Hornbrook—Mrs. Mary Niles, 83, passed away Nov. 5 at the hospital in Yreka, Calif. Mrs. Niles had been a resident of the Henley-Hornbrook area for the past 78 years. She came here with her parents from Illinois at the age of 5. In 1898 in the now extinct town of Henley, she was married to Grant Van Vactor, who died in 1912.

In 1927 she married Elmer Niles and they made their home in Hornbrook until his death three years ago. For the past two years she had made her home with her daughter, Mrs. Frank Groves at Hill. In addition to Mrs. Groves, she leaves a brother, Arthur Buckner of Yreka, and two sisters in Illinois, three granddaughters and three great-grandchildren. Funeral services, including Eastern Star rites, were held Nov. 12 in the Community Methodist church of

Hornbrook, of which Mrs. Niles has been an active member for more than 60 years. Interment was in the family plot in the Henley-Hornbrook cemetery.

Baltimore Youngster Named Poster Boy For March of Dimes

New York — Tommy Woodward, a towheaded, freckle-faced little boy from Baltimore, has been named 1956 March of Dimes Poster Boy, it was announced today by Basil O'Connor president of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Five-year-old Tommy represents many thousands of polio victims in all parts of the country who were aided by the March of Dimes during 1955. He is living proof that polio isn't licked yet since he, like so many others, will need continued March of Dimes care for years to come.

More Surgery Needed

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Veryl Woodward, Tommy was stricken with polio at 14 months of age. He spent six months in hospitals and last July underwent an operation on the muscles of his left foot. He probably will need additional operations in the future.

To date, Tommy's treatment and care have cost some \$1,500 in March of Dimes funds.

Tommy's picture will be displayed on millions of posters, contribution and coin collectors throughout the nation. Accompanied by his mother, he will make personal appearances in a number of cities during the 1956 March of Dimes, which begins Jan. 3 and continues for the rest of the month.

This mischievous little Maryland boy is the eleventh in a parade of children, all polio victims, who have symbolized the March of Dimes during the fund raising drives each January. He is 39½ inches tall, weighs 38 pounds.

Stockholm, Sweden — (U.P.)—An American family of six from Carmel, Calif., waited for permission today to enter Russia and live for one year "like a plain everyday Russian family."

Milton Mayer, an author, his wife, Jane, and their children, Dicken, Rockie, Amanda and Julie, were promised visas by Georgi Zarubin, Soviet ambassador to Washington.

Mayer said he plans to report on the family's experiences through dispatches to a number of American magazines and newspapers. When he returns to the United States, he said, he will write a book about the Soviet way of life.

Mayer said he wants to "settle down" in a little town deep in Russia with his family.

"If you really want to know people in a foreign country, then you better take your whole family along," he said.

'Antitobacco' Invention Told

Genoa — (U.P.)—Dr. Angelo Chiauuzzi told the recent meeting of the International Medical Congress here about his invention of "Antitobacco," which is non-toxic and contains no nicotine — or tobacco.

"Antitobacco" is made up of aromatic leaves specially cured, creating the appearance and aroma of tobacco.

Dr. Chiauuzzi said that was all the public was going to be told, and the formula will remain secret until patent rights come through. He has filed his invention and beneficial claims of the product with the Genoa Medical Society.

Dr. Chiauuzzi worked on his invention after the alarms about cigarette smoking and lung cancer. He is convinced that smoking greatly upsets the lungs and has spent considerable time and research on the effect of smoking not only on the lungs but other parts of the human body as well.

It was necessary to get around the desire for tobacco by offering something of a substitute, he felt. Hence, "Antitobacco."

Dr. Chiauuzzi hopes to have his invention marketed by the Italian state monopoly. He said that "Antitobacco," not being tobacco, could be made quite openly and sold in drug-stores without infringing on the state law against private manufacturing.

However, Dr. Chiauuzzi said he would prefer the state to take it over because of the benefit it would create to the Italian nation.

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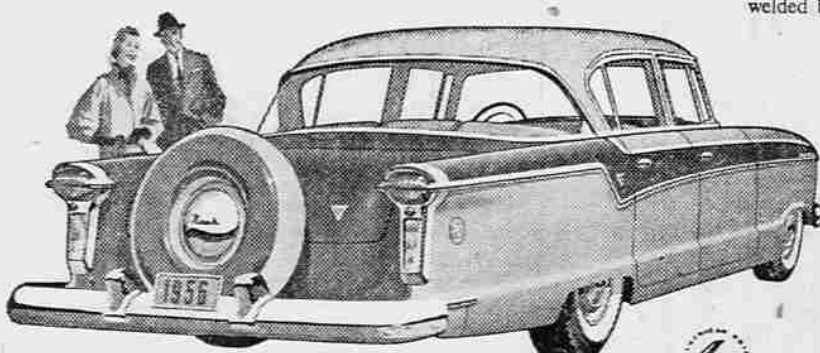
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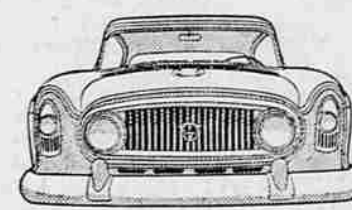


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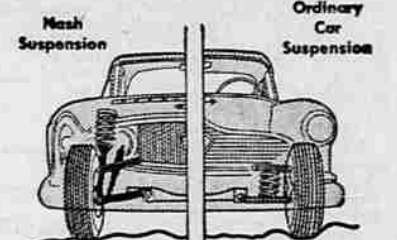
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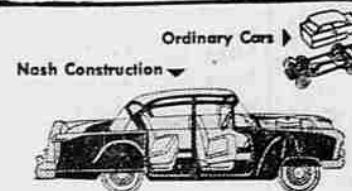
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
