Electricity Real Fuel Oil Competitor

San Francisco (U.P.)—Summer air conditioning has resulted in electricity becoming a real competitor of fuel oil for winter heating, delegates to the 35th annual meeting of the American Petroleum Institute were warned today.

President A. J. Becker of the Becker Marsden Co., St. Louis, Mo., sounded the tocsin as approximately 6000 top-ranking executives and technicians of the multi-million-dollar oil industry opened the four-day meeting.

The tremendous increases in use of electricity for summer air conditioning, Becker explained, has created a problem for utility companies and the solution is a buildup of a winter load to equalize the summer peak.

"Almost the only winter load available which would meet the issue is a house-heating load," Becker said.

Cannes, France (U.P.)—The Aga Khan said today his son, Prince Aly Khan, is a big boy now and can handle his own romantic demise.

Oregon Senators Ask Harbor Improvement Study Be Continued

Washington—Senators Wayne L. Morse and Richard L. Neuberger of Oregon have requested the Corps of Engineers' Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors to continue study of the Chetco Cove harbor improvement project and announced they will seek funds for a correlated survey of the project and the already authorized Chetco River waterway improvement project.

The board will consider a report on the Chetco Cove project at a meeting in Washington, D. C., Nov. 28 and 29. The Oregon senators urged the board chairman, Maj. Gen. Charles G. Holle, to consider new developments in the southern Oregon area which affect the proposed project before taking final action on the report.

"Proposals have been made for construction of a major highway into the area with its western terminus at the mouth of the Chetco river," Morse and Neuberger said in a joint letter to General Holle.

"This would greatly enlarge the tributary area of the project, increasing the natural resources and economic assets available to support justification of the project."

"They explained that Congressional authorization already has been provided for the Chetco River waterway improvement but the present study on the Chetco Cove project does not evaluate the relationship and benefits of the Chetco River improvement to the harbor improvement."

"The Eisenhower resolution was adopted on the grounds that the President's administration 'has demonstrated the advantages to the American people of a soundly liberal program of social progress at home combined with enlightened liberalism abroad.'"

Jim Hatfield, Salem, was elected chairman of the state federation, and Dave Belch of Portland was elected national committee man.

The FTC at the same time said it was investigating four other leading cosmetic companies suspected of the same offense.

Those charged in today's action were Elmo, Inc., Philadelphia; and Helena Rubinstein, Inc., Hudson Sales Co., Inc., and Yardley of London, Inc., all with principal offices in New York.
