Hollywood—(U.P.)—Blonde actress Jill Jarmyn has withdrawn a request for a battery complaint against film star Susan Hayward which resulted from a brawl in the bedroom of actor Don Barry's apartment.

The young actress signed a statement yesterday saying, "I hereby withdraw my request for a complaint . . . at this time." She said she cancelled her action because "I've been through a humiliating experience and I want to forget it."

The blonde film player had accused her red-haired rival of hitting her with a hair brush, knocking her against a coffee table and threatening her with a lighted cigarette.

Priests, Fireman, Whisky Credited With Saving Life of Would-Be Suicide in S.F.

San Francisco—(U.P.)—Two priests, a fireman and a pint of whisky were credited today with saving the life of a would-be suicide who teetered for more than an hour on the edge of a building, 12 stories above a crowded downtown street.

The man, Armand Fred Escalante, 30-year-old cleaner and dyer horrified a huge throng of downtown shoppers yesterday as he clung to the base of a flagstaff at the edge of the roof of the Veterans administration building.

Horse Chases Truck; Driver Lands in Jail

Ann Arbor, Mich.—(U.P.)—A somewhat shaken farmer called police Tuesday when he observed a damaged truck speeding down a highway with a horse in hot pursuit.

State police joined the chase and arrested the two men in the truck, one on a charge of being drunk and disorderly and the other for leaving the scene of an accident.

It seems the horse was bounced out of the truck box when the truck sideswiped a car and was only trying to catch up, police said.

Escalante began his exhibition at about 3:15 p.m., and within minutes the streets were jammed with firemen, police and curious onlookers.

Hatless and with his tan trench coat whipping in the wind, Escalante alternately stood on the ledge and sat on the brink with his legs hanging in space.

As 20 firemen held a circular rescue net on the sidewalk 120 feet below, Escalante screamed and cursed his would-be rescuers and held them at bay with threats of "Keep back or I'll jump."

An hour later, the man drank a cup of coffee and smoked a cigarette offered by Father Joseph Wong of nearby St. Patrick's church.

Dykes then offered Escalante a pint of whisky. The man reached out gingerly and took the bottle. He pulled some money from his pocket and offered it to Dykes in payment.

As Dykes reached toward the money, he grabbed Escalante by the leg. Father Wong and Father Martin Walsh grabbed the man and he was pulled to safety.

Escalante's sister-in-law, who arrived on the scene shortly before the rescue, said she received a letter from Escalante yesterday morning in which he threatened to jump from a "tall building" or the Golden Gate bridge.

"All he wanted to do was find his wife" she explained.

Escalante's estranged wife, Aura, was on her way up in an elevator when the rescue was made. The couple was reunited

at the psychiatric ward of San Francisco hospital where Escalante was taken for treatment and observation.

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
