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DETERGENT FOR FLOWERS
Ithaca, N. Y.—(U.P.)—Use detergent to freshen flowers. The New York State Extension service suggests dissolving 1 level teaspoon of household detergent in a quart of water, and putting the base of the flower stems in the solution for an hour. The soaking will open the "pipe-lines" and let the water move up through the stem. Don't over-soak. After a couple of hours, the detergent water may poison the flowers.

New York—(U.P.)—A new, low cost portable crib is available for doting grandparents to keep on hand for visiting babies. The crib, made of corrugated fiber board, can be set up or folded flat in just a few minutes. It fits into a carrying case which is about the size of a folded bridge table.
