Denver—President Eisenhower asking the Russians not to start an arms race in the Near East:

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Compulsory Checking Of Automobiles Eyed By State Legislator

State Rep. E. A. (Al) Littrell, Medford, indicated yesterday

that he may present a bill on compulsory inspection of motor vehicles at the next session of the Oregon State Legislature.

The legislator, addressing Medford Kiwanis club at its weekly luncheon, spoke of the need of such legislation. He said that in his automotive parts business he is in a position to know about defective parts on autos.

Littrell, member of the State Legislature's highway interim committee, outlined the work and duties of that group. He prepared a paper for the com-

mittee on compulsory auto inspection.

Investigation of the state park system and study of the highway bypass system were described by Representative Littrell as "hottest" items before the highway committee. He expressed his own personal opinion that the highway department is doing a "beautiful job" in maintaining the parks and that they can be administered more economically under that department than under a separate park commission. He pointed to availability of highway department personnel during slack periods of highway work.

The parks matter is also being probed by a governor's committee.

Japan May Deport 93 Red Chinese

Tokyo — (U.P.) — Immigration officials said Wednesday Japan hoped to ship 93 Chinese nationals under deportation orders "soon" to either Formosa or Communist China.

A spokesman said investigations planned to question Chinese inmates of Hamaztsu detention camp to persuade them to apply for repatriation to either Nationalist or Communist China.

Littrell stated that there has not been enough publicity in what Oregon has in the way of state parks. He said that there are 156 parks covering 55,000 acres and mentioned Honeyman and Wallowa Lake parks among the finest in the system.

Bypass Study Set
The interim committee has contracted with the University of Oregon to make a thorough study of the economy of bypasses.

On the matter of automobile inspections Littrell reported that 20 states have full or partial inspection laws with costs ranging 25 cents to \$1.50. He reported figures on 500,000 in-

spectations showing faulty brakes on one out of six cars, lights on one out of 11, steering apparatus on one out of 13 and exhaust systems on one out of 14.
