Earthquake Cause Of School Closure

Oakland, Calif. —(UPI)—Lowell Junior High school, a 29-year-old structure housing some 750 students, will be closed because of damage resulting from last Sunday's earthquake, the board of education said Saturday.

The board made its decision following an engineering report that gave the school a "very poor" earthquake rating. Engineers found damage in a skylight area and cracks in exterior brickwork and third floor walls resulting from the quake.

The report said there was danger the walls of the building might collapse in another temblor.

Arrangements for the students to attend other schools will be made next week.

News About Servicemen

USMC Team Sets Visit to College

A U.S. Marine corps officer procurement team from San Francisco will be on the campus at Southern Oregon college from 8:30 to 3:30 p.m. Nov. 4.

They will be located at the Student Co-op to interview college freshmen and sophomores interested in commissions in the U.S. Marines through the Platoon Leaders Class program. The Platoon Leaders Class (PLC) is an in-college training program for men that leads to a commission in the Marine Corps Reserve upon graduation from an accredited college or university.

The PLC program is draft deferable, requires no drills or special courses, nor does it require that a uniform be worn during the school year. A PLC attends two six-week summer training sessions at the Marine Corps Schools, Quantico, Va., during the time that he is in college. Upon graduation and successful completion of summer training he is commissioned a second lieutenant in the United States Marine corps reserve and assigned to active duty. Married men may apply.

James McDaniel, a student at Southern Oregon college is currently a member of this program and has completed one summer course.

Former Marines Slate Meeting

A meeting of former Marines in the Rogue valley will be held Nov. 2 at 7:30 p.m. in the Medford Marine Corps recruiting station to discuss the possibilities of forming another Medford Volunteer Training unit. Invited to the discussion are all interested former Marines, Women Marines and former Navy medical corpsmen and doctors.

The recruiting station is located in the Medford post office building. Forming the meeting is Maj. Murray B. Gardner, who was a member of the Volunteer Training unit that was in existence prior to the Korean war.

At a later date, if the unit is formed and enough men are members, the VTU may become an organized Marine corps reserve unit on pay status. In this event, men who are currently going to high school or college or other non-prior service men may join.

Instructors from the Marine Corps "regular" establishment would be assigned here for duty with the OMC, and members would go to two weeks of training at Camp Pendleton, Calif. The VTU will enlist former Marines only if organized.
