Worry Said Mark Of Healthy Mind

San Francisco — (U.P.) — Beverly Hills psychiatrist says you may be crazy if you don't worry.

Dr. Judd Marmor told a meeting of psychiatrists that "realistic worry in the face of danger or distress is the mark of a healthy mind."

"Contrary to the theme of popular writings on the subject which advocate elimination of worry, psychiatrists know that on that pathway lies madness," Marmor discussed the subject of worry before the first western divisional meeting of the American Psychiatric Association, which ended a four-day meeting yesterday.

A "realistic worry," he said, must have some solid basis in fact and result in "realistic action"—either physical or mental. He said it differs from anxiety, which is an emotional rather than an intellectual response.
