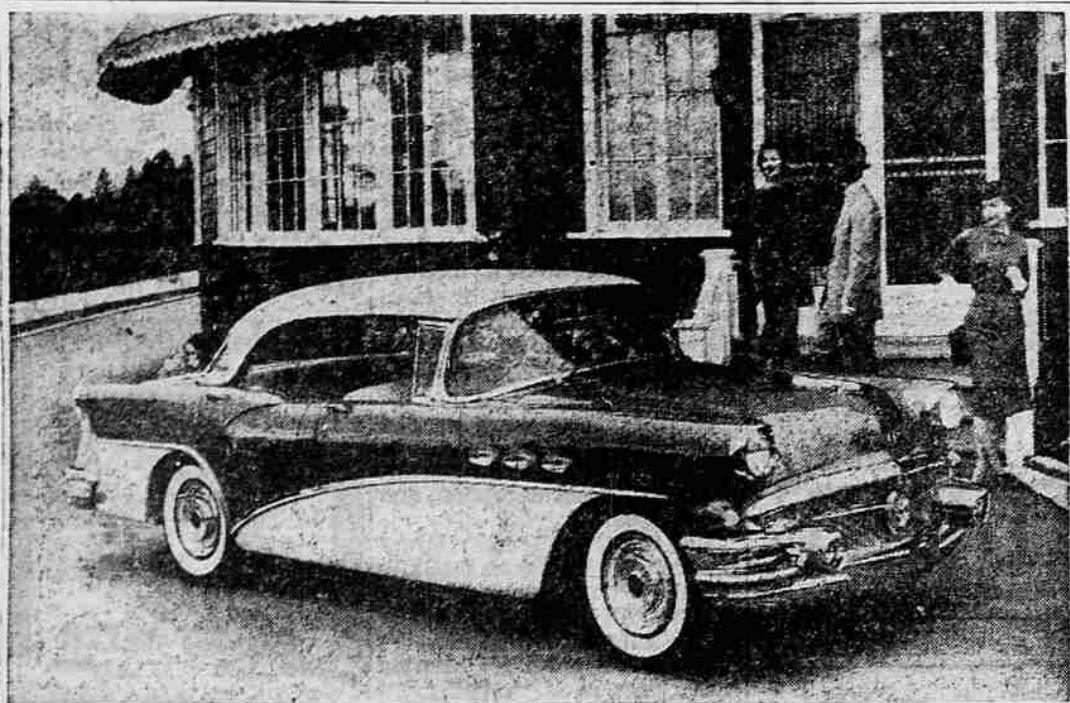

Upper Midwest Covered by First Blanket of Snow

Snow made its seasonal debut in much of the Midwest today and temperatures nosedived in acknowledgment.

The snow, born on a blast of cold Canadian air, stretched as far south as Missouri and Southern Illinois. Early today, the cold front was carrying it east into Michigan.

Up to three inches of snow fell on the Chicago area while the temperature dropped 13 degrees in six hours. The weight of the wet, sticky snow snapped power lines and broke off three limbs in the city's outlying sections.

It was the first "real snow-fall" of the year for a vast area

and children turned out in droves to make snowmen and pelt each other with snowballs.

A freezing northwest wind came in the snow's wake, threatening to turn the slush into ice. Warnings of poor visibility and ice-slicked highways were issued for parts of the Midwest.

City Police Clear 96 Per Cent of Cases in October

Medford police during October cleared 96 per cent of the cases reported, an increase of one per cent over the number cleared for the same period in 1954 and 1953.

A total of 1,208 cases were reported, including 54 major offenses, an 1,165 were closed. Of the 54 major cases, 28 or 52 per cent, were cleared.

For the same period in 1954, a total of 842 cases were reported, of which 802, or 95 per cent, were closed. In October, 1953, some 830 of the 876 cases reported were closed for a 95 percentage.

More Major Cases

There were more major offenses last month than for the corresponding month in 1954 and 1953. Last year, 47, major offenses were reported with 23 cleared for a 49 percentage, and in 1953, some 19 of the 51 reported major crimes were cleared.

Police investigated 385 miscellaneous offenses last month, clearing 368, or 96 per cent, of the cases. Police made 70 miscellaneous public reports and rendered 699 various type services last month.

Strict Enforcement Ordered by Council

Eagle Point — The Eagle Point city council this week ordered stricter enforcement on traffic violations in the city, and said more severe penalties will be levied in an attempt to check an increase in apparent reckless driving and speeding.

Councilmen reported that several residents have noted increased recklessness by some drivers in Eagle Point, and feared that pedestrians may be injured.

Two men were fined in Eagle Point police court recently. Pete Marion Jackson was fined \$25 for violation of basic rule, and Rodney Donald Suttle was fined \$15 for violation of basic rule, and \$5 for no operator's license. The council also discussed minor street repair work.

Miss Hayworth married Haymes in 1933 after divorcing Aly Khan, who is visiting with their daughter Yasmin in Paris. She was also married to Edward C. Judson and actor Orson Wells.

Dr. Leander Riba said Stevenson was in Passavant Hospital Monday and Tuesday. Stevenson's last serious ailment was in 1954, when he was operated on for a kidney stone.

Stevenson, the 1952 Democratic presidential nominee, is expected to announce his 1956 presidential candidacy within the next two weeks.
