Groups Named To Improve Fire Fighting Efficiency

Discussion of Labor Day week-end fires in this area has resulted in appointment of five sub-committees designed to increase Jackson county forest fire fighting efficiency. They were named at the first meeting of a newly formed Fire Committee held recently.

Formation of the Fire Committee by the Southern Oregon Conservation and Tree Farm association grew out of a realization of intense forest fire danger in the county and the need for close cooperation between private industry and federal, state and county agencies to combat the menace.

Members Named
Members of the committee, which met at the association office, are George Flanagan, chairman, Elk Lumber company; Jack Crump, vice-chairman, Sunny Valley Lumber company; Robert Kline, Kline Logging company; Eugene Burrill, Eugene F. Burrill Lumber company; Herb Hill, Fir Milling and Planing company; Ted Maul, State Forest Patrol; Jack Wood, U. S. Forest Service; E. K. Peterson, Bureau of Land Management; Nils Edin, Alley Lumber company; and Howard Russell, Hunter and Best Sawmill, Inc. Art Davies, association president, and L. C. "Doc" Simpson, forester, are ex-officio members.

The integrated program, which will utilize forest service, state, and private industry facilities for combating fires, is one of the most advanced steps yet taken in the formation of cooperative fire plans.

Fire Plan Stated
A fire plan will be drawn up by the group, listing the location and number of available fire tools and available trained personnel. The plan will be distributed to private industry, Forest Service, and state fire control agencies.

The sub-committees were appointed after a detailed discussion of the Labor Day week-end fires and action taken to combat them.

On Labor Day week-end, Sept. 5, fires in the Sykes creek, Blackwell hill and Timber mountain areas of Jackson county "exploded" and burned over 10,000 acres of timberland. More than 1000 men fought to control the blazes.

The sub-committees are designed to carry out the purpose of the Fire Committee by increased training of all types of fire fighting personnel; reviewing forest fire fighting equipment; and coordinating fire fighting communications.

The five committees are the organization and training committee, fire equipment committee, communications committee, fire-ama committee, and the cooperative agreement committee.

Crump Chairman
Jack Crump is chairman of the organization and training committee which will train all types of personnel but especially men badly needed as supervisors and foremen to direct fire fighting operations. Other members of the committee are Jack Wood, Ted Maul, and E. K. Peterson.

The fire cataloging committee will catalog existing equipment and its location, and obtain the type of equipment needed to back up state and Forest Service equipment. Committee members are Eugene Burrill, chairman; Doyle Stockton, State Forest Patrol; Herb Hild; and Howard Russell.

A communications committee, headed by Robert Kline, will act to coordinate three existing systems of communication between fire fighters belonging to private industry, forest service and the state. It will also organize additional equipment, such as mobile trailers equipped with electrical systems for broadcasting. Other members are Nils Edin; Tom Winniford, Southern Oregon College and tree farm association radio technician; and Harold Howard, U. S. Forest Service radio technician.

Plan Display
The fire-ama sub-committee is charged with the job of making preliminary plans for a public display of fire fighting tools and equipment owned by private industry, Forest service, Bureau of Land Management, and the forest patrol. Committee members are Sam Taylor, chairman, Elk Lumber company; and Spencer (Tenny) Moore, U. S. Forest Service.

The cooperative agreement committee will revamp a fire fighting agreement which has been in effect in the county since 1952 to include innovations of the new program. The committee is composed of George Flanagan, chairman; Eugene Burrill, Sam Taylor, Jack Crump, and Robert Kline.
