## Franklin Stove Low on Heat But High in Value

## THERE SURE IS A GENUINE ALUMINUM \$10 GOLD PIECE

On the obverse side was a beautiful Liberty head with

stars in her hair under the legend UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

On the reverse was a strange design composed of a central circle surrounded by six ovel shaped areas.

In the circle were the symbols giving the weight and fineness of the gold. The ovals contained the equivalent value in terms of the leading currencies of the world, \$10 and the proper amounts in sterling, gulden, francs, marks and kronen.

"A most interesting piece," I said. "They were put out in copper and nickel and gold as well as aluminum, and though the market for pattern coins is limited, yours catalogues at \$110 and should easily bring half that amount if you are willing to take the few weeks necessary to list it in a coin auction."

Jim looked a little wistful. "I suppose it would be worth more if it were a genuine gold \$10 gold piece," I nodded.

Jim looked philosophical. "But I should kick," he said. "How many others have a genuine aluminum \$10 gold piece? And besides, this is the first time I ever ransomed myself from a captive audience with a potential cash profit on the deal."

## Chemical Chart Shows Growth

Berkeley, Calif. — (U.P.) — Remember that chart in the chemistry classroom in high school—the one with all the elements and their numbers? Well, you wouldn't recognize it today.

Thanks to atomic research, the chart, known as the Mendeleev Chart or the Chart of Atomic Weights and Valences, has grown considerably since the days when radium was considered a miracle of modern science.

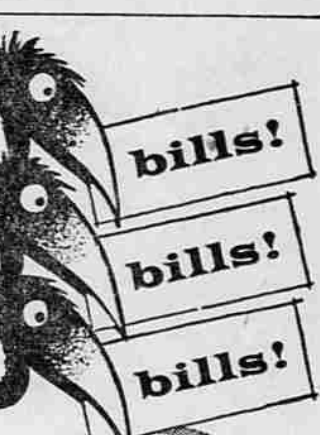
Of the new additions to the chart nine of them have been discovered by University of California scientists. The new elements, all heavier than uranium run from the atomic numbers of 93 to 101. And, being justly proud, Berkeley scientists named one of them Berkelium.

Typical of how the new elements are being discovered and named are elements 99 and 100. They were discovered in radioactive debris collected from the "Mike" thermonuclear test in the Pacific ocean in 1952. Ordinary atoms of uranium, named after the planet Uranus, were built up to become atoms of element 99 and 100 by their capture of neutrons in the test explosions.

In their report the scientists bestowed the names of Einsteinium and Fermium on element 99 and 100 after the late physicists, Albert Einstein and Enrico Fermi.
