

Four New Stations Added to Oregon's Teletype Network

Four new stations were added to the Oregon law enforcement agencies private line teletypewriter network today.

Stations added to the network are located at the offices of the Coos Bay sheriff, Coquille, North Bend police department, North Bend; Oregon State Police district office, Milwaukie; and the Oregon State Police patrol office at Salem.

Has 27 Stations
The network, which began operation May 24, 1954, now has 27 stations serving 44 law enforcement agencies in the western part of the state on a 24-hour, seven day week basis.

Three of the teletypewriter stations are in Medford. They are located with the Jackson County sheriff's office, Oregon State police, and the Medford city police department.

The network was basically organized to aid in the recovery of stolen motor vehicles, but all types of police communications dealing with any situation or emergency are carried on the system. Civil emergencies and civil defense messages can also be transmitted on the circuit.

Tied to California Net
The network is tied into the California Justice Department's teletype network which has more than 250 stations, as well as Reno and Las Vegas, Nev., and Yuma, Ariz.

Cost of the network is borne by the individual stations of the system and the secretary of state's office.

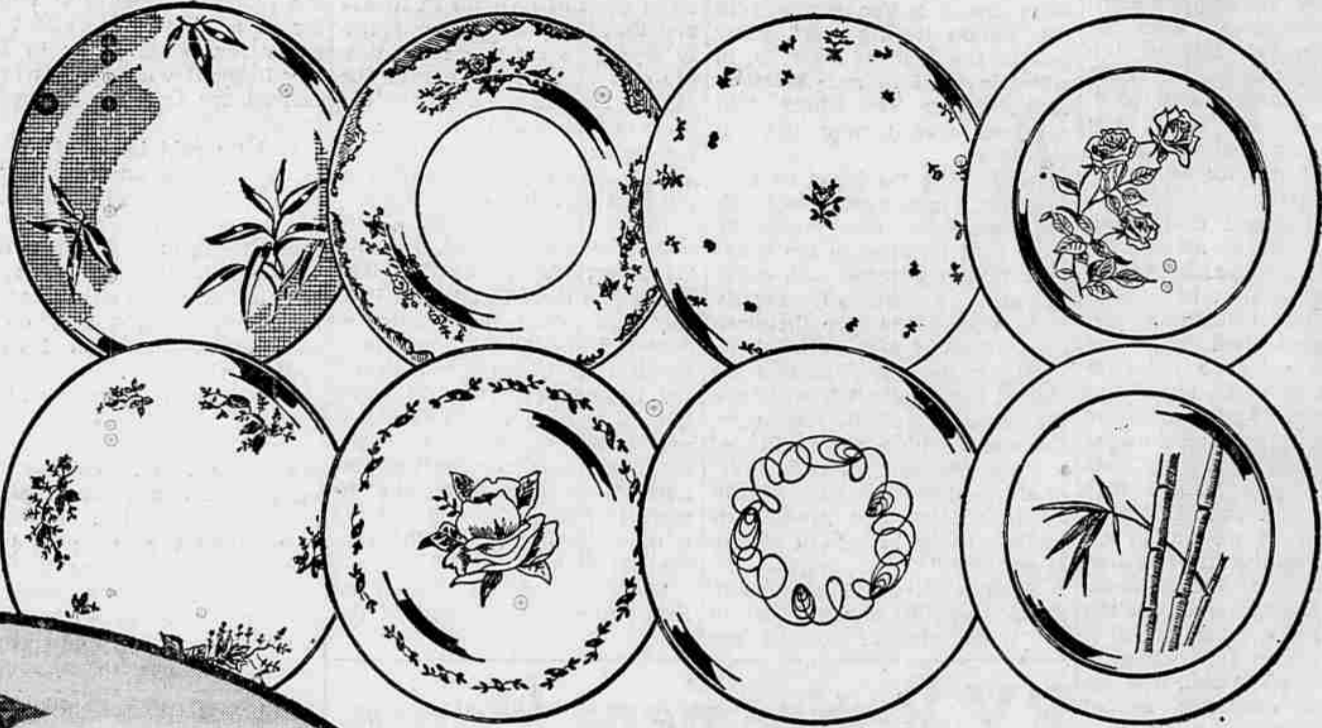

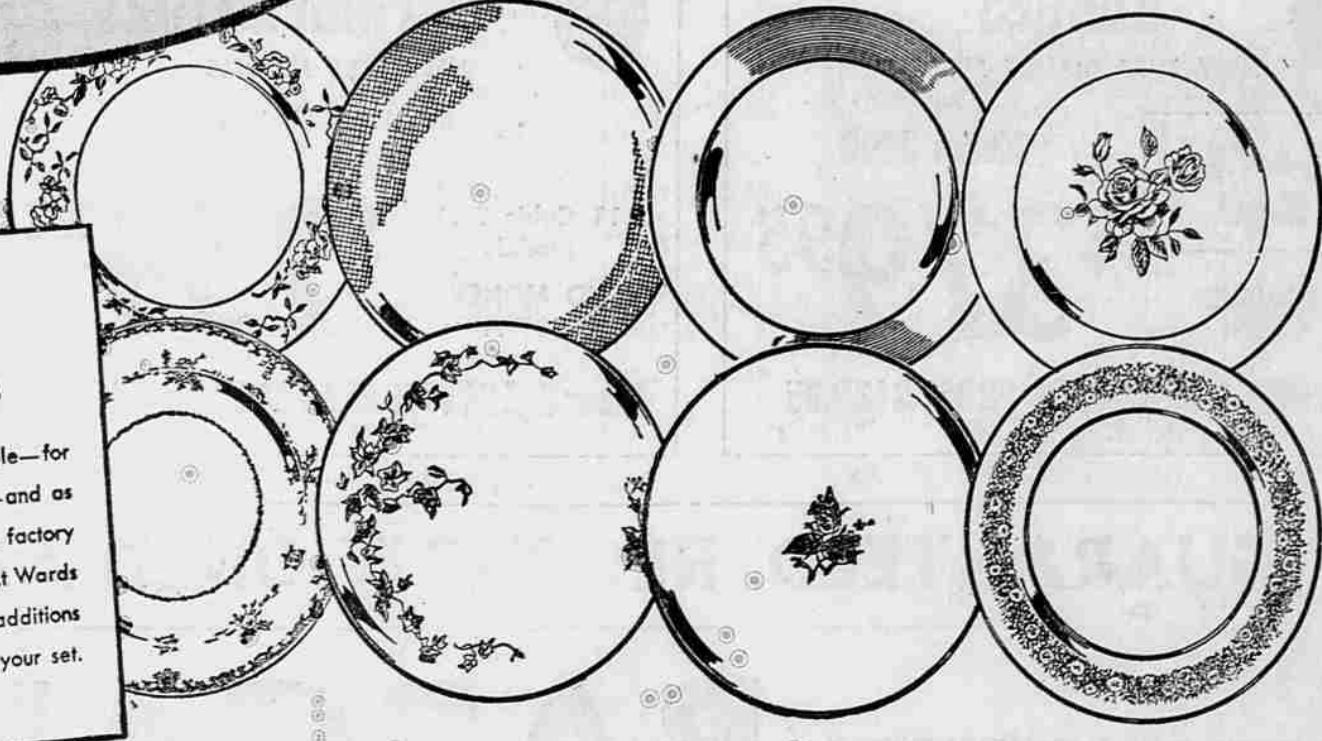

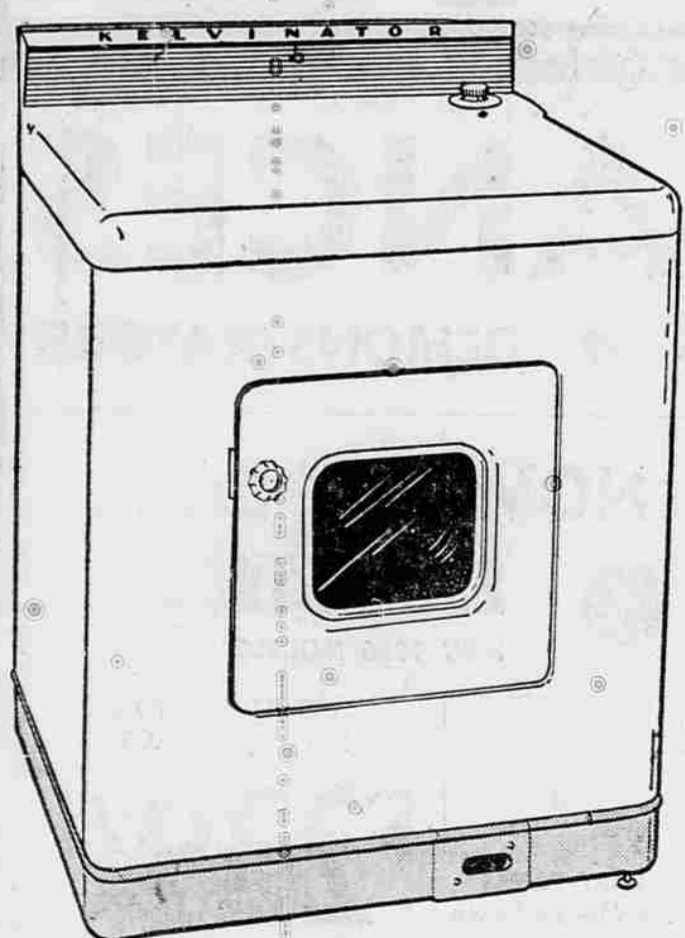
