Mrs. Beers received many gifts to help her remember the occasion.

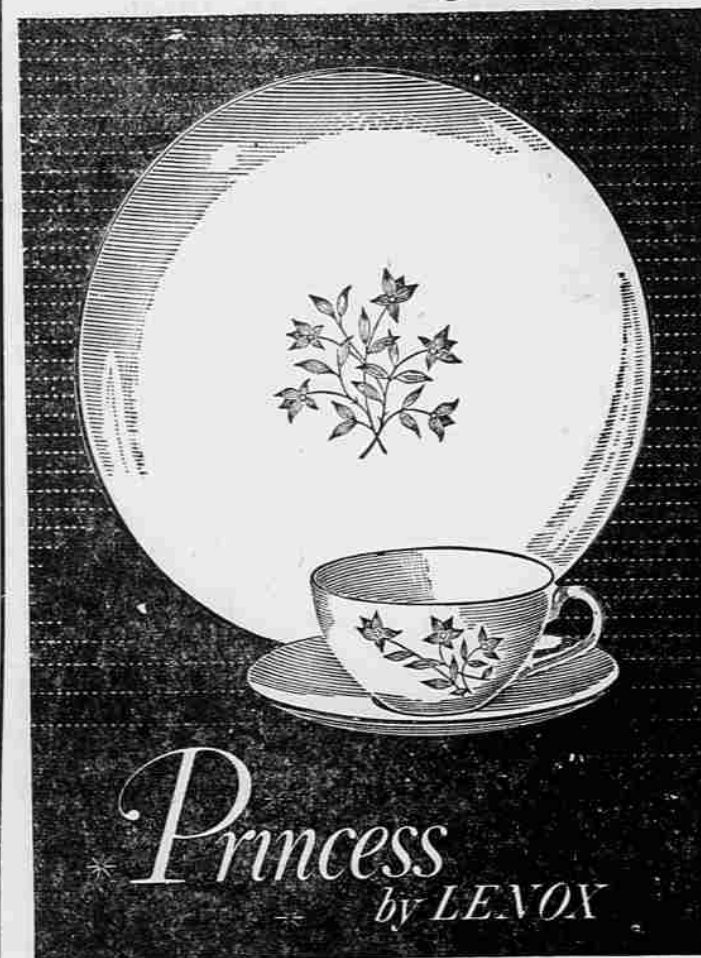
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
