Higgins Takes Rap At Howard Morgan

Portland — (U.P.) — John C. Higgins, who has been criticized by Democratic State Chairman Howard Morgan for his association with a Republican fundraising group — the Oregon Committee for Good Government — struck back at the Democrat over the week end.

Higgins said "the obvious falsity of most of Mr. Morgan's statements destroy their value as political propaganda."

When Higgins disclosed a week ago that he and a group of other Republicans had banded together to raise funds for the 1956 campaign, Morgan charged Higgins with being a resident of Vancouver, Wash.

Higgins denied Morgan's further charge that he, as a resident of Washington, had "come out in the open as a powerful boss of the Republican party in Oregon."

He said he had sold his home in Vancouver in Sept., 1954, and moved to Portland where he maintained offices. He said he had not been back to his Washington home for more than a year.

The Republican said the Democratic chairman had done some "clumsy sleuthing" when he discovered Higgins' name on the Vancouver voting registry.

"Their 'discovery' that my name is still carried on the voters' registry list in Vancouver does not mean that I have, or could claim, any legal right to vote there. It means only that when I sold my home in Vancouver and moved back to Portland I neglected . . . to cancel my registration," he said.

Atomic Radiation Study Group Urged

United Nations, N.Y. — (U.P.) — The United States was to propose in the United Nations main political committee today that a commission be established to make a global study of the effects of atomic radiation on human health and safety.

The hazard of atomic radiation was named Friday as the next subject for political committee debate. The vote was 49 to five with two abstentions despite a Russian bid to force an immediate debate in the committee.

The U.S. proposal, informed sources reported, will be that a special commission be established to gather reports from government on the hazards and prevention of atomic radiation.

Thornton Gives Ruling On Television Cables

Salem — (U.P.) — Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton said today that a county court does not have the right to permit a non-profit private corporation to erect a coaxial television cable on county roads.

He wrote his opinion at request of George L. Anderson Jr., district attorney of Union county.

It affects plans of a group of individuals living in rural areas of Union county to form a corporation and install a coaxial cable to improve television reception. The county court had been requested to permit the erection of poles and cable on the county road right-of-way.

Mental Health Said Pressing State Problem

Portland — (U.P.) — Mental health is one of Oregon's most pressing problems in the opinion of the governor's mental health training and research committee.

John H. Waterman, Portland, chairman of the committee, said a survey of state legislators showed the importance with which the mental health problem was regarded. Legislators' opinions on how to solve the problem differed greatly, however.

Governor to Attend Highway Meeting

Salem — (U.P.) — Gov. Paul Patterson will leave Portland by plane tomorrow night for Washington, D.C., to attend a meeting of the governors' committee on highways.

The committee will meet Thursday to draft and urge passage of a highway law for federal aid in accordance with the president's program of national highway construction over a 10-year period.

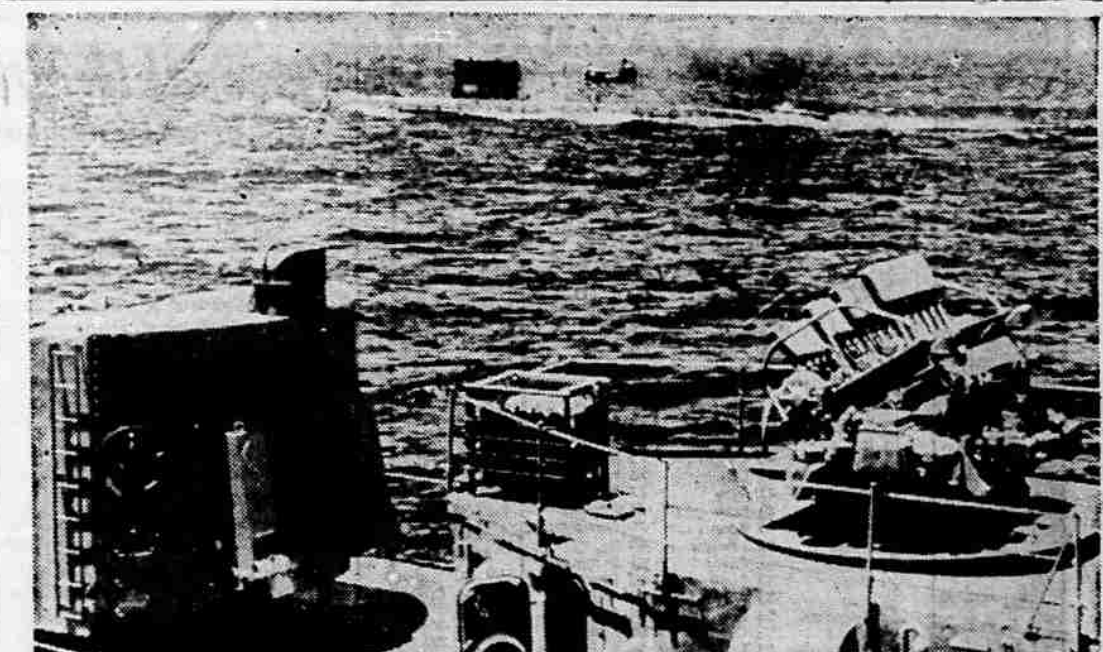
