An invitation to participate in the Veterans Day parade November 11 was accepted during a recent meeting of the group.

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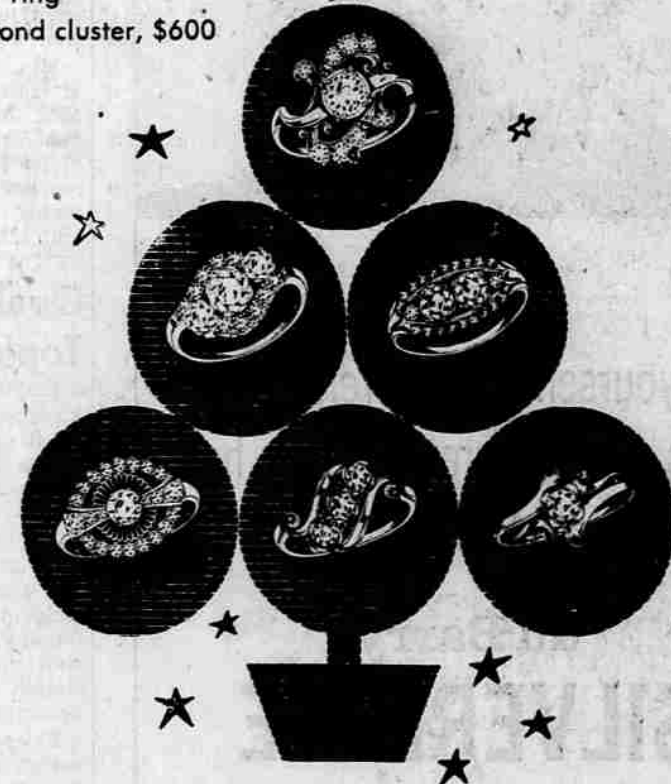
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
