Witnesses Tell of Hearing Gunshots At Time of Murder

Kingsville, Tex. — (U.P.) — The two witnesses who told police they heard shots near the death site on Oct. 23, the day after Mrs. Violet Worden says she killed her husband may be questioned by Kleberg county authorities.

Kleberg County Attorney Royce Johnston said he and District Attorney Sam Jones of Corpus Christi want to talk to those two witnesses.

Wife Admitted Crime
Worden, a 45-year-old real estate man, was shot and killed October 22 on a lonely spot on Padre island. His wife came to authorities 10 days later and said she killed him.

Mrs. Worden said she did so only because her husband had handed her a pistol and told her to kill her five-year-old daughter by a previous marriage. She and Worden had been wed only two months.

The two witnesses told Nueces county sheriff's officers they heard shots near the death site on Oct. 23, the day after Mrs. Worden says she shot and buried her husband. His body was found several days later.

Johnston said he had not yet obtained the names of the witnesses and in Corpus Christi it was reported an officer had mislaid the names of the two men, both from Corpus Christi.

Free On Bond
Mrs. Worden is now free in \$5000 bond under a murder charge. Authorities said that when they complete their investigations they will present the facts to a grand jury which will decide if they warrant an indictment.

Johnston disclosed last night that authorities in Portland, Ore., will be asked to run tests on clothing in a trunk sent by Mrs. Worden to Portland after the shooting. The tests will be to determine if the clothing is blood-stained.

P-I Manager Gives Gloomy Report of Future of Event

Portland—(U.P.)—The manager of Portland's Pacific International Livestock Exposition yesterday said there was no point to continue the PI "merely to watch a funeral."

PI Manager Walter A. Holt, addressing a meeting here of the Oregon Fairs Association, said the exposition posed "a very unhappy situation," but "might operate for another year."

Others Optimistic
Holt's gloomy report on the exposition, which suffered from decreased attendance this year, was the only non-optimistic note sounded at the meeting.

Also addressing the meeting was Eddie Cole, secretary of the International Rodeo Association who said the elimination of a federal income tax on fairs and rodeos had been a great stimulant.

Cole described the modern rodeo cowboy as a "businessman on a bull's or broncho's back, often without any cowpoke experience."

Bambi Goes to Jail, Then Given Parole

Vinalhaven, Me. — (U.P.) — Police Chief Ray Tibbets locked up this island's pet deer "Bambi" in jail when he became belligerent.

Tibbets reported today the deer has been paroled and apparently has learned his lesson.

New Way Found To Make Strong Metals

Chicago—(U.P.)—The Armour Research Foundation reports it has found a new way to make light, strong metals.

The foundation, part of the Illinois Institute of Technology, calls the new technique "fiber metallurgy."

The new material can be made with a wide range of porosities, combined with relatively high strength and toughness, he said.

Among the uses of the new material, Metcalf said, is aircraft construction. Metal fibers also could be used to strengthen plastics, he added.

Apple Picking on Assembly Line Basis

East Lansing, Mich. — (U.P.) — Michigan State university has put apple-picking on an assembly line basis.

Experts claim efficiency is increased from five to 10 per cent by applying the scientific method to an age-old process. Under the modernized system, picking crews are divided into three groups. One of them stands on the ground and picks all the apples it can reach before moving to another tree.

The second group specializes in covering a zone from about six to 12 feet off the ground by using six-foot stepladders. The third squad cleans-up, using tall ladders to clamber among the treetops.

Cold War Halts Soccer Broadcast

London—(U.P.)—The Foreign Office refused to let Radio Moscow broadcast a Soviet-British soccer game last night because Russia jams British accounts of sporting matches.

"Each time the Russians ask for facilities to broadcast to Moscow," a foreign office spokesman explained later, "we agree provided they undertake not to jam our British Broadcasting Corp. Russian language broadcast of the match."

Port of Portland Lists 15 Per Cent Increase in Cargo

Portland—(U.P.)—A fifteen per cent increase in cargo moved through the Port of Portland in the first 10 months of this year was reported today by the Portland Merchants Exchange.

The report said exports were up 35 per cent, imports up 60 per cent, domestic receipts up 13 per cent, shipments to Hawaii up 11 per cent and receipts from Hawaii up 16 per cent.

Coastal Shipments Down
Coastwise, intercoastal and Alaskan shipments were down 10 per cent.

The exchange credited the increases to heavy grain shipments to Japan, western Europe, Korea and Okinawa, Central and South America. It said 1955 grain shipping year in the history of the Columbia river ports. Exports from Portland, Vancouver, Longview and Astoria, combined have totaled 52,621,984 bushels so far this year.

New McNary Dam To Power Producer

Walla Walla — (U.P.) — McNary Dam, with only nine of its 10 generators in action, Monday became the biggest power producer of all dams built and operated by the Army Corps of Engineers, the district engineer's office reported yesterday.

The announcement said the dam produced some 720,000 kilowatts, which also was the most for any day since the Columbia River dam was completed. The No. 4 unit was closed for painting when the record was set.

Portland Hunter Reported Missing

Portland—(U.P.)—Friends said today that Andrew J. Douglas, 54, had failed to return home here from an elk hunting trip to the Ukiah area of eastern Oregon.

Douglas and Fred L. Cornelius, 72, left here in Douglas' car Oct. 27 and were to have returned Nov. 3. Cornelius said he got a ride home sooner and had last seen Douglas at their campsite some 16 miles south of Ukiah.

Douglas is a watchman at a flour company here.

Authorities said the youths were in a car stolen from the West Hills area of Portland Tuesday night. It was disabled when it spun to a stop.
