## Search Party Tramps Woods For Days After Boys Found

**Reedspore** — (U.P.) — An eight-man search party spent considerably more time in the woods looking for two Eugene boys than was necessary. The party, headed by Marvin Haskell of Loon Lake, came out of the rugged country around Loon lake in western Douglas county Saturday morning at Allegany in Coos county. They had been in the woods some 30 hours and estimated they had hiked 60 to 70 miles in search for the boys.

The boys, Glenn A. Lague and Donald Miller, both 16, walked out of the woods at Allegany Thursday night. They had left their homes Oct. 28 on an elk hunt. The party didn't know the boys had been found and kept searching until they trailed the boys to Allegany this morning. They said their portable radio equipment was in good condition but they apparently got out of range of communications.

## Sanitation Said Not Implicated in Polio Epidemic

**Nyssa** — (U.P.) — Two Oregon health officials said Saturday reports on surveys conducted by teams from Idaho and Oregon contained nothing to point to sanitary conditions as a cause of this year's polio epidemic in Malheur county.

The statement was made jointly by Dr. Grant B. Hughes, county health officer, and Dr. S. B. Osbood, epidemiologist with the Oregon Health department. The doctors added, however, that the two surveys showed that sanitation conditions had deteriorated in the county during the past several months. **Complete Inoculation** Officials Saturday completed mass gamma globulin inoculations in the Nyssa school district in a desperate effort to halt the spread of polio in the county. The surveys were requested just prior to the inoculation program to see if sanitary conditions might possibly be a contributing factor to the epidemic. About 2,600 persons went through the inoculations as of noon Saturday, and Hughes estimated that the number would be raised to 3,000 by the time the program was completed tonight. The two health authorities said the studies, while eliminating sanitation conditions as a cause of the polio epidemic, pointed up the need for a full time sanitation within the county.

## Bad Weather Causes Lumber Job Layoffs

**Salem** — (U.P.) — Snow and rain in the lumber areas caused much of the seasonal layoff of more than 5000 workers during October to bring the total to 21,000 during October, the State Unemployment Compensation Commission reported Saturday. This figure was 9300 under the same period last year. The weather also hit construction workers. The number of persons actively seeking work more than doubled in the Eugene, Lebanon, Roseburg, Toledo and Medford areas.

## Mt. Shasta Indian Deal Found in Book

**Ukiah, Calif.** — (U.P.) — The deal the Dutch gave the Indians for Manhattan Island looks shrewder than ever when compared with the agreement between the early white settlers and the native Shasta tribes of northern California.

An undated, age-yellowed news item defining terms of the 1851 agreement was found here recently pasted inside the cover of an old book. By order of the Ukiah City Council, the book now remains under lock and key and no longer may be circulated. Indian Agent O. M. Wenzelcraft met with the chiefs of all the tribes in the Mt. Shasta area and entered into an agreement entitled "A Treaty of Peace and Friendship." The signatory tribes bore such colorful names as Noe-Ma-Noe-Ma, Y-Lac Ca, No Ma, Noi Ma and Oy-Lac-Ca.

In return for dispossessing the Indians of considerable real estate, the treaty stipulated they would get: "Five hundred head of beef cattle, 75 sacks of flour, one pair of strong pantaloons and one red flannel shirt for each man and boy, one linsey gown for each woman and girl."

"Two thousand yards of calico and 500 yards of brown shirting. 20 pounds of Scotch thread and two dozen pair scissors, one 2½ point mackinaw blanket for each man and woman over 15 years of age."

"One thousand pounds of iron, 100 pounds of steel, and in like manner in the first year for the permanent use of the said tribes and as their joint property, viz: "Seventy-five brood mares and four stallions, 200 milch cows and 16 bulls, 21 yoke work cattle with yokes and chains; 10 work mules or horses, 22 plows, assorted sizes, 75 garden or corn hoes, 25 spades and four grindstones."

**Minor Earthquake Rocks Eureka Area**

The quake hit at 8:47 p.m. Residents reported it rattled dishes and windows. The University of California seismograph station reported the tremor failed to register on its sensitive instruments.

## Spokane Man Dies In Highway Mishap

**Bend** — (U.P.) — Victor Miller, 22, Spokane, Wash., was fatally injured early Saturday when his automobile ran off the highway and overturned about 20 miles south of here. Police said the car was driven by an unidentified sailor who disappeared following the accident. Miller died en route to a Bend hospital.

James Fisher, 19, Spokane, Miller's nephew, told officers he was following his uncle's car in his own vehicle when the accident occurred. He said they were returning to Spokane from Los Angeles.
