Death Takes Cy Young, Hurling Star

Peoli, O.—(U.P.)—Denton True (Cy) Young, who won a record total of 511 major league games during a 22-year career in the National and American leagues, died today while sitting in his favorite rocking chair. He was 83 years old.

A member of baseball's Hall of Fame, the powerfully built Young, who never earned more than \$5000 in a single season, pitched three no-hitters, including a perfect game, and also won 30 or more games in five different campaigns.

Young pitched in 906 games, more than any other pitcher in baseball history, and struck out a total of 2836 batters. His lifetime big league totals with Cleveland, St. Louis and both Boston clubs showed 511 victories and 315 losses, both all-time highs.

Young claimed to the last that he had actually won 512 games. "Twice 512," he would snap. "I won a game they forgot to give me credit for."

Young died sitting in a favorite rocking chair at the home of Mr. and Mrs. John Benedum with whom he had been living for many years.

Death was attributed to a heart attack.

Young, an iron-man pitcher in both major leagues in his 22-year career which ended in 1911 set a number of records which still stand.

As a pitcher, he won more games, pitched more games, and played in the majors a total of 22 seasons.

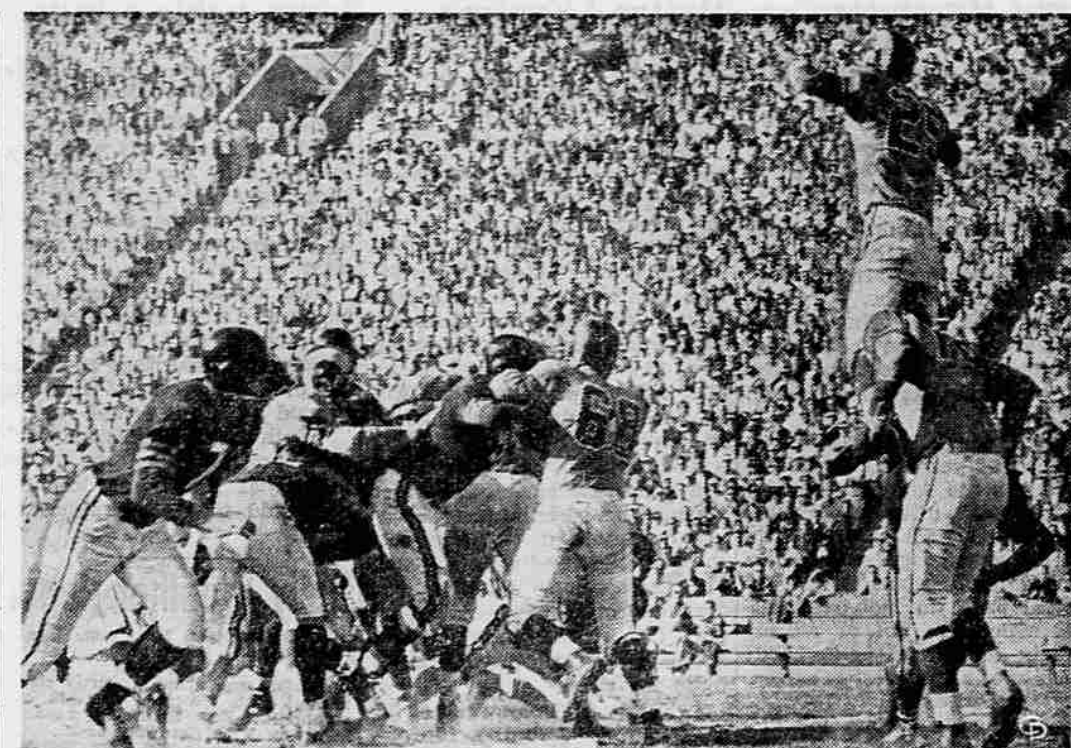

Carp Eradicated In Bird Refuge

Portland — (U.P.) — More than 1,500,000 carp have been eradicated by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service on the Malheur National Wildlife Refuge in eastern Oregon to improve food conditions for waterfowl.

Leo L. Laythe, regional director of the service, said the project on Malheur Lake and tributary river systems was nearing completion. It was being financed by \$37,500 in refuge funds made available by the Interior Department.

The fish control project, one of the largest undertakings, was made necessary by the heavy carp population that impaired the growth and development of aquatic vegetation used as both food and nesting cover by waterfowl.

Ryder Drawings Scheduled Today

Palm Springs, Calif.—(U.P.)—Drawings will be made today for the 11th biennial Ryder Cup matches, but no matter which way they go, the U.S. team will be favored.

It looks like the American No. 1 team will be Sam Snead and Dr. Cary Middlecoff, with Jackie Burke and Tommy Bolt the No. 2 club.

That's just conjecture, because U.S. Capt. Chick Harbert wasn't to make his announcement until late this afternoon—the same time that Capt. Dia Rees of the British team will announce his selections.

Kuharich Decries Plastic Helmets

Washington — (U.P.) — Coach Joe Kuharich of the Washington Redskins called today for the abolition of plastic helmets and face masks as "too dangerous" for modern football.

His boss, George Preston Marshall, backed him up and said he would propose that the National Football league ban the use of face masks and plastic helmets beginning next season.

Kuharich said plastic helmets are a little protection to the player wearing them and can do "a great deal of harm to opposing players."

"They're too hard and unyielding," the Washington coach said. "They should either be covered with a half-inch sponge rubber coating or discarded completely in favor of leather helmets. Maybe the leather jobs don't look as pretty but they're safer."

12 Rookies Aiding Cause For Orioles

Baltimore, Md.—(U.P.)—"Some people said we were crazy to carry 12 rookies this year, but the kids have sure come through."

That's how Coach Webb Eubank explains the surprising success of his Baltimore Colts at the halfway point in the National Football League campaign.

The Colts, who never before won more than three games in one season, have a 4-2 record and are tied with the Los Angeles Rams for the Western Division lead.

"It shows we are headed in the right direction in our rebuilding program," Eubank said after drilling his huskies for their Saturday night game with the Lions at Detroit.

The chubby Eubank believes he hit the jackpot this year with such rookies as fullback Alan Ameche, quarterback George Shaw and halfback L. G. Dupre.

Ameche, the former All-American star from Wisconsin, leads the league in rushing with 635 yards and shows no signs of letting up. He gained 117 yards during Baltimore's 14-10 triumph over the Green Bay Packers last Saturday night.

Shaw also played an important part in the victory over the Packers.

Dupre, ex-Baylor player who returned to the lineup in sound physical shape for the first time since the exhibition season, scored the winning touchdown against Green Bay.

Dog Warden Disposes Of Big City Problem

Cadillac, Mich.—(U.P.)—The Cadillac-Wexford dog warden, Stanley Herron, modestly admits he is a versatile man.

A housewife called city police recently to complain that a hornet nest near her home was ready to topple. The police immediately suggested she present her problem to the city manager, who in turn politely but firmly referred her to the local conservation officer.

From the conservation office, her call was directed to the fire department. But fire officials said insects were a little out of their line and suggested she try the police station again.

Finally, Herron came to the rescue of hesitant city officials and gingerly disposed of the nest — hornets and all.

"I just cut them down, poured a little gasoline on them and burned the whole thing," he explained.

G. Johnson Choice Over Bobby Boyd

Chicago — (U.P.) — George Johnson, Trenton, N.J. middleweight, was 7 to 5 favorite today to whip Bobby Boyd of Chicago in tonight's television bout from the Chicago Stadium and move back to a rating among the top ten 160-pounders.

Johnson, New Jersey champion, once was ranked seventh among the middleweights, but lost the rating when an operation for appendicitis put him on the sidelines for six months. The test against Boyd, Illinois midweight champion who has beaten Gene Fullmer and Willie Troy in his last two outings, was expected to vault the winner into the ratings again.

Johnson has had seven fights since his operation, losing only to Ralph (Tiger) Jones while winning six. His victory over Bobby Dykes, former middleweight and light-heavyweight contender, in his last start was the most impressive on his comeback path.

Johnson was a substitute batter for his bout with Dykes and tonight both he and Boyd will be substitutes. The card tonight was to have matched Bobo Olson and Ray Robinson for the midweight title, but it was postponed until Dec. 9 when Robinson sprained an ankle.
