

Stevenson's Unannounced Bid for Presidency Beginning To Pay Off Under Brilliant Stage Direction

Washington — (U.P.) — The brilliant stage direction of Adlai E. Stevenson's unannounced campaign for the Democratic presidential nomination is beginning to pay off big.



You might think Cecil B. DeMille was ordering up the lights and drops and background music. The Stevenson show has everything but suspense.

On the record, it seems obvious that the political statement Stevenson plans to make this month will be a declaration of his candidacy. The crack strategy of his managers has built a lot of motion into a campaign which has not yet been acknowledged.

Italy May Soon Call General Elections

Rome — (U.P.) — Premier Antonio Segni may follow the example of the French government and call general elections ahead of schedule to end domestic uncertainty, informed sources said today.

The normally well-informed Catholic news agency Ari said general elections, regularly scheduled in 1958, may be held either with or shortly after local elections next spring.

The government had no immediate comment but Deputy Premier Giuseppe Saragat admitted in a speech Sunday that the present badly split parliament had been "unable to react adequately."

Pennsylvania's Gov. George M. Leader is the latest big time Democrat to sign on with Stevenson. Democratic boss David Lawrence, Pittsburgh, already had indicated a liking for Stevenson. Now that Leader has spoken it would seem the state's big national convention delegation may be put in the Stevenson column. This week's invitation to enter the Minnesota primary was an impressive example of the Stevenson buildup.

Stevenson's unannounced campaign had one slight reverse, but that has been corrected. Former President Truman left the impression during a visit to New York that he favored Gov. Averell Harriman over Stevenson for the Democratic nomination. But Mr. Truman fixed that.

On most other fronts the Stevenson campaign is booming.

Missing Klamath Man Found Dead

Klamath Falls — (U.P.) — William Procie, a 67-year-old Klamath Falls man missing in the Aspin Lake area 15 miles west of here since Monday afternoon, was found dead by searchers about 3:30 p.m. yesterday—apparently the victim of a heart attack.

His body was found by State Policeman Lawrence Brills who said Procie was slumped over the wheel of his pickup truck which was covered with snow.

Deputy county coroner Bill Mills said death was apparently due to a heart attack brought on by overexertion. Friends said Procie had gone into the area to gather firewood. He returned with one load to his home and then departed for more and failed to return.

en campaign is booming. Tammany boss Carmine De Sapio was set back on his heels on a recent visit to California in search of Harriman delegates. Democratic Mayor Robert Wagner of New York seems to favor Stevenson as of now in preference to Harriman. Sen. Herbert H. Lehman of New York is firmly committed to the man from Illinois.

Harriman Likely Alternate

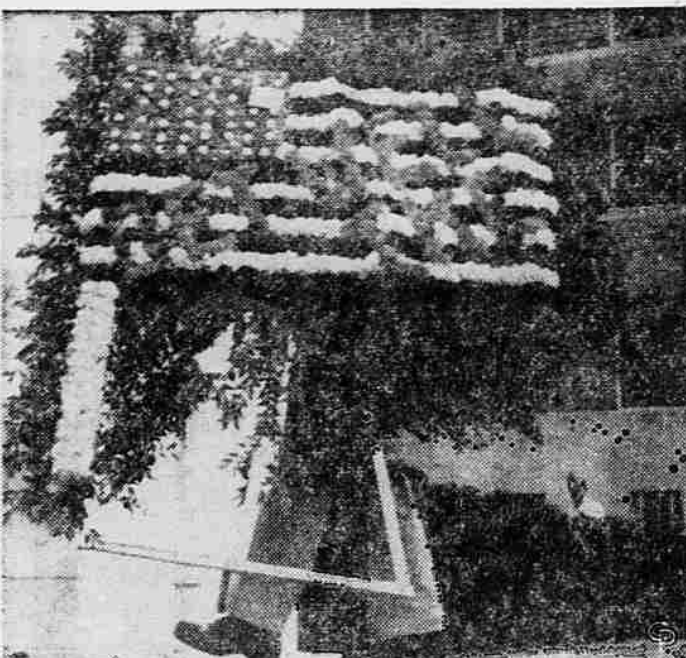
Harriman is counted by some persons the most likely alternate if the convention rejects Stevenson. The defection of Wagner and Lehman is not deadly to his candidacy. FDR won his first Democratic nomination with Mayor James J. Walker of New York City, former Gov. Alfred E. Smith and the entire Tammany organization opposing him.

But it is significant that Stevenson can chip away some of Harriman's Democratic associates. Stevenson has accomplished even more in Tennessee, where a coonskin cap is as much the badge of Sen. Estes Kefauver as of Davy Crockett. Gov. Frank J. Clement of Tennessee is for Stevenson for president, a fact which the senator must seriously consider before deciding to make another try for the White House.

Stevenson's candidacy has not yet come squarely up against those Southern conservatives who did not like him in 1952 and bolted to the Republican ticket. The breach in the Democratic Party remains wide and deep. None knows what will happen when the party factions resume next year in Chicago the dispute which was interrupted in 1952 by adjournment of the Democratic national convention.

But the current situation is not at all obscure. Stevenson is way out in front and gaining steadily.

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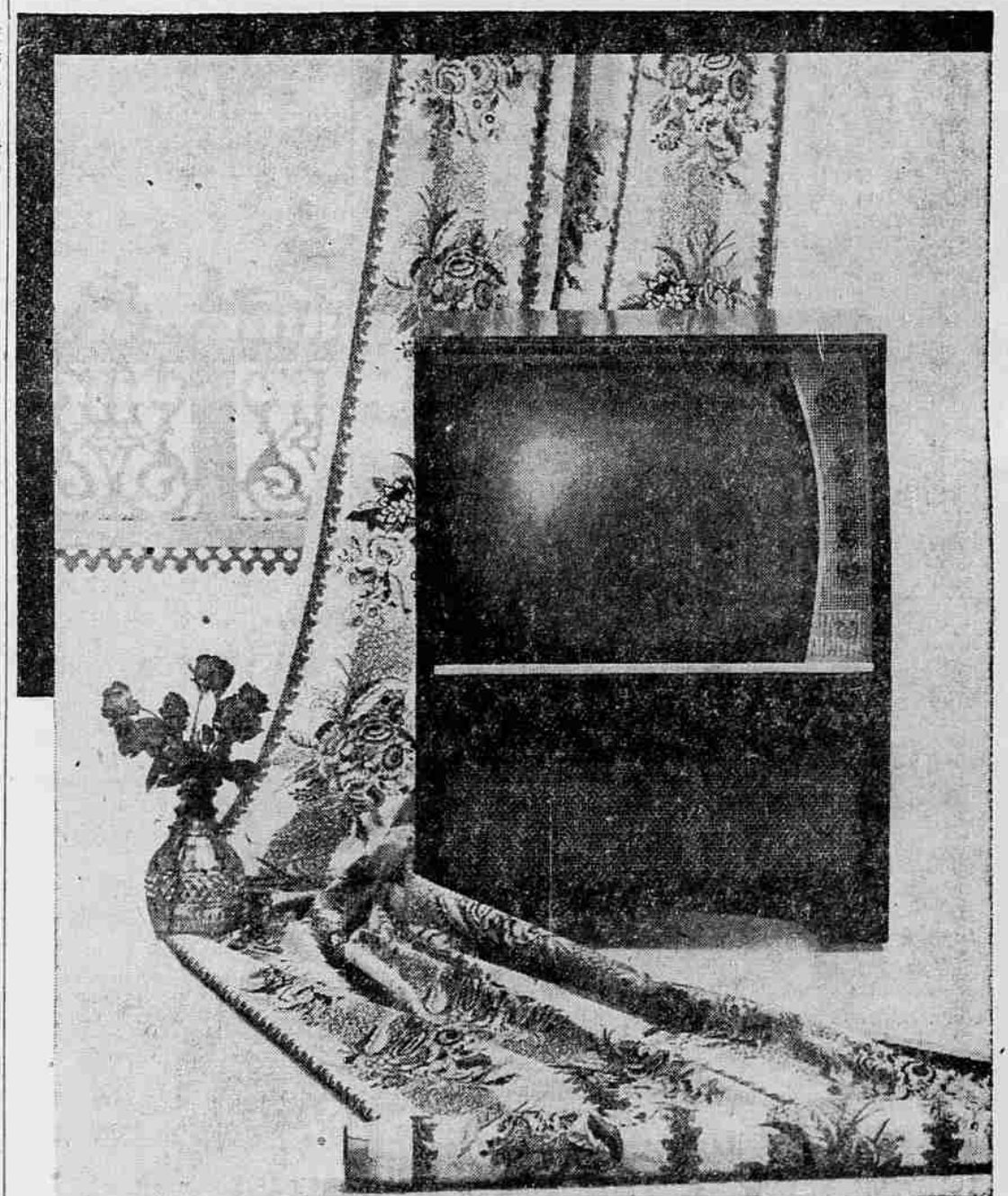
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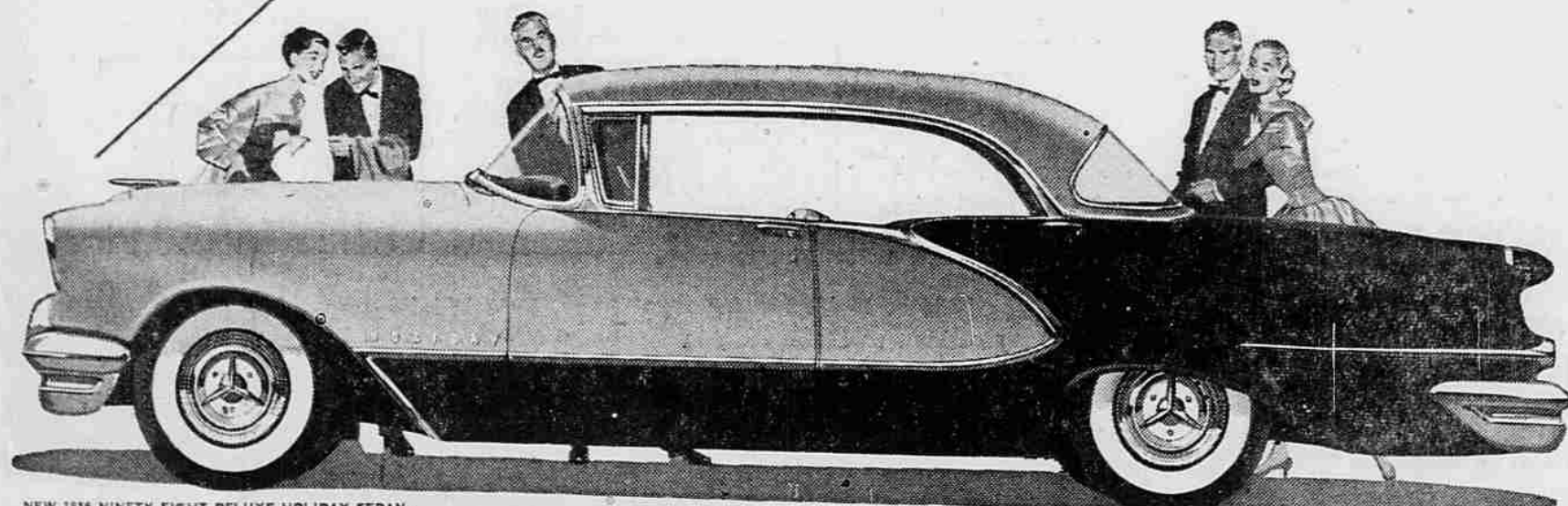


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
