### Two Patients Flown To Portland by MF

A Rogue River heart patient and an Ashland baby girl were flown to Portland for specialized medical attention last night by a Mercy Flights air ambulance plane.

The little girl was Cindy Kay Carlberg, 2 1/2 months, route 1, box 45, Ashland, who was transferred from Community hospital to Doernbecher hospital and was scheduled for brain surgery.

The other patient was Edgar Eaton, Rogue River, a cardiac case en route to the Veterans Administration hospital.

The flight, made by one of the new twin-Beech air ambulance planes, left here at 6 p.m. and returned at 9:30 p.m. The patients were the 415th and 416th carried by planes of the non-profit corporation since starting service in January, 1950.

### Grease Found Cause Of Cattle Disease

Ithaca, N.Y.—(U.P.)—A mysterious sickness among cattle herds in Israel has been solved by a Cornell University professor.

Dr. Peter Olafson of the University's veterinary college, went to Israel under the Point Four program at the request of the government to study the mysterious ailment.

He found that most of the cases occurred on farms which were highly mechanized. The cattle, it was discovered, were licking grease from the machines. The grease contained a chlorinated naphthalene, used in warm climates where machinery must work at higher temperatures and pressures.

### Watch Found After 35 Years Still Runs

Salinas, Calif.—(U.P.)—Some say that time never stands still, but it did so here—35 years worth.

A hunter recently returned to Mrs. Olga M. Fenchel, widow of a former ranch worker, the heavy, inscribed gold watch lost by her husband, Raymond, three and a half decades before while battling a fire in dense weeds near here.

The sturdy, old-fashioned timepiece is still in good shape, despite a few minor dents and scratches put on its casing by the hooves of passing cattle.

Fenchel spent a good part of his later life looking for the watch, passed on to him by his immigrant father, but always failed to turn it up.

Mrs. Fenchel gave thanks to the finder and said she now intends to continue the family tradition by giving the watch to her 13-year-old son to wear on his Sunday outfit.

### U.S. Made Airplanes Dominate Airlines

Washington—(U.P.)—American-built airliners dominate the commercial airlines of the free world. Even in Britain, the leading competitor for the world aircraft market, more than 20 percent of the big airliners operated are U.S.-made.

Planes, official publication of the Aircraft Industries Association, said a survey showed that over 90 percent of the planes flown by airlines of 39 nations were made in the U.S.

The survey also said that in 26 other countries more than half of all commercial airliners in use were built in this country, making a total of 65 nations favoring American planes. Of course, no account is taken in the survey of aircraft operating behind the Iron Curtain.

Planes says that the chances are at least 10 to 1 that the average traveler would fly entirely in airliners made in this country on an air trip around the world.

Many of the moving pictures to be shown were taken by the Rev. George Hughes, missionary, formerly of Medford. The public is invited. No admission charge or collection will be made.

### Radar Station Planned By Air Force at Baker

Spokane—(U.P.)—The Air Force plans to build a radar station in the Baker, Ore., area as part of the air defense command's network to detect enemy aircraft, Brig. Gen. Sam W. Agee, commander of the ninth air division, said today.

The Baker unit will be completed late next year and will be operated by about 200 officers and men of the 821st aircraft control and warning squadron to be activated at division headquarters at Geiger Air Force base here, he said.

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### Japan Military Stragglers Still in West Carolines

Koror, Palau, Caroline Islands (U.P.)—Trust Territory officials estimated today that there are at least seven Japanese military stragglers still in the Western Carolines, and probably more on other islands of the South Pacific.

One Korean member of a Japanese army labor battalion was captured recently by natives on the neighboring island of Peleliu. He was amazed to learn of Japan's surrender 10 years ago.

District Commissioner Donald Heron said seven Japanese stragglers were known to be on the adjoining island of Babelthou two years ago.

"We have every reason to believe they are still there," Heron said. "A Palauan woman claimed she saw a Japanese recently, and there has been no reports of any of them dying or leaving the island."

Police officials on Guam said three Japanese stragglers were reported in the rugged southeastern section of the island several months ago, and are believed to be living in the dense jungle and remote valleys of Guam.

Heron said there was no way of knowing whether the Babelthou stragglers were from the Japanese army or one of the labor battalions recruited in Korea and Okinawa.

Only two islands in the Palau group were occupied during the war—Peleliu and adjoining Anguar, the phosphate island. Army troops captured the 3.5 square mile island of Anguar, and the Marines took Peleliu after a bitter fight and heavy casualties.

The rest of the Palaus, including the islands of Koror and Babelthou, were by-passed, and the Japanese occupation forces were supposedly all removed by American Naval forces at the end of World War II.

Heron said the stragglers probably deserted from the Japanese Army and have now fused themselves so completely with the natives that it would be extremely difficult to track them down.

A police official on Guam said any of the three Japanese still believed to be on the island could easily travel about without being detected.

"They not only can move about freely," he said, "but they undoubtedly do."

Heron explained that no attempts were being made to capture the stragglers on Babelthou.
