Patching Jobs May Decide Winners in College Frays

How well the trainers do their last-minute patching jobs today on a number of injured stars may very well decide the winners in several of Saturday's biggest college football games, like Navy-Notre Dame and Michigan-Iowa.

For example, if the bruised thigh of Notre Dame quarterback Paul Hornung doesn't respond well, the Fighting Irish may fall as six point favorites and lose

to revenge-bent Navy for the first time since 1944.

And the key Big Ten battle between Michigan and Iowa, which will be nationally televised, may depend on how healthy are the most-highly publicized stars of each team—end Ron Kramer of Michigan and guard Cal Jones of Iowa. Michigan, rated the nation's No. 1 team and battling desperately to hold onto that rank is a seven-point favorite.

No Such Problems

No such problems appear to beset Maryland and Oklahoma, the two mighty grid machines that are pressing Michigan hard for the national leadership. Both seemingly could miss a man or two this week, for Maryland is rated a whopping 27-point favorite over South Carolina in an Atlantic Coast Conference clash and Oklahoma, ranked No. 3 nationally, is picked by a similar sum over Kansas State to take another step toward the Big Seven championship and the Orange Bowl.

UCLA, ranked No. 5, is the week's most lopsided favorite at 35 points over California. Michigan State, No. 6, is only a three-point choice over Wisconsin as both battle to stay on Michigan's heels in the Big Ten race. Auburn, No. 8, is rated 13 points over Tulane in its drive toward its first Southeastern conference crown.

Southern California, which shares the No. 8 ranking, also is a 13-point choice for its invasion of Minneapolis for the day's biggest intersectional game, shooting Jon Arnet, the nation's leading scorer, against Minnesota. Texas A&M, No. 10, is only a seven-point pick over Arkansas in the key Southwest conference battle at Fayetteville, Ark.

Other Key Games

Here's how some of the key games in other conference races shape up:

Missouri Valley: League-leader Houston a 14-point favorite over Wichita in a night game. Ivy: Co-leaders Yale and Princeton each favored by 13 over Dartmouth and Brown, respectively. Big Seven: Nebraska, tied with Oklahoma, a 13 point choice over Kansas. Atlantic Coast: Clemson, tied with Maryland, favored by seven over Wake Forest. Southern: George Washington could gain first place tie with West Virginia and Davidson by beating Virginia Tech, but is a seven-point underdog. Southwest: SMU hot on Texas Aggies' heels, seven-point pick over Texas.

The odds-makers find three games this week as even money—Miami, Fla.-Pittsburgh, Purdue-Illinois and Syracuse-Holy Cross.

In contrast to previous weeks, when there were several top-notch games on Friday night, tonight's program does not include a major college game.

Tom Heath Resigns as Pads' Pilot

San Francisco — (U.P.) — Tommy Heath, manager of the San Francisco Seals for the past five years, resigned Thursday to help "clear the way" for the possible sale of the club to new interests.

In a specially prepared statement, Heath said he was announcing his resignation as manager and director of the Seals.

"Because of rumors which are being circulated, I am forced to make the following announcement prematurely, and I might add, regretfully," said the Heath statement.

"By mutual agreement with the directors of the San Francisco Seals, I am announcing my resignation as Seals manager and director. I am taking this action in order to help remove any obstacles that might possibly be in the way for a future purchaser or a new operator of the San Francisco franchise."

Up For Sale

The Seals, in financial hot water, have been up for sale since the close of the 1955 season.

Heath was brought to the Seals in 1951 from Minneapolis by the former owner, Paul Fagan. When Fagan withdrew from baseball two years ago he turned the club over to seven veteran employees, including Heath, who became a part owner of the club.

It has been rumored that Heath is under consideration for the post of manager of the Seattle Rainiers. Freddie Hutchinson, who piloted the Rainiers to a pennant last year, stepped up to take over as manager of the St. Louis Cardinals, leaving the Seattle post open.

PLANS SUPER TRACK
New York—(U.P.)—The Greater New York Racing association, which conducts all thoroughbred racing in metropolitan New York, announced Thursday that it plans to build its "super" track at Belmont Park. But it said its reconstruction plans for the New York tracks first call for improvements at Aqueduct.

MAY MOVE CLUB

Indianapolis — (U.P.) — The Indianapolis News has reported that the parent Cleveland Indians will move their local American association club to another city unless the city makes a move to keep the franchise here. The city has until Nov. 28 to decide if it wants to keep the team here, the News said.

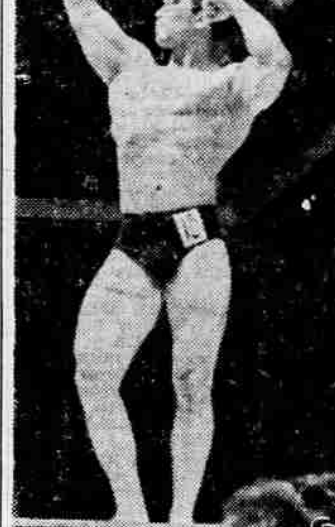

Non-Professional Hoop Circuit Will Have National Tournament

Phoenix, Ariz. — A new non-professional basketball organization—the National Basketball Congress—will launch its first nationwide tournament program this fall. The first national championship meet is scheduled for Phoenix, Ariz., March 24 through April 1, it has been announced by Larry Walker, executive secretary of the Phoenix-based organization.

The NBC has one chief aim, that of providing a tournament program for the thousands of players who do not fit into the collegiate, AAU, or professional post-season tourney programs. Eligibility rules of the new association have been patterned

after amateur policies of intercollegiate conferences and recreation associations. Athletic coaches, physical education instructors and former professional athletes—as well as amateurs—will be permitted to compete in the NBC tournaments on a strictly amateur basis. Fifty per cent of revenue from

state and national tournaments will be returned to sponsors of visiting teams to help pay expenses incurred for travel, lodging, and meals.

State and district commissioners for the new international organization are now being appointed. Basketball leaders interested in applying for NBC commissions may write the National Basketball Congress, 1725 West Roosevelt, Phoenix, Arizona.

Basketball Loop Session Thursday

Preparations for the Medford Independent Basketball League season will be launched next week.

President Bill Singler has scheduled a meeting for Thursday, November 3. The meeting will be at the armory.

Singler expressed hope that organization for the season can be completed well ahead of last year. It is planned to hold election of officers at next week's meeting.
