Washington—Republican National Chairman Leonard W. Hall on Adlai Stevenson's announcement that he will seek the 1956 Democratic presidential nomination: "The people repudiated Mr. Stevenson and everything he stands for in 1952. They will repudiate him again should he get the nomination next year."

Miami—Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.) a probable candidate himself, on Stevenson's announcement: "It is a good thing for Stevenson to run and to announce his candidacy early."

Denver—Neal Wright, guard captain at Denver county jail where John Gilbert Graham is being held on charges that he time-bombed a United Air Lines plane sending 44 persons to their deaths: "He seems to feel he'll get out of the position he's in and he talked like he's quite hopeful of making his bond and getting out of jail."

Miami—Florida State Highway Patrol Director H. N. Kirkman, in a pre-Safe Driving Day statement: "There are two types of pedestrians today—the quick and the dead."

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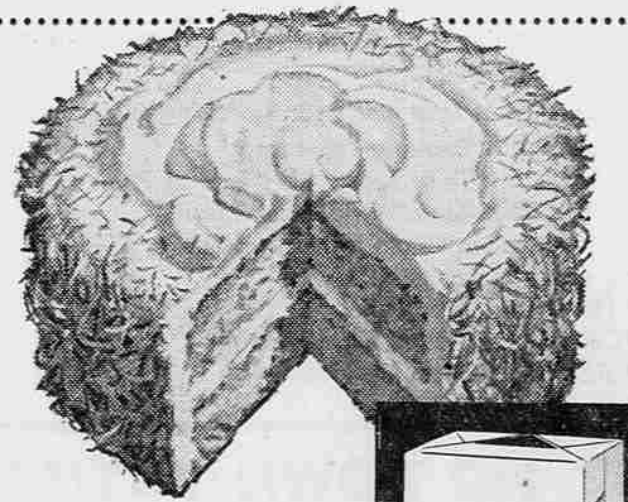
