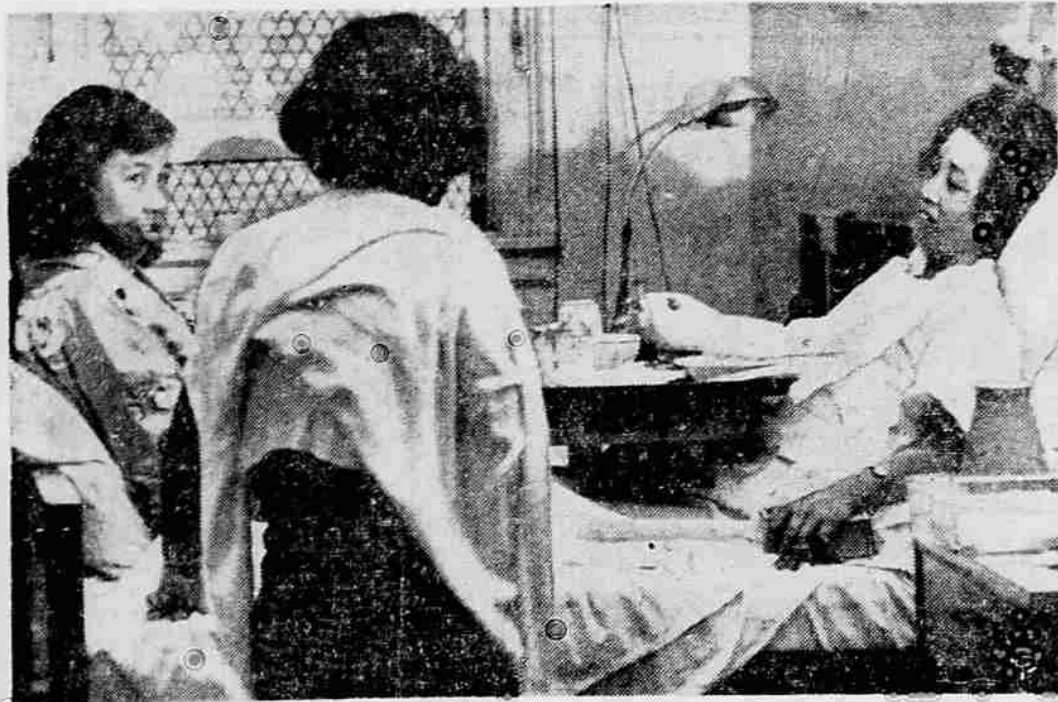

The congressmen, members of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, included Clement Zablocki (D-Wis.), John Jarman (D-Okla.), Robert Byrd (D-W. Va.), Walter Judd (R-Minn.), Ross Adair (R-Ind.), and Richard Wigglesworth (R-Mass.).

China, Soviet Air Power Said Modern

Tokyo — (U.P.) — Gen. Nathan Twining, U. S. Air Force chief of staff, said today both the Chinese and Soviet Far East air forces are being modernized with late type planes and other equipment.

Referring to Soviet air forces in the Far East, Twining said, "Whether they're building up I don't know, but they are certainly reorganizing their forces."

Twining was asked to comment on a published report that the U. S. Far East Air Forces had been given permission to use atomic weapons without Washington clearance in certain emergencies.

"I'd rather not discuss that subject. It's a little out of my sphere," he replied.

Gen. Dean Plans Trip To Alaska

Berkeley, Calif. — (U.P.) — Maj. Gen. William F. Dean, retired from the Army after more than three decades of service, mapped plans today for a trip to Alaska to see his grandchildren.

Dean said he hoped soon to go with his wife to Alaska to see his daughter, Mrs. Robert C. Williams, her Army officer husband and their three children.

Dean, the tank-busting hero of Taejon, blinked back tears yesterday at retirement ceremonies held for him in the Presidio of San Francisco.

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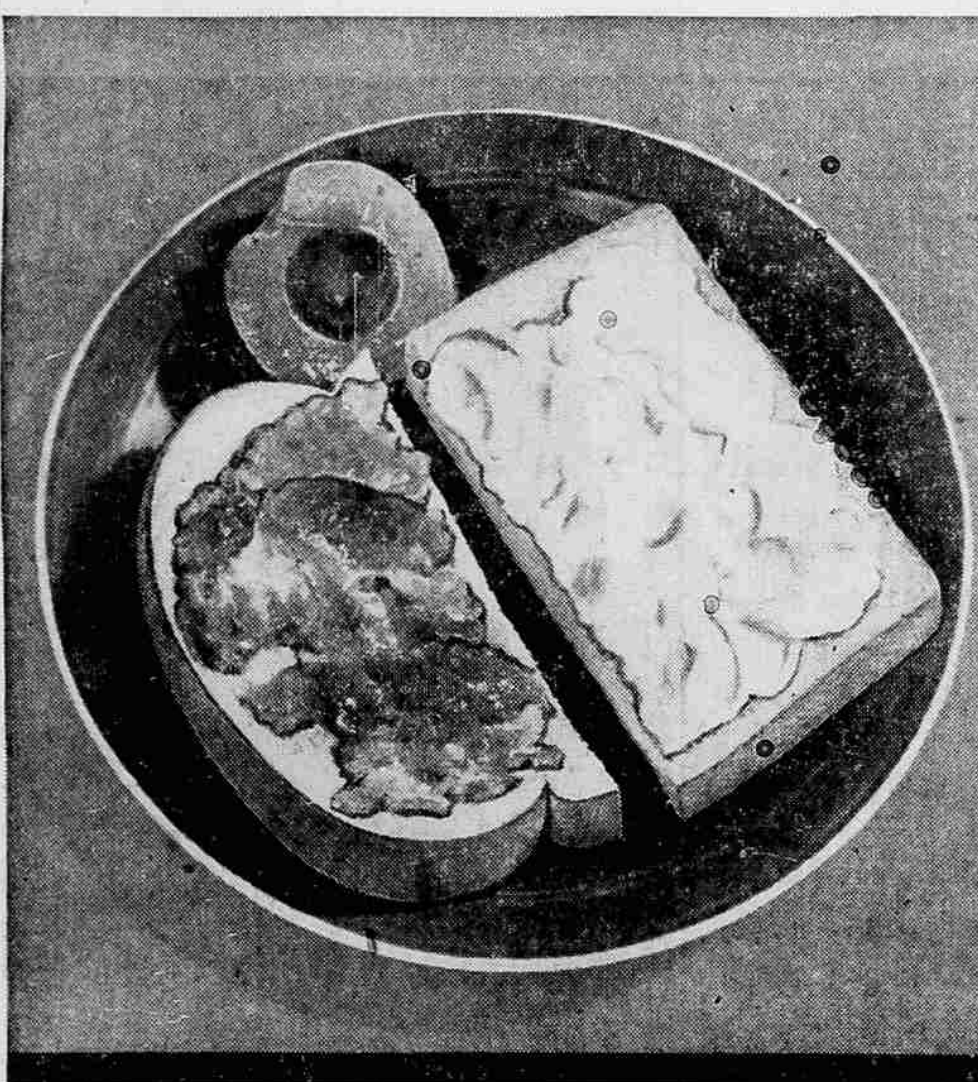
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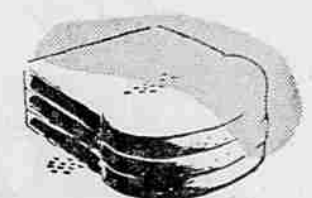
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
