ARTHRITIS

People ask me what I would do if I had arthritis. The first thing I would do would be to try to make sure what type of arthritis I had. Most people who think they have arthritis really have fibrositis which is a much milder disease, and a disease that will not deform their joints and will probably never produce crippling. One of the ways of telling if one has fibrositis or not severe arthritis is to get an estimate of the red blood sedimentation rate (a simple and cheap laboratory test). If the figure is low and well within normal limits, the disease is likely to be fibrositis. We do not know the cause or mechanism of fibrositis but it is probably related to arthritis. Why? Because one often finds severe arthritis in one member of a family and a mild fibrositis in another member. If these two diseases are inherited together they should be related.

There are some persons who have an acute type of arthritis which can be relieved sometimes by the removal of bad tonsils or some badly infected teeth. Old arthritides and persons with the deforming rheumatoid arthritis cannot hope to get much relief from the removal of so-called focal infections.

The worst type of arthritis is the rheumatoid form, in which the hands usually soon become weak and knobby and deformed and with the fingers all slanting toward the outer side of the hand. In this form of the disease, there is often much pain and disability. The patient may be forced to live in a wheel-chair or even in bed. This is one type of arthritis which is likely to be helped by cortisone and similar drugs.

There is a type of rheumatoid arthritis, usually in young persons, attacks the joints of the spine and quickly ossifies the spine so that there no longer is any movement in it, and the man has to walk in peculiar, easily recognizable way, usually with his head bent over forward. In the senescent type of arthritis, which attacks elderly persons, the patient, especially if much too heavy, may have pain in deformed hip joints, knee joints and ankle joints. These joints have been pounded down through the years, until the bone surfaces are roughened. Naturally, such arthritis in elderly persons is not easily cured. As I often say, the only way of curing such a person "would be to send to the factory for a new joint."

In many cases a person with arthritis can be helped with good physiotherapy and he (or she) can be helped with some of the newer drugs. If there is crippling, the persons can be helped by experts in rehabilitation who may be able to get him out of his bed or his wheelchair and back to work. A point for all bad arthritides to remember is that the cortisone-like

drugs commonly do not cure; they relieve pain and disability and give the man a sort of vacation from his arthritis. It is well to use the smallest dose of the drug that will make life bearable. Large doses are likely to bring undesirable side-effects.

Children and Terrible Burns

One of the most distressing things to see is a small child terribly burned. Often one sees a child who fell into a tub full of boiling water that the mother had left on the floor of the kitchen. She had planned to add cold water and then to bathe the children, but her attention was diverted for a minute, or she was called to the telephone, and suddenly there was a scream. Perhaps one child pushed another in. In other cases a child will get so close to an open grate (without a screen) that the clothing caught fire, and as a result, the child either died or was left terribly scarred for life. I will never forget a woman I once saw who, though affectionate by nature and very desirous of being married as other women are, had never been able to find a mate because her skin was so ugly where she

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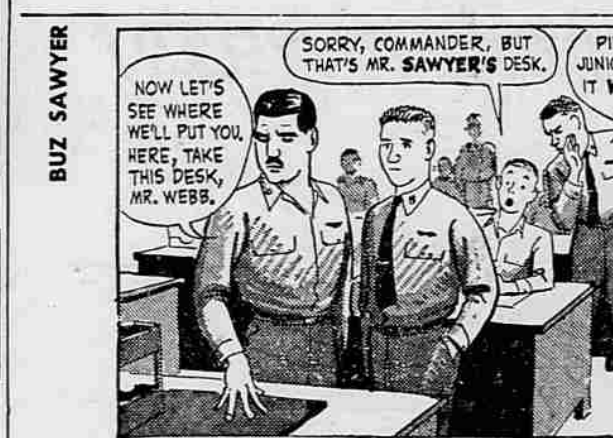
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had been badly burned.
Often a small child reaches up
and, grasping the handle of a
pot on the stove, pulls down
over himself a quart of boiling
hot food. No woman with small
children around should ever
leave a pot or pan on the stove
with the handle projecting for-
ward.

There is only one way in
which to avoid accidents in the
home and that is to be constantly
thinking of how easily one
could take place. For instance;
one night, on going upstairs to
bed, I noticed a roller skate that
some child had left on the steps.
Let us suppose that, during the
night, the children's grandmother
on her way to the kitchen, had
stepped on that skate—her feet
would have shot out from under
her, and the result would have
been a broken neck, or a broken
hip, and perhaps months of ill-
ness in a hospital. The moral is
—do not leave man-traps about.

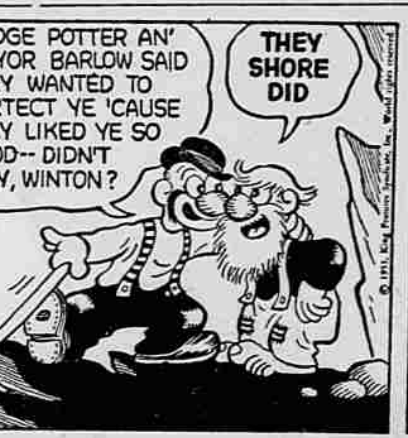
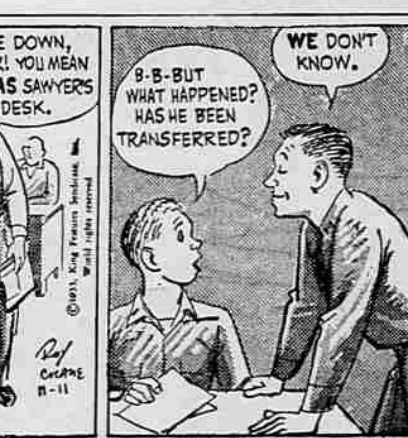
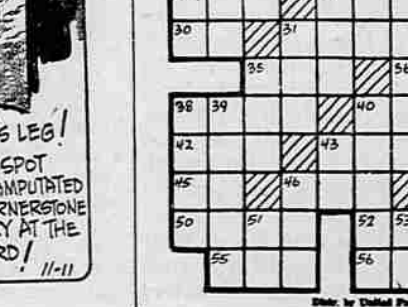
Freak Accident Kills
