished dinner which was served by the Griffin Creek Mothers club.

Israel Premier Seeks Egypt Arms Parity

Paris—(U.P.)—Israeli Premier Moshe Sharett yesterday sought arms parity with Egypt in a series of urgent pre-Geneva conferences with Secretary of State John Foster Dulles and the other Big Three foreign ministers.

The Soviet bid for power in the Middle East through Communist arms shipments to Egypt exploded into the biggest outside issue of the Geneva conference which starts Thursday.

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LOW IN PRICE

Kefauver Wants Rigid Farm Price Supports

Washington—(U.P.)—Sen. Estes Kefauver said yesterday that Congress should quickly bolster farm income by restoring high, rigid price supports and then work towards further improvements in the farm program.

"Our economy would be in a whole lot sounder position if we still had the high support program," the Tennessee Democrat said. He referred to the program of supporting basic crops at 90 per cent of fair price parity.

Portland Extortion Scheme Discovered

Portland—(U.P.)—Police here yesterday reported an \$800 extortion scheme against a Portland contractor.

Detectives said the man found a letter in his truck Monday demanding the money in exchange for photographs assertedly taken with an infra-red camera without the contractor's knowledge.

He went ahead with the note's instructions to leave the \$800 in a telephone booth at the direction of police, who set up a stake out.

BACK IN BUSINESS

Paterson, N. J.—(U.P.)—The Tacks Association, dedicated to social good times, was reformed recently after a lapse of 20 years when members learned they had money in the bank. Some \$800 of the organization's funds were frozen in the old Franklin Trust Company when the banks closed in 1933.

As We Live

Proper Nourishment Is Important For Children

Growing children must have enough proper food if they are to grow normally.

(Q) "I've been married a little over three years and have two boys, one two years old and the other 10 months. Until June of this year, my husband gave me all his money, but would buy the groceries and other things needed for our children and home. Then, for no reason at all, he started to keep the money but continued to buy the groceries. However, he wouldn't get a lot of things that I needed badly. When I tell him, he always says he hasn't the money."

"Often he goes out and drinks beer so he must have some money. He doesn't want to buy any milk for the two-year-old boy. He says the child is old enough now to go without milk. He was a premature baby and the doctor told me to keep on giving him milk as long as I could. Should I leave my husband and work to support the children? Any of my relatives are willing to take the children while I work." Mrs. R. N.

(A) I don't think you should leave your husband and go to work except as a last resort. It is very hard on little children to be deprived of both mother and father, and to be brought up by outsiders, even if they are relatives.

The first thing you should do is to have your doctor talk to your husband and explain how important it is for little children to have an adequate amount of milk every day. This is especially important when a child was born prematurely and is still catching up what he lost by coming into the world too soon.

Must Get Necessities

If your husband wants to manage the money and help you with the shopping, he must be made to realize that he must get the necessities before he spends money for amusements, drinking, or personal matters. He needs suitable clothes for work, but drinking certainly does not help him in any way but deprives you and the children of what you really need.

If talking to him and having the doctor explain why proper food is essential brings no results, then you should discuss this matter with your minister and let him help you arrange to take the problem to domestic relations court. The judge will decide how your husband is to spend his money and will see to it that you and the children are properly supported.

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Mission's Recipe for BEEF MACARONI BAKE

3 qts. Boiling salted water
2 cups Uncooked macaroni
1 can Cond. Tomato soup
3 tbsp. Processed cheese, grated (2-oz.)
1/4 tsp. Oregano
Salt and pepper

Cook macaroni in boiling salted water until tender, and drain in colander. In a bowl, combine ingredients, seasoning to taste. Mix lightly but thoroughly. Turn into baking dish, cover and bake in moderate oven, 350° for 30 minutes. Serves 4-6.
