

Union Thanksgiving Services Planned

The Medford Ministerial association made plans Tuesday for a community-wide Thanksgiving service to be held at 10 a.m. in the First Baptist church on Thanksgiving day. The Rev. William C. Piper, minister of the First Christian church, will be the speaker.

Members of the First Baptist choir will furnish music.

A meeting was held today at First Methodist church for ministers and laymen interested in promotion and use of the Bible. Dr. Gerald LaRue of the Oregon Council of Churches, and professor at the Pacific School of Religion, was main speaker.

Walter Nunley, district attorney, spoke Tuesday to the ministers on the legal aspects of marriage, divorce, and the custody of children.

A statement of endorsement of the Rogue Valley Memorial hospital building program was presented by the Rev. George R. V. Bolster, and passed by the association. The ministers agreed "that all in a position to do so should cooperate in the movement to build this memorial hospital."

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Winter Schedule at Jacksonville Museum Set; Visitors Listed

Jacksonville — The Jacksonville museum will go on its winter schedule effective next Monday, it was announced today by Miss Mary Hanley, curator.

Until March 1, the museum will be closed each Monday. The rest of the week it will be open from noon to 4 p.m.

Miss Hanley reported the 200-000th visitor to the museum since it opened came in on Oct. 10. She was Mrs. V. L. Gritsch, San Francisco, and was presented with a souvenir pen by Miss Hanley as a memento.

Other Visitors

Other visitors during October came from 33 states, Scotland, Germany, England, Arabia, several provinces of Canada, and Hawaii and Alaska. Several school classes visited the museum during the month. October visitors totaled 2,041, compared to 2,081 during October, 1954.

Miss Hanley reported a number of gifts to the museum during the month.

A book entitled "California in the Fifties" was presented by Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Ferguson. It is from the collection of Glenn A. Schaefer of Pasadena, Calif., Ferguson's cousin.

A collection of old dishes, cups, bowls, saucers, sauce dishes and a plate, and a silk dress nearly 100 years old and a brooch were presented by Mrs. A. S. V. Carpenter, who also brought a large ironstone salad plate, a loan from Mrs. B. A. Daugherty.

Brooch Given
James E. Dean, Springfield, Ore., presented a gift because he said he thought the Jacksonville museum was the nicest to leave it with. It is a hand-carved ivory brooch which was very old when it was brought to the United States from Germany by the parents of Mary Angeline Talmadge. She brought it across the plains with her when she and her husband came west in 1852 to settle near Lodi, Calif.

Other articles, Miss Hanley

said, are an Indian ceremonial knife, found in the Grants Pass area, and an opium weighing scale. These are loaned by Jack Sutton, Grants Pass, who also gave the top of the old mill at Gold Hill once owned by J. J. Houck, and a picture of the first jail authorized and built at Kerbyville in 1857. A picture of Sampson McConnell, a miner and farmer of 1852, also was presented. He was a member of Company B, 2nd mounted volunteers, in the Indian wars.

Handicapped Scouts Receive Advancement

Eugene — (U.P.) — Six members of what is believed to be the only Boy Scout troop in the nation composed entirely of handicapped youngsters were advanced from tenderfoot and second class scout at the troop's first court of honor here last night.

Troop 301 of Eugene and Springfield is made up of 16 boys.

Troop Chairman Paul Landsdowne of Eugene said that the boys have shown exceptional ability considering their handicap. He said some of the normal scouting requirements have been waived, but that each lad is required to do all his condition permits.

Arabian Ambassador Recalled from London

London—(U.P.)—Recall of Saudi Arabia's ambassador has stirred concern that the desert nation might break off diplomatic relations with Britain because of British reoccupation of the disputed Buraimi oasis.

Sheikh Hafiz Wahba, the Saudi Arabian envoy here for 25 years, informed the British Foreign office Tuesday that he will soon return to Jeddah. He did not indicate how long he would be away.

N. Thomas Stoddard State MOD Leader

Portland—N. Thomas Stoddard, Portland business executive, has been named to head the 1956 March of Dimes in Oregon. Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, announced in New York today.

Stoddard replaces John J. Gurian, also of Portland, who resigned the state dimes post after accepting a position with his firm in New York City.

"We are most pleased to announce Mr. Stoddard has agreed to step into this position of leadership," O'Connor said. "We know the January campaign will continue to have the strong support it had under Mr. Gurian's guidance."

O'Connor pointed out that some 70,000 victims of polio from this and previous years are dependent on the March of Dimes for assistance in their fight toward recovery.

BLM Schedules Sale Of Timber Tracts

Oral auction of two tracts of timber, one in Josephine county and the other in Klamath county, is scheduled for 10:30 a.m. Thursday, Nov. 17, in the Bureau of Land Management offices in Medford city hall, it was announced this week.

The Josephine county tract, made up largely of Douglas fir, includes 3,818,000 board feet of timber with an appraised price of \$82,564.85.

The Klamath county tract includes 3,296,000 board feet of timber with an appraised price of \$73,696.70. It is about equally made up of Douglas fir, white fir, and other species.

No bid for less than the appraised price will be accepted on either tract. Deposits will be required.

Walls Acquitted Of Gold Charge

Portland — (U.P.) — Hotelman Wilbur M. Walls Tuesday was acquitted by a Federal Court jury here of a charge of acquiring and possessing gold bullion without a treasury license. The trial came more than a year after Walls' arrest.

Stephen Crippen and Woodrow Wilson Atwood, both of Medford, were also arrested by secret service agents in connection with the bullion case. Crippen was found innocent at an earlier trial and Atwood was placed on six months' probation after pleading guilty.
