Navy And Holy Cross Fall From Unbeaten List; Four Teams Keep Perfect Slates

Navy and Holy Cross were swept from the unbeaten ranks Saturday, leaving Michigan, Maryland, Oklahoma and West Virginia as the only major teams in the country with perfect records.

With a record crowd of 59,475 looking on at South Bend, Ind., Notre Dame's Fighting Irish scored a 21-7 triumph that ended Navy's dream of its first perfect season in history while a rugged Syracuse team crushed Holy Cross, 49-9, to halt the Crusaders' bid for their first all-conquering campaign in 37 years.

Battles in 4th — Michigan, the nation's top-ranked team, was forced to rally for three touchdowns in the final period to preserve its perfect record with a 33-21 verdict over Iowa but Maryland, Oklahoma and West Virginia all rolled to easy victories. Maryland scored twice in the first period and went on to down South

Their defense looked better than their offense but the McLoughlin junior high ninth grade footballers still ran up four touchdowns Friday to wrap the Ashland Freshmen 28 to 0 at Ashland.

Fred Funston touchdowns three times and Warren Chick once for the Bulldogs and Mike Murray made good on all extra point kick tries.

In the second quarter Funston went the final three of a 55-yard march. Then he intercepted a pass and ran 45 yards. An Ashland lateral rolled free on the ground in the third quarter. Chick grabbed the ball and raced 55 yards. In the closing panel Funston went the last eight of a drive from midfield.

McLoughlin had the margin in first downs 14 to four. The Bulldogs lost Back Gerry Lyons with an arm bruise and Back Jim Clark with a knee injury in the second quarter.

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MH Harriers Clip Douglas In Run Here

Medford high's cross country runners picked up another victory on Friday, defeating Douglas 21 to 36.

Wilkey Winchell of the Tornado was first in the run, winning by 10 yards over Cliff Thompson, the Umpqua League school's highly rated sophomore. Thompson had run against some of the top harriers in the Umpqua and Willamette valleys' and was unbeaten until his appearance here.

Winchell ran the distance of about 1 1/2 miles in 6:38.2. Thompson put on a terrific kick at the finish but couldn't close a 40-yard deficit any tighter.

Medford's Les Lingscheid was third some 30 yards back of Thompson. Mark Norton, ninth grader from Hedrick Junior high was fourth for Medford. Jim Benson was sixth and Wayne Breeze seventh. Fred Myers took fifth for Douglas. Another Medford ninth grader, Roger Johnson, from McLoughlin, ran 10th in the race.

The Tornado runners met Grants Pass here on Monday and go to Portland for the state meet next week end. GP took a three-fourths mile run from Medford recently.

Coach Vern Wolthoff has reported that his Medford harriers are coming along.

Prospect Loses To Chiloquin

Stanford Is Victor Over SJ Indians

Stanford, Calif. — (U.P.) — Stanford wrapped up San Jose State, 34-18, Saturday in a loosely-played game before a crowd of 33,000 which included a group of Russian newspapermen who had enough after the first half.

The Soviet scribes departed with the Indians riding on a 27-0 cushion, thanks to the passing of quarterback John Brodie. But the Russians missed all of San Jose's scoring because of their impatience.

It was Stanford's 12 victory in 13 tussles with its neighboring downstate foe who scored a 19-14 upset last season. But yesterday's edition of the Spartans was a weak carbon copy of last season's, except for a trio of flare-ups in the last half.

Stanford really rolled when Brodie was in charge. He passed for one touchdown, set up two others with fine passes and engineered his team on a 66-yard drive for a fourth.

Tony Teresa, shifty split-T operator who was the key man in Stanford's downfall last year, was the fall guy for two of the Indians' scores this time.

Malin Hands Merrill 20-7 Defeat Friday

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Kramer Fails To Sign Hoad And Rosewall To Tennis Contracts

Sydney, Australia—(U.P.)—Jack Kramer, weary and disgusted after his failure to sign Australia's Lew Hoad and Ken Rosewall to professional tennis contracts, said Saturday he would be disappointed if U.S. tennis officials "don't probe this one."

"I wouldn't say I've been double-crossed but, brother, Hoad and Rosewall certainly changed their attitude since I last saw them," Kramer said before leaving for San Francisco by plane.

When he signed Tony Trabert of Cincinnati, O., for \$75,000 several weeks ago, Kramer believed he also had Hoad and Rosewall lined up for his professional tour. The 20-year-old Aussie decided to remain amateurs after receiving attractive, long-range

propositions from the sporting goods firms which employ them. Sees Probe Likely

Rosewall refused to talk to Kramer when he came here this week in a last-ditch effort to sign the two Davis Cup stars. Kramer looked drawn and weary after three days of futile negotiations with Hoad.

"If people figure Trabert's a professional, these kids are gone for sure," Kramer said. "Trabert hasn't even signed with me yet. I'll be disappointed if U.S. lawn tennis officials don't probe this one."

Hoad turned Kramer down Friday although Kramer said he had boosted his original offer of 20,000 Australian pounds, \$45,000, to \$67,500.

Rooks Blast Frosh 26-7; Lowe Stars

Eugene — (U.P.) — Two long runs by Dave Lowe sparked the Oregon State Rooks to a 26-7 victory over the Oregon Ducklings here yesterday.

Lowe, former California state prep low hurdle champion, scampered 86 yards for a touchdown in the second period and then dashed 95 yards in the third quarter to give the Beaver Babes and advantage the Frosh couldn't overcome.

The Rooks scored first early in the game after Sonny Sanchez blocked a Frosh punt on the Oregon 16 yard line. Four plays later Earnel Durdan carried the ball over for the touchdown.

Fumble Sets Up TD — A recovered fumble set up the Rooks second score of the second period. Tony Arana passed to Durdan for the score.

The Frosh scored in the final period when Don Laudenslager of Gresham smashed over from the two. The touchdown climaxed a 75-yard drive.

The Frosh made 15 first downs to 9 for the Rooks, but the Beaver Babes outgained the Ducklings 251 yards to 160 on the ground and 288 to 239 on passes.

UCLA Hands 47-0 Loss On Golden Bears

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — UCLA toyed with its big brothers from California in the statewide educational system, giving the Golden Bears a lesson in football Saturday as they hung up a 47-0 victory before a homecoming crowd of 56,980 fans in Memorial coliseum.

The Bruins took to the air much of the game with their best passing effort of the year as they completed 16 out of 26 for 265 yards and scored in every period, although Coach Henry (Red) Sanders used almost every man on the bench.

With first string fullback Bob Davenport injured on the first play from scrimmage, Doug Peters took over and scored twice on short plunges. The publicized passer, Ronnie Knox, also scored twice on the ground, setting up his scores with passes but making the touchdowns on the ground.

The closest California came to a score was when End Dick Hartman picked up a ball he thought was still in play and raced 90 yards only to be called back. California's only effective weapon was the punting of Guard Don Gilkey who averaged about 40 yards on nine boots to make UCLA march further for its scores.

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Talent—A big break in the second quarter enabled Rogue River high to sew up second place in Jackson County B League football in the gummy mud and sawdust girdiron here. Rogue River edged the Talent Bulldogs 6 to 0 to break a tie for the position in the last league game of the year.

Harold Moore blocked a punt by Jack Barrett to set up the score for the Chieftains. Rogue River got the ball on the 13-yard line. On the next play Bill Weaver slogged around left end eluding several tacklers to score. Bilbee Lane's kick from place-ment was short.

Chance Spoiled — A penalty for clipping spoiled Rogue River's other big chance. Weaver ran a punt back from about his 40 to the Talent 13 in the second quarter but the ball was taken back to the RR 27. Chieftain drives carried them to the Talent 21, 28 and 30 in the contest. Talent's only serious threat was in the first quarter when the Bulldogs got to the RR 31. Their Gary Phillips of the Chiefs recovered a fumble.

Pass interceptions by Gary Stinchcomb, John Bigman and Byron Cordes, the mud and stubborn Rogue River defense held down Talent in the second half. Gary Combs intercepted one Rogue River pass and Fred Helm another.

Marshfield, the state's No. 1 team, remained the dominant power in Oregon's high school football race Saturday as several other of the top-rated elevens continued their winning ways.

The Golden Pirates defeated Prineville, one of the state's most powerful A-2 clubs, 21-0 at Prineville Friday night to keep their 1955 season slate clean.

While Marshfield was measuring Prineville, Gresham, the No. 2 team, and McMinnville, rated No. 10 this week, were clinching their respective district titles. Gresham took the 3-A-1 crown by downing Central Catholic, 12-7, and McMinnville won the 4-A-1 championship by edging Hillsboro, this week's 6th ranked squad, 6-0.

Corvallis was assured of at least a tie for the 8-A-1 title with a 7-0 victory over South Salem. The 5th ranked Spartans have to defeat Albany next week to clinch the crown.

Pendleton Victor — Pendleton, rated No. 3, also clinched at least a tie in District 7-A-1 by thumping Baker, 45-7. Jefferson of Portland the state's No. 4 team, downed Ben-

son 13-12. Jeff already had won a berth in the state playoffs, but the victory Friday night gave the Demos a 7-0 record for the Portland city league season.

In other top A-1 games, Eugene clobbered North Bend, 27-6; Albany defeated North Salem, 28-7; Medford walloped Ashland, 40-7; Grants Pass downed Klamath Falls, 33-25, and Bend upended Redmond, 25-7.

In A-2 play, Vale, the powerhouse of eastern Oregon, romped over Nyssa, 48-0. Dallas won its second straight 4-A-2 title by blanking Molalla 32-0, and Junction City gained a tie for the 5-A-2 championship by shutting out Willamette of Eugene, 20-0.
