

TORNADO OPPOSES MARSHFIELD IN STATE PLAY-OFFS TONIGHT

"Will they do it?" was the big question in the minds of Medford high football supporters as the Black Tornado awaited its

encounter tonight with the rampaging Marshfield Pirates at Coos Bay.

The two aggregations, winners of their respective district banners, contend in quarter-finals of the Oregon Class A-1 championship play-offs. Kick-off time is 8 p.m. The game will be heard by broadcast here.

Medford goes into the fracas the decided underdog. Its assignment of upset tonight is a big one. But, if the Tornado can rock the state with a stunning triumph, it will gain the position of hottest contender for the Oregon title hunting.

Marshfield's Golden Pirates have the favored role for several reasons. Since early in the season they've been rated No. 1 in two press polls while Medford only recently has pushed into consideration in the ratings (ninth and eighth this week). The Golden Pirates are undefeated, scoring eight victories by impressive scores while Medford has been harder pressed in a season of six wins, one loss and two ties.

Against common foes Marshfield also has the better showing, drubbing Grants Pass 27 to 6 and Roseburg 49 to 0. Medford won over those rivals 14 to 7 and 14 to 6. But the Big Wind has vastly improved since its Roseburg session and met a stronger GP crew than the Pirates faced early in the fall. And it means to blow all comparisons aside.

Consensus is that line play will make the difference in the struggle between Medford's District 6 winners and Marshfield's 1954 state co-champ Pirates, who are representing District 5 once more. Tornado fans are hopeful that steady progress toward perfection made by the Medford forwards will carry the Pear capital club through. But the Tornado will be outweighed both offensively and defensively by 10 to 11 pounds per man and the Pirate wall is regarded as stronger and better balanced than that of the rugged Cave-men which Medford bettered last week. Pirate first stringers have allowed only one touchdown this season.

Both lines will attempt to shake loose stellar backs. Denny Baker, 198, and Roger Johnson, 178, are the big running threats of the Pirates while Sandy Fraser is a capable passer. Other backs of the Marshfield crew are unheralded but are efficient

and could be just as dangerous. Gary Riley, John Bellack and Mike Hawkins are breakaway gainers the Tornado will attempt to free. Larry Gober is also good for lots of yardage if the Medfordites can open the way. And Dave Bosworth can wriggle through the smaller gaps. Dick McLaughlin, Bellack and Riley have done most of Medford's throwing this year. Hawkins, Hawley, Riley, McLaughlin and Copple have been among the receivers.

A 35-man Medford squad left Medford about 8:30 a.m. today. According to Oregon School Activities association regulations,

only 27 may suit down for the game.

The complete Marshfield victory record this year has been over Caldwell, Ida., 40 to 13, over Coquille 27 to 0, over Grants Pass 27 to 6, over Springfield 27 to 0, over Roseburg 49 to 0, over Prineville 21 to 0, over Eugene 32 to 13 and over North Bend 32 to 0.

Medford has locked Cleveland of Portland 12 to 6, Roseburg 14 to 6, Crater 37 to 0, Eureka, Calif., 20 to 14, Ashland 40 to 7, and Grants Pass 14 to 7. The Tornado tied Milwaukie 7 to 7 and Klamath Falls 13 to 13. It lost 13 to 0 to Gresham.

Seal Franchise Forfeited By Coast League Directors

Vancouver, B. C. (U.P.)—The franchise of the San Francisco Seals of the Pacific Coast League was up for sale today after having been forfeited by league directors at their annual meeting here.

The directors announced yesterday they would operate the club next year unless a new buyer was found before then.

Claire Goodwin, PCL president, said the league would not sell the Seals' franchise for less than \$90,000 and accumulated indebtedness. The club is \$200,000 in debt and the buyer would have to assume that debt.

Joseph Cairnes, executive vice president of the Milwaukee Braves of the National League, said he had discussed the possible purchase of the Seals with PCL directors "but there was no meeting of minds and we made no offer."

Mayor Fred Hume addressed the directors at a luncheon celebration and promised Vancouver would do its best to make the city a strong member of the Coast League. The Oakland franchise was recently transferred to the Canadian city.

Ford Frick, commissioner of baseball, was a special guest at

the luncheon and told the directors there was a "definite need" for a third major league. "It has to come eventually," he said.

Frick said he didn't want to speak "strongly" for a third major league at the present time. When it comes about "depends on what the owners want," he said.

Frick said the PCL was the best established minor league in baseball and emphasized the loop was crossing an international border for the first time putting it on a par with the International League in that respect.

Scoter Downed At Summer Lake

Portland—Rare, indeed, was the bird in the bag of a waterfowl hunter at Summer lake last week.

Stymied at the strange appearance of the brownish colored duck he had shot and thinking it was some kind of black duck, the hunter brought the bird to the checking station where Austin Hamer, game commission informative agent, identified the stranger as a juvenile white-winged scoter, the first scoter ever to be recorded at the Summer lake station.

Because of its rare occurrence at Summer lake, the hunter donated the bird to Vernon Maw, waterfowl biologist, who will mount the bird and add it to the Summer lake collection.

Before the day was through, two more of the scoters were checked through the station, with the hunters reporting having seen a flock of at least 15 of the large, blackish, colored waterfowl.

Normally the scoters are a sea bird, spending most of their time along the coast and the coastal bays and inlets. Nesting, however, usually takes place inland on large bodies of water.

Spokane Indians Up Stock Limit

Spokane — (U.P.) — Stockholders of the Spokane Indians Baseball club decided last night to permit an individual to own \$10,000 worth of voting stock instead of the previous \$1,000 worth.

The stockholders increased the limit after they were told new money is needed to meet about \$32,000 worth of indebtedness incurred by the baseball club. The financial statement read at the meeting showed the club lost about \$40,000 last season.

Opponents of the new stock setup argued it would be contrary to the original idea behind the community-owned baseball club which was that no one person could get control of the Indians. Proponents of the new system said it was necessary to keep the club from folding.
